

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

of the 207th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina

For the first time since the outbreak of COVID-19 in early 2020, the Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held at its customary time of year, at its customary site (the M. C. Benton Convention Center in Winston-Salem, North Carolina), and in its customary format.

Registration for the 207th Annual Convention began at 4:00 p.m., Thursday, November 17, 2023. At 5:00 p.m. the Committee on Dispatch of Business met to review arrangements for the Convention. At 7:45 p.m., a program entitled "Creation Care and Global Partnership" was offered jointly by the Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry and the Chartered Committee on Global Missions. The program reflected actions of the Lambeth Conference 2022 and the United Nations Climate Conference COP26 in 2021. Speakers included the Rev. Leon Spencer, Chair of the Chartered Committee on Global Missions; Mr. David McDuffie, Chair of the Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry; Mr. Joe Herbert, Holy Family, Chapel Hill; the Rev. Jill Bullard, St. Philip's, Durham; Ms. Fran Burkett, All Saints, Concord; Ms. Becky Showalter, Nativity, Raleigh; and Mr. Michael Anello, Executive Director, Haiti Reforestation Partnership. A prerecorded video provided remarks by several members of the Presiding Bishop's Delegation to COP26 including the Rt. Rev. Marc Andrus, Bishop of California and head of the Delegation; and Ms. Destinee Bates, St. Ambrose, Raleigh.

Pursuant to the determination of the 206th Annual Convention, the 207th Annual Convention gathered on Friday, November 18, 2022. The theme of Convention was Creation Care. Registration and credentialing opened at 8:00 a.m. Mr. Charles L. Till, Secretary of Convention, conducted a question-and-answer session for clergy and lay delegates at 9:15 a.m.

The Rt. Rev. Samuel Rodman, Bishop Diocesan XII of the Diocese, called Convention to order at 10:00 a.m. The Rev. Helen Svoboda-Barber, Chair of the Committee on Credentials, certified that a quorum was present in both the clergy order and the lay order. The Holy Eucharist was celebrated, the Rt. Rev. Jennifer Brooke-Davidson, Bishop Assisting, presiding and celebrating. The Rt. Rev. Orlando Gomez Segura, Bishop of Costa Rica, was also present. Bishop Rodman delivered his annual address as the sermon.

Bishop Rodman called Convention to order for the First Legislative Session at 11:40 a.m. Upon request of Bishop Rodman, a motion from the floor was made to adopt the published agenda of Convention, which adopted the motion by voice vote. Bishop Rodman appointed Mr. Marks Arnold as Parliamentarian of Convention. Bishop Rodman appointed Ms. Martha Alexander as Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business. Bishop Rodman nominated Mr. Till as Secretary of Convention, which elected Mr. Till by voice vote. Bishop Rodman nominated Mr. Gilbert Small as Treasurer of the Diocese. Convention elected Mr. Small by voice vote.

Bishop Rodman announced nominations and appointments that required action by Convention: Mr. Martin Brinkley as Chancellor of the Diocese; Mr. Arnold and Mr. Chip Howes as Vice-Chancellors; the Rev. Dr. Brooks Graebner as Historiographer of the Diocese; the Rev. Chip

Edens and Mr. Steve Mason as Trustees of the Diocese; the Rev. Darby Everhard, Mr. Tom Fennimore, and Ms. Laurie Austin to the Disciplinary Board; and the Rev. Marion Sprott-Goldson and Ms. Yolanda Anderson as Trustees of the Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society. A motion was made to elect or to confirm these nominations and appointments, as the case may be, *en banc*; Convention adopted the motion by voice vote.

Bishop Rodman announced other appointments not requiring action by Convention, including the following legislative committees of the 207th Annual Convention:

Administration of the Diocese – The Rev. Robert Black, Chair; the Rev. David Umphlett, the Rev. Sara Ardrey-Graves, Ms. Joan Pharr, Mr. Chipper Long, and Ms. Diane Hundley.

Elections – The Rev. George Greer, Chair; the Rev. Robert Thomas, the Rev. George Silides, the Rev. Ginny Wilder, Mr. Jimmy Moore, and Mr. Long.

Credentials – The Rev. Svoboda-Barber, Chair; the Rev. Emily Parker, the Rev. Sarah Carver, Ms. Carol Putney, Mr. Greg Shields, Ms. Gertrude Murchison, and Mr. Yoshi Nagaishi.

Constitution and Canons – The Rev. Sarah Ball-Damberg, Chair; the Rev. Bruce Heyvaert, the Rev. James Pahl, Mr. Alf Badgett, Ms. Debbie Walker, and Mr. Nick Long.

National and International Concerns – The Rev. Rebecca Yarbrough, Chair; the Rev. Spencer, the Rev. Maureen Flak, the Rev. Sally French, the Rev. Garry Edwards, Ms. Julia Hoyle, Mr. Laura Collins, Mr. Julius Nimmons, and Mr. Jerry Landry.

