Let all the nations of the earth praise you.

God of our ancestors, Blessed Absalom reminded us that just as your chosen people acknowledged a Syrian, ready to perish, was their ancestor, we too must acknowledge that an enslaved African, ready to perish, was our ancestor: endue our elders and leaders with wisdom and vision to reach back with the purpose of moving forward. Glory to you, O God, for your precious record of power and goodness;

Let all the nations of the earth praise you.

God of compassion, you hear your peoples cries and prayers in heaven: accept our intercession and petitions as part of our worship of you. Help us remember that we stand on the prayers of our ancestors. As they prayed for current and future generations, so must we pray for our sisters and brothers today and for those to come. Glory to you, O God, for your precious record of power and goodness;

Let all the nations of the earth praise you.

God who creates, Blessed Absalom reminded us that sacrifices must be accompanied with action: guide our feet to run the race without getting weary. Keep us focused on the fight for equality. Glory to you, O God, for your precious record of power and goodness;

Let all the nations of the earth praise you.

Healing God, delivered those who call upon your name, as we intercede for__. You inspire our hearts with hope as we offer prayers of thanksgiving for__. Continue to grow from strength to strength those who know you more fully, as we pray for the departed, especially__. Glory to you, O God, for your precious record of power and goodness;



The Very Reverend Kim L. Coleman



The Very Reverend Kim L. Coleman, National President of the Union of Black Episcopalians, represents UBE's six regions, over 40 chapters, and 1200 plus individual and diocesan members dedicated to eradicating racism within the Church and beyond. Since November 2002, she has served as Senior Pastor and Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in Arlington, Virginia where she oversees Trinity's dynamic outreach and justice ministries including the Columbia Pike Thrift Shop, Trinity School of Early Learning, Trinity's international Mothers' Union affiliate, and TNT for Racial Justice, an ecumenical racial reconciliation partnership between Trinity and Nova Catholic Community. A May 2001 cum laude graduate of Virginia Theological Seminary (VTS), Mother Kim's involvements with the wider Church have included serving as Diocesan Standing Committee and Executive Board member, Deputy to General Convention, VTS Alumnae Association Vice President, and VTS Adjunct Professor. She currently also serves as Chaplain to DOV Episcopal Church Women, Diocesan Archdean, and Dean of the Arlington Region. Mother Kim is passionate about Christian discipleship, spiritual transformation, and preaching. She employs her experience as a culture change agent to pursue a Revelation 7:9 vision of the kingdom of God where every nation, tribe, language and people of all ages joyfully live out the Episcopal vow to strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being.

Blessed Absalom Jones



Absalom Jones was born on November 6, 1746, into slavery in Sussex County, Delaware. He taught himself to read out of the New Testament, among other books. When sixteen, Absalom was taken to Philadelphia by his slave master, after selling his mother and siblings. There he attended a night school for blacks, operated by Quakers. At twenty, he married another slave, and purchased her freedom with his earnings.

Jones bought his own freedom in 1784. At St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church, he served as lay minister for its black membership. The active evangelism of Jones and that of his friend, Richard Allen, greatly increased black membership at St. George's. The alarmed vestry decided to segregate blacks into an upstairs gallery, without notifying them. During a Sunday service when ushers attempted to remove them, the blacks indignantly walked out as a body.

In 1787, black Christians organized the Free African Society, the first organized Afro-American society, and Absalom Jones and Richard Allen were elected overseers. Members of the Society paid monthly dues for the benefit of those in need. The Society established communication with similar black groups in other cities. In 1792, the Society began to build a church, which was dedicated on July 17th, 1794.

The African Church applied for membership in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania on the following conditions: 1. that they be received as an organized body; 2. that they have control over their local affairs; 3. that Absalom Jones be licensed as layreader, and, if qualified, be ordained as minister. In October 1794 it was admitted as St. Thomas African Episcopal Church. Bishop White ordained Jones as deacon in 1795 and as priest on September 21, 1802.

Jones was an earnest preacher. He denounced slavery, and warned the oppressors to "clean their hands of slaves." To him, God was the Father, who always acted on "behalf of the oppressed and distressed." But it was his constant visiting and mild manner that made him beloved by his own flock and by the community. St. Thomas Church, Philadelphia, grew to over 500 members during its first year. Known as "the Black Bishop of the Episcopal Church," Jones was an example of persistent faith in God and in the church as God's instrument. Jones died on February 13th, 1818, in Philadelphia.