Social Concerns – The Rev. Caleb Tabor, Chair; the Rev. Rick Sigler, the Rev. Emily Parker, Mr. Richard Bucknall, Ms. Nanci Atkseson, and Mr. Jerry Broyal.

Faith and Morals – The Rev. Audra Abt, Chair; the Rev. Kevin Matthews, the Rev. Daniel Wall, the Rev. Rocky Rachal, Ms. Caroline Stephenson, Mr. Ryan Parker, Ms. Septina Florimonte, and Mr. Bruce Jenkins.

Dispatch of Business - Ms. Alexander, Chair; Bishop Rodman; the Rev. Svoboda-Barber, the Rev. Black, the Rev. Greer, the Rev. Ball-Damberg, the Rev. Yarbrough, the Rev. Tabor, the Rev. Abt, and Mr. Till.

Prior to Convention, the following persons had been properly nominated for elected office: Standing Committee, clergy order, the Rev. Umphlett and the Rev. Kristin Edrington; Standing Committee, lay order, none; Diocesan Council, clergy order, the Rev. Clarke French, the Rev. Wilder, the Rev. Sallie Simpson, and the Rev. Valerie Colbert; Diocesan Council, lay order, Ms. Sherry Owens; Deputy to General Convention, clergy order, the Rev. Jacob Pierce, the Rev. Jamie Edwards, the Rev. Kathy Walker, the Rev. Matthews, the Rev. Yarbrough, and the Rev. Ardrey-Graves; Deputy to General Convention, lay order, Ms Alice Freeman, Mr. Bryan Dougan, Mr. Long, Ms. Alexander, and Ms. Megan Carlson; and Trustee, University of the South, lay order, Mr. Robert Husted. The Secretary solicited late nominations. Mr. Al Ragland

and Ms. Pamela Harvey were duly nominated for Diocesan Council, lay order; and Mr. George Linney, Ms. Mary Wellman, and Mr. Robert Wright for Standing Committee, lay order.

Prior to Convention, six resolutions had been duly submitted: 207.1, On Property Management; 207.3, On Episcopal Elections; 207.4, On the President of the Standing Committee; 207.5, On Equitable Racial Hiring Practices for Diocesan Positions; 207.7, On Reducing Gun Violence; and 207.8, On Expansion of Creation Care Work and Engagement in the Communion Forest Initiative. Resolutions 207.2, On Youth at Convention, and 207.6, On Prohibiting Guns in Churches, had been withdrawn prior to Convention. The Secretary solicited late resolutions. None were offered. Bishop Rodman announced his assignment of resolutions to committees of Convention.

The Secretary announced that his report to Convention has been filed and noted that that seven churches were unable to vote at this Convention because of non-compliance with the Canons. The Secretary informed Convention that the Commission on Constitution and Canons was about to publish its renumbered and rearranged version of the Canons and that the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church adopted three amendments to its Constitution upon first reading. Members of the Convention may contact the Bishops or the Deputation to General Convention in regards to the amendments.

The Secretary announced that the vestries of St. Christopher's, Garner; St. Mark's, Raleigh; and All Souls, Ansonville had informed the Bishop Diocesan that they were unable to remain open and requested closure. A memorandum of understanding between the Diocese and Calvary, Wadesboro was signed whereby Calvary assumed responsibility for the parishioners and assets of All Souls. All administrative, liturgical, and pastoral aspects of these closures being complete, the Secretary moved that the union of the three churches with Convention be dissolved. The motion was adopted by voice vote.

Bishop Rodman welcomed Bishop Gomez; Bishop Andrus, the keynote speaker of the Convention; and the Rt. Rev. William Gregg. The Secretary read a letter of welcome from the Rt. Rev. Metlhayotlhe Beleme, Bishop of Botswana. Bishop Rodman extended greetings to several persons not present at Convention: the Rt. Rev. Gary Gloster and his wife Judy; Mrs. Connie Johnson, wife of the late Rt. Rev. Robert Johnson, Bishop Diocesan X Resigned; Mrs. Sharon Curry, wife of the Presiding Bishop the Most Rev. Michael Curry and Bishop Diocesan XI Resigned; and the Rt. Rev. Scott Benhase and his wife Kelly.

Bishop Rodman introduced Bishop Brooke-Davidson and moved that the Convention designate her as Bishop Assistant of the Diocese. The motion was adopted by acclamation and applause. Bishop Rodman welcomed Mr. Carrick Brooke-Davidson. Bishop Brooke-Davidson addressed the Convention briefly.

Bishop Rodman introduced the seminarians of the Diocese and bestowed the Bishop's Award on the Rev. Spencer for his work in Global Mission and Formation. Ms. Alexander and the Secretary made announcements. Following grace spoken by the Youth delegates, Convention recessed for lunch at 12:29 p.m.

At 1:50 p.m. Bishop Rodman called Convention to order. The Secretary announced a test of the Election Runner system to cast ballots. Following an introduction by Bishop Rodman, Bishop Andrus addressed the Convention about Creation Care. At 2:43 p.m. Convention recessed for committee hearings. At 5:02 p.m. the Convention observed Evening Prayer led by the Rt. Rev. Anne Hodges-Copple, Bishop Suffragan Retired. After Evening Prayer, Bishop Rodman and the Convention expressed their love and appreciation to Bishop Hodges-Copple and John Hodges-Copple. In their honor, the Diocese established a Creation Care Fund.

On Saturday, November 19, Bishop Rodman called Convention to order for the Second Legislative Session at 8:30 a.m. The Convention observed Morning Prayer led by the Rev. Lisa Fischbeck and the Rev. Gabe Lamazares. The Secretary announced that Friday's test ballot was successful. Certain offices for election having the same number of nominees as open positions, the Secretary moved that the nominees for Diocesan Council in the lay order, Standing Committee in the clergy order, and Trustee of the University of the South in the lay order be elected by acclamation. The motion was adopted by voice mail. The Secretary announced that the first ballot for the remaining offices was open.

Bishop Andrus completed his address.

The Secretary announced the results of the first ballot. For Diocesan Council in the clergy order, the Rev. Wilder and the Rev. Colbert were elected. For Standing Committee in the lay order, there was no election and there will be a runoff between Ms. Wellman and Mr. Wright. For Deputy to General Convention in the clergy order, the Rev. Walker (1), the Rev. Yarbrough (2), the Rev. Matthews (3), and the Rev. Pierce (4) were elected delegates and the Rev. Ardrey-Graves (5) and the Rev. Jamie Edwards (6) were elected alternates. For Deputy to General Convention in the lay order, Ms. Freeman (1), Ms. Alexander (2), Ms. Carlson (3), and Mr. Long (4) were elected delegates and Mr. Dougan (5) was elected an alternate. The Secretary announced that the second ballot was open.

Bishop Rodman introduced the staff and campus ministers of the Diocese. Deans introduced clergy new to their respective Convocations. Mr. Long and Ms. Owens delivered the report of Diocesan Council. The Treasurer delivered his report and moved adoption of the Mission and Ministry budget for 2023. The motion was adopted by voice vote. The Treasurer moved that the Fair Share percentage for 2024 be set at 10.65%. The motion was adopted by voice vote. The Convention recessed at 10:25 a.m.

Bishop Rodman called the Convention to order at 10:45 a.m. The Secretary announced the result of the second ballot. For Standing Committee in the lay order, Ms. Wellman was elected.

The Rev. Ball-Damberg delivered the report of the Committee on Constitution and Canons. The Committee recommended adoption of a substitute for Resolution 207.1. The substitute resolution was adopted by voice vote (Act 2022-1). The Committee recommended adoption of Resolution 207.3. Being a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the Diocese, a vote by orders was required. The resolution was adopted on first reading in the lay order and in the clergy order by a show of cards (Act 2022-2) and will be introduced at the 208th Annual Convention for second

reading. The Committee recommended adoption of Resolution 207.4. The resolution was adopted by voice vote (Act 2022-3).

The Rev. Yarbrough delivered the report of the Committee on National and International Concerns. The Committee recommended adoption of a substitute for Resolution 207.8. The substitute resolution was adopted by voice vote (Act 2022-4).

The Rev. Tabor delivered the report of the Committee on Social Concerns. The Committee recommended adoption of a substitute for Resolution 207.7. The substitute resolution was adopted by voice vote (Act 2022-5).

The Rev. Black delivered the report of the Committee on Administration of the Diocese. The Committee recommended adoption of a substitute for Resolution 207.5. Ms. Ashley Romero suggested how the wording might be clarified, and the Rev. Black consented to the clarification. The Rev. Jamie Edwards and Ms. Carlson posed questions which Bishop Rodman answered. Bishop Gregg proposed an amendment to the substitute. Ms. Romero suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified, and Bishop Gregg consented to the clarification. The Rev. Rhonda Lee suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified, and Bishop Gregg declined consent to the clarification. The Rev. John Gibson, author of the original resolution, rose to voice his concerns about the substitute. Bishop Rodman asked the Rev. Gibson to stand by while the Convention dealt with the amendment. Ms. Strother Murray-Ndinga suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified; Bishop Rodman asked Ms. Murray-Ndinga to stand by. The Rev. Yarbrough suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified; Bishop Rodman asked the Rev. Yarbrough to stand by. The Rev. Imogen Rhodenhiser suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified. The limit of twenty minutes' time for consideration of the resolution having approached, Bishop Rodman asked for a motion that the limit be extended by twenty minutes; the motion was adopted by show of cards. Bishop Rodman asked that the Rev. Rhodenhiser stand by. Mr. Fred Mason rose to observe that the wording of the resolution was becoming Faulknerian. Mr. Scott Adams asked a question which Bishop Rodman answered. There being no further debate on the amendment, Bishop Rodman called for a vote. The amendment was adopted by voice vote. The Rev. Yarbrough moved to amend the substitute resolution as amended. There being no further debate on the Yarbrough amendment, Bishop Rodman called for a vote. The amendment was adopted by voice vote. The Rev. Jim Bernacki moved an amendment. Ms. Strother Murray-Ndinga renewed her concern about grammar and suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified. The Rev. Hershey Mallette-Stephens restated the amendment. Mr. Jeremy Clos suggested how the wording of the amendment might be clarified. The Bishop asked Mr. Clos to stand by. There being no further debate on the amendment as restated, Bishop Rodman called for a vote. The amendment was adopted by voice vote. Mr. Clos renewed his concern in the form of a motion to amend. The Rev. Jamie Edwards suggested how the concern of Mr. Clos might be addressed. Mr. Clos consented to the suggestion and restated his amendment. Ms. Carlson rose to observe that the nature of the debate was not conducive to real-time interpretation into Spanish and moved that the matter be tabled until after lunch, by which time the wording of the resolution could be perfected and made available in both English and Spanish. The motion to table was adopted by voice vote.

Bishop Gomez addressed the Convention. Youth delegates led Convention in Noonday Prayer, during which the Secretary read the Necrology of the Diocese. Ms. Alexander said grace, and Convention recessed for lunch at 11:59 a.m.

Bishop Rodman called the Convention to order at 1:12 p.m. The Rev. Black moved to suspend the rules and place into consideration a new substitute for resolution 207.5 derived from conversation during lunch and incorporating the views and suggestions offered during debate in the morning. The motion was adopted by voice vote. Ms. Florimonte moved to amend the new substitute. Bishop Rodman asked for motion to extend the time limit for this resolution by five minutes. The motion was adopted by voice vote. Mr. Bill Furlow suggested how the wording of the new substitute might be improved; his suggestion received consent and was incorporated. A motion to call the question was adopted by voice vote. The amendment was adopted by voice vote. The new substitute as amended was adopted (Act 2022-6).

Bishop Rodman informed the Convention about the process to sell the Diocesan House property at 200 West Morgan Street, Raleigh. Youth delegates led Convention in physical exercise. The Very Rev. Dr. James Turrell, Dean of the School of Theology of the University of the South, addressed the Convention. The Rev. Mallette-Stephens addressed Convention about the Chapel at St. Augustine's University. The Rev. Spencer, the Rev. Miriam Saxon, and the Rev. Matt Addington and addressed Convention about Global Mission. Ms. Alexander, in her capacity of chair of the Deputation of the Diocese, addressed Convention about the 80th General Convention. The Rev. Elizabeth Marie Melchionna and participants in the Reimaging Curacies program addressed Convention about the program. On behalf of the Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry, Mr. McDuffie presented the 2022 Rev. Thomas Droppers Memorial Green Congregation Award to All Saints, Concord. Mr. Anello addressed the Convention about the Haiti Reforestation Partnership. Mr. McDuffie introduced a video about environmental ministry across the Diocese.

The Secretary moved that the 208th Annual Convention of the Diocese be held November 17-18, 2023 at The Benton in Winston-Salem. The motion was adopted by voice vote. Bishop Rodman expressed gratitude to all who worked to arrange and to conduct the Convention. A courtesy video was shown. Bishop Rodman made prayer requests and gave his episcopal blessing to Convention.

Its business having concluded, the 207th Annual Convention adjourned at 2:54 p.m.

ACTS OF THE 207TH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Note: References to the Canons have been conformed to the revised numbering scheme adopted by the Commission on Constitution and Canons in 2022.

Act 2022-1 (Substitute Resolution 207.1) On Property Management

The 207th Annual Convention enacts:

"Canon D-III.2, Section 8 is added as follows:

- "Section 8. Property Committee. (a) The Trustees may establish a subcommittee to be known as the Property Committee, which shall consist of not fewer than five nor more than seven enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of this Diocese elected by the Trustees upon nomination of the Bishop initially for a term of three years. Any vacancy on the Property Committee shall be filled by the Trustees for the unexpired term. A majority of the Property Committee shall control its actions.
- **(b)** The Property Committee shall provide guidance to the Ecclesiastical Authority, the Trustees, the Standing Committee, and Diocesan Council on matters concerning real property. Upon request of the Trustees, the Property Committee shall assist the Trustees in purchasing, selling, or leasing real property.
- (c) Upon an appropriate written resolution from Diocesan Council, the Ecclesiastical Authority may designate for Active Management any real property of the Diocese not held for the benefit of a parish, corporation, or mission that continues to exist and not needed for the operation of the Diocese. Subject to policies established by the Diocesan Council, the Property Committee shall maintain, market, and lease to tenants the properties under Active Management. Contracts with tenants shall be executed pursuant to Section 2(a)(3) of this Canon D-III. Proceeds from Active Management shall be placed into a Property Management Fund established by the Trustees. Expenses of Active Management shall be paid from the Property Management Fund or such other moneys as determined by Diocesan Council. Diocesan Council may direct the use of excess accruals in the Property Management Fund.
- (d) The Property Committee may engage, employ, and pay reasonable compensation to such attorneys, appraisers, real estate brokers, property managers, insurers, general contractors, and other providers of services as necessary to execute its responsibilities."

Canon D-III.3 Section 2, subparagraph (h) is rewritten as follows:

"(h) Make and preserve a full record of its acts and of the work of each of its departments and furnish to each annual Convention a full report of all its actions and all moneys

expended under its direction during the preceding year, including a report from each department of the Council with respect to the work done by such department, and a separate report on the State of the Church in the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina."

Canon D-III.3, Section 4 is rewritten as follows:

"Section 4. Departments. The Diocesan Council shall organize from its membership, supplemented as herein provided, a Department of Outreach and Justice Ministries, a Department of Christian Formation, Department of Youth and Young Adults, a Department of Congregational Support and Development, a Department of Finance and Administration, a Department of Planning, and such other departments as in its judgment may be necessary; and it shall provide the manner and means by which its departments shall be staffed and financed. From the Council membership the Bishop Diocesan shall appoint the members of each department and designate its chair. The chair of each chartered committee within a department shall be a member of the department. Subject to confirmation by the Council, the Bishop may appoint additional members to departments of the Council. Each department shall meet at least three times each year and report its activities to meetings of the Council. It shall receive and review budget requests from its chartered committees and submit its departmental budget to the Diocesan Council. The Bishop Diocesan, the Bishop Suffragan, and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be members of each department.

Subject to Council review and approval:

- (a) The Department of Outreach and Justice Ministries shall be responsible for the work of the Diocese with respect to those programs and activities that embody our ministry locally, nationally, and overseas;
- **(b)** The Department of Christian Formation shall oversee those bodies that provide program and resources for education and formation throughout the Diocese.
- **(c)** The Department of Youth and Young Adults shall oversee Diocesan programs for youth, ministry in higher education, and young adults.
- (d) The Department of Congregational Support and Development shall coordinate the work of those agencies that work directly with congregations.
- **(e)** The Department of Finance and Administration shall oversee the development and administration of the Diocesan budget and disbursement of grants; shall oversee the business, personnel, and property affairs of the Diocese, including the work of the Treasurer and the annual audit of the Diocese; and shall formulate and review administrative and personnel policies of the Diocese.
- **(f)** The Department of Planning shall use demographic information to inform the evolution of the program and organization of the Diocese, evaluate and propose changes to the program and organization of the Diocese, and develop the policy of the Diocese with respect to real property and propose real property transactions.

Canon D-III.3, Sections 6 and 7 are repealed in their entirety."

Act 2022-2 (Resolution 207.3) On Episcopal Elections

The 207th Annual Convention enacts:

"Article XII of the Constitution of the Diocese of North Carolina is amended as follows:

When a Bishop is to be elected the Convention shall vote by written ballot and separately by orders; and a concurrence on the same ballot of a majority of all the clergy entitled to vote in the Convention, whether present or not, and of a majority of all lay delegates authorized to be chosen as provided by canon, whether present or not, shall be necessary to an election."

Adopted upon First Reading. Second Reading will occur at the 208th Annual Convention.

Act 2022-3 (Resolution 207.4) On the President of the Standing Committee

The 207th Annual Convention enacts:

"A new Section 5 is added to Canon D-III.1 of the Diocese of North Carolina as follows:

If not otherwise entitled, the President of the Standing Committee will be entitled to seat and voice at all Conventions of this Diocese."

Act 2022-4 (Substitute Resolution 207.8) On Expansion of Creation Care Work and Engagement in the Communion Forest Initiative

The 207th Annual Convention enacts:

"Resolved, that the 207th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina calls for the expansion of creation care engagement by all congregations in the Diocese, including but not limited to engagement in the Communion Forest Initiative of the 2022 Lambeth Conference, in support of our Biblical call to care for God's creation (Gen. 2:15), our Mission Strategy priority of Creation Care and our recognition that each and every time we abuse or fail to protect God's creation, we are impacting our global neighbors, particularly the poorest and most vulnerable; and Be it further resolved that the Convention calls for the following actions to serve God's creation and by doing so, our global neighbors, so that all our communities and lives are protected from temperature extremes, wildfires, extreme rain events and flooding, and loss of plant and animal species:

- A. That the Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry survey congregations to determine their current and planned involvement in creation care initiatives and activities, so as to promote collaboration and mutual learning;
- B. That the Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry, working in partnership with Diocesan Formation staff and other Diocesan and non-Diocesan entities, provide resources, curricula, and concrete suggestions for congregational engagement in this work;
- C. That every congregation at some point during 2023:
 - a. Engage in the Communion Forest Initiative, which may include tree-planting, protection of meadows and grasslands, work to preserve wetlands, stream restoration, etc.;
 - b. Include in their Christian Formation programming information about the importance of creation care from Biblical, Baptismal Covenant, and Way of Love perspectives, recognizing that climate change impacts the poorest and most vulnerable populations throughout the world, who often live in the locations most vulnerable to climate change impacts or work in the jobs that put them most in danger from those impacts; and
 - c. Work collaboratively with other congregations and organizations, both locally and globally, on initiatives deemed particularly important in their communities.
- D. That the Chartered Committee on Global Mission engage with our Companion Dioceses of Botswana and Costa Rica, and that other congregations having global relationships, engage with their global partners, to learn of the impacts of climate change, to share how those Dioceses and congregations are addressing creation care, and to work together to address the global climate crisis; and
- E. That these Committees and congregations share their stories, insights, and photos through Diocesan and other avenues, to inform and inspire congregational and convocational efforts, including appropriate use of social media so that these efforts are more widely accessible to all generations and available to a wider audience.
- F. Acknowledging the devastating environmental impact on congregations and communities of color, that we seek partnership with those whose voices have not been heard and yet who are most impacted, in conversation and planning.
- G. That these Committees prepare a report on the outcomes of this resolution for presentation at the 208th Annual Convention."

Act 2022-5 (Substitute Resolution 207.7) On Reducing Gun Violence

The 207th Annual Convention enacts:

"Resolved, that in keeping with our baptismal covenant to respect the dignity of every human being, and to minimize the impact of gun violence, the 207th Annual Convention commits to urge state and federal legislators to sponsor and support the passage of laws to:

- 1. Require universal background checks for every gun purchase, including private sales, sales at gun shows, and ghost guns;
- 2. Ban possession of, sale of, transfer of and manufacture of semi-automatic, military-style assault weapons and high-capacity magazines for civilian use;

- 3. Require persons to provide evidence of reputable gun safety training prior to purchasing a gun;
- 4. Promote local and federal funding to research the causes and prevention of gun violence;
- 5. Promote funding for expansion of Community Violence Intervention Programs; and

Be it further resolved that the congregations of the Diocese of North Carolina be strongly urged to:

- 1. Include gun violence prevention regularly in conversations, educational sessions, and prayers;
- 2. Partner with local agencies and community groups to encourage gun dealers to adhere to all regulations and best safety practices, and share discovered resources with other congregations and convocations;
- 3. Ban the possession of guns on church property, excluding on-duty law enforcement officers who may be required to carry firearms;
- 4. Identify and support existing Community Violence Intervention Leaders and Programs; and

Be it further resolved that all members of the Diocese of North Carolina be encouraged to:

- 1. Commit to educating themselves on the issues of gun violence, gun violence prevention, and Community Violence Intervention;
- 2. Seek and share accurate information on gun violence and gun violence prevention in your community, particularly the danger of ghost guns;
- 3. Store guns and ammunition safely and securely at all times; and
- 4. Promote the importance of teaching and practicing gun safety."

Act 2022-6 (Substitute Resolution 207.5) On Equitable Racial Hiring Practices for Diocesan Positions

The 207th Annual Convention enacts:

"Resolved, that the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina continue the process to achieve racial equity in the hiring of Diocesan staff. This affirms the work of the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church in A130, the Resolution for the Development of Best Practices in Hiring and Developing Organizational Cultural Competencies. Specifically we affirm the "develop(ment) of model hiring, workplace, and Committee/Commission/Board practices that intentionally increase equitable hiring and access to leadership positions for People of Color and that promote healthy work environments within the church; and that each diocese and congregation be encouraged to actively engage in addressing the ways that white supremacy culture has shaped its own structures, policies, and practices and work toward deepening their cultural competency.

Be it further resolved that the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina contract with a firm with specialty in workplace diversity, equity, and inclusion to perform an outside racial audit of Diocesan hiring processes and policies to be provided to the Diocesan Council, Racial Justice and

Reconciliation Committee (RJRC) and 208th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina.

Be it further resolved that a working group be appointed by the diocesan bishop that seeks the wisdom and leadership of the Communities of Color within our church, professional associations, and external expert advisors as needed. This working group shall implement and facilitate the process of equitable racial recruiting, hiring, and nomination practices of persons to be appointed, hired, or elected to diocesan positions, including but not limited to, all Diocesan staff, including bishops, members of the Diocesan Council, Foundation and Trustees, and the Standing Committee. These bodies shall attend, at Diocesan expense, equity training to be provided by the firm that performs the racial audit. A preliminary report to the Racial Justice and Reconciliation Committee and a final formal report after their approval will be presented to the 208th Diocesan Convention. This report is to include next steps to implement this work. To address accountability and redress for the victims, this working group must report on the measures they have adopted related to the progress the diocese has made in upholding these practices. It reaffirms a strong commitment and underscores the importance of achieving diocesan ownership of equitable racial hiring or recruitment practices."

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP DIOCESAN

to the 207th Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina Friday, November 18, 2022 Benton Convention Center, Winston-Salem, NC

On the last day of the walkabouts here in the Diocese of North Carolina, which will be six years ago in February, I remember standing outside of one of the cabins at Camp Walter Johnson. We had just had a rousing morning of energizers, sharing stories and questions and answers with about 200 young people. I was having a conversation with one of the priests who was there to provide support for the event.

I remember the feeling of the warm sun on my neck and shoulders. I remember it was about 68 degrees. Did I mention it was February? I remember thinking to myself: "I could get used to this." But, as our conversation was ending, I remember one more thing.

I had this sensation, brief, but vivid, that my feet, right where I was standing, had begun to sink into the earth beneath me, ... slowly, almost imperceptibly, but enough that I was convinced, if I looked down, I would see my feet had disappeared below the surface of the place where I was standing, and the top soil would be covering my shoes. Of course when I looked down, I was just staring at my shoes.

At the time, I dismissed the sensation as some odd combination of sleep deprivation and low blood sugar. But later I began to wonder.

When I got back to New England, I spoke about this strange moment with a trusted friend. They described it as a kind of mystical experience, where the earth itself had reached up, grabbed hold of me, and transplanted me, here.

I love that image. I love it for a couple of reasons. The first is that when I was growing up, my mother had a bookmark that she used for a time, for whatever she was reading. And the bookmark had the words: "Bloom where you are planted" written on it. It was a simple message that reminded me that wherever we are, God has placed us there for a purpose. And our purpose, like the image of the trees by the river, from Ezekiel this morning, is to blossom, to grow and to bear fruit.

The other reason I love this image, is that the earth, in this mystical moment, has agency. This was a vivid experience of feeling called to a particular place. And the place itself took part in that discernment, that choice.

One of the truths I have learned from the tradition of our indigenous siblings is that the earth is not ours. Just the opposite: we belong to the earth. And not only do we belong to the earth, we are dependent on the earth.

This reality has come more sharply into focus as we all struggle with the impact of climate change. And to be clear, this is not a partisan statement of some liberal agenda, this is a reality that we are called to wrestle with, as followers of Jesus.

Last week I had the opportunity to hear Bishop Curry speak at the 100th Anniversary of our sister Diocese in Western North Carolina. One of the images from his address was actually a great tree, outside a village in Africa, which he saw on one of his trips there, when they were tracing the origins of the slave trade. The tree was a magnificent Banyan that has grown and spread over the decades and centuries, both beneath the surface, with its roots system, and above the surface, not only with the expanse of its branches, but with additional shoots that grow back to the earth and form smaller trunks as the tree grows and spreads from the main trunk.

The tree, for the people in the village, has been an image of life and of the promise of the abundance of the earth for generations. But that tree, today, is threatened by the encroaching Sahara Desert, which continues to grow and expand as a result of changes in the climate and in the ecosystem of sub-Saharan Africa.

For me, the image of this African Banyan is an icon of the changes that are happening across the globe, as we struggle to understand the collective impact of pollution, carbon proliferation, green house gases, and the consumption of fossil fuels, not just on the planet itself, but on all of us, who inhabit it.

But why are we talking about this here? What does this have to do with our faith, as followers of Jesus?

Our theme for this Convention is Care for God's Creation. We chose this theme because there seems to be a building consensus, across the church and across the global Anglican Communion, that this is a vital and essential part of the mission of the 21^{st} century church. The statement from the House of Bishops at our own Convention in Baltimore, as well the as initiative announced at Lambeth, which we learned more about last night – the Communion Forest – are signs of this growing consensus of concern.

Our keynote speaker, the Rt. Rev. Marc Andrus, Bishop of California, will speak to us, having just returned from the UN Conference on Creation Care in Egypt, where he served as Bishop Curry's representative, and head of the Episcopal Church's delegation.

But this work has been a focus in the life of our Diocese, since well before I began serving as your Bishop. And it was clear that Creation Care was a natural and essential choice, as one of our five priorities for our Mission Strategy. Our churches are engaged in composting and recycling, in carbon farming and in tree planting, solar panels have been installed and land is being used for community gardens. This is already a passion for North Carolina.

Yet, all of these current and compelling reasons to focus our energy around Creation Care, have their roots in the Biblical narrative. The readings and today's collect remind us that care for the earth began with the story of creation.

From Psalm 33: "By the word of the Lord were the heavens made, by the breath of his mouth all the heavenly hosts. He gathers up the waters of the ocean as in a water-skin, and stores up the depths of the sea. Let all the earth fear the Lord; let all who dwell in the world stand in awe ..."

The words of the Psalmist remind us that creation is the first witness to the power and glory of God. This is a universal human experience. Every one of us have had moments when we felt the presence and power of God in the beauty of the earth.

The colors this fall seemed particularly vibrant to me this year. I recall driving back from a Sunday visit at St. Alban's in Davidson and seeing a stand of trees along the highway in an array of reds, oranges, and yellows that took my breath away. And one tree among them that seemed to stand out and even to set itself apart from the others...

We have all felt awe and wonder in the beauty of what God has made.

But this is really only the beginning of our connection to the earth and to creation as God is showing us and teaching us. Consider this line from Paul's letter to the Romans: "...in hope that creation itself will be set free from its enslavement to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God."

There is a very powerful sense in which scripture asserts that our redemption and salvation in Jesus is connected to God's plan for the redemption and liberation of all of creation. In other words, as the earth goes, so we go. Our destinies are linked.

I remember the first time I tried to make this point in a sermon about 15 years ago now. I had just seen the documentary, "An Inconvenient Truth," which, as you recall, featured former Vice President Al Gore. I was inspired by the way Gore had redirected his life and energy after losing the election in 2000, and had reinvented himself by dedicating his passion and intelligence to awaken people to a global crisis and challenge that demanded our attention.

I thought I was simply spreading the word and sharing what I had learned about global warming and climate change. What a number people heard, however, was what they perceived as a partisan endorsement of someone else's political agenda. And they let me know that this was not the kind of message they expected to hear from the pulpit. I learned my lesson.

The more compelling case for why this matters and why we, as the church, should be engaged in this work does not some from any contemporary political figure. It comes from the Apostle Paul, who writes again "... the whole creation has been groaning together, as it suffers together the pains of labor, and not only the creation, but we ourselves ..."

What is good for the earth is good for us. And when the earth is suffering, we are suffering, too. Our destinies are linked because our life and wellbeing and the health of our planet are connected. We are interdependent.

But our gospel reading today offers the most compelling reason why Creation Care is part of our Mission as a church and the focus of our convention this year. According to Mark, it is part of the great commission from Jesus to all of us who are his disciples;

"Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation."

A little context is probably in order. In Mark's gospel the original version ended with Chapter 16 verse 8. After experiencing the Resurrection of Jesus, his disciples, and I quote, "... said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid."

Of course, if they had continued to be silent we would not know of Jesus resurrection, and none of us would be here today. So later editors added this addendum to the original ending, where Jesus upbraids them for their lack of faith and their unbelief and then goes on to charge them to share what they have witnessed not just with the whole world, but with the whole creation.

I find this fascinating, because Jesus' directive to us is to bear witness to the earth and to all creation that the hope of resurrection is not just for people, it is God's gift to all living things in, on and under the earth.

Here again our destinies are linked. Our hopes are connected and they are rooted in the resurrection promise.

The God who created the world, is also the God who revives the earth. The God who brought life out of death, is the God who renews the face of the earth each spring. The one who calls us to witness to the whole creation is one who made the creation the first witness to God's glory. We belong to the earth and the earth belongs to us. This is God's promise. This is God's design.

Jesus came that we might have life, that we might have abundant life. This is the witness of the earth each harvest season, with the abundant and bountiful produce that the earth provides. This is also the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand when all that is needed is provided, and then some. This is the gift of resurrection: that life wins, that love wins, that abundance is God's dream for us and for all creation – not scarcity

Scarcity has its roots in the word scared - in fear. Abundance has its roots in the resurrection, in liberation and freedom and creativity and new possibility – the opposite of fear. Abundance is the fruit of resurrection promise.

This is what we, as the church, are called to, and today, commissioned to bring to the work of Creation Care to the Global community that is engaged in this work. This is our contribution, as people of faith, to the efforts and advocacy on behalf of our planet.

Just last night, I learned of a new expression of this from Bishop Marc. It's an initiative called Holy Hikes, where a group of people hikes into an area park or preserve, or place of natural beauty or a place that has been reclaimed and restored. Sometimes they are accompanied by a ranger or other volunteer who teaches them about the land. Then, at some point on the hike they stop, and gather and celebrate the Eucharist in an outdoor service. There is no sermon. They listen to land, the take in the beauty that surrounds them and what they have learned about the history of the land, and then they break bread and share the cup.

The earth is witnessing to us of the gift of God's abundance!

We are already doing this in so many ways here, but the promise of resurrection abundance is that what we are doing now, is just the beginning. The possibilities are endless, the invitation and the commission is connected to Jesus resurrection, and the promise of new life, of abundant life.

But the earth is in labor, and so are we. So let's take the next step, together. Let's bloom where we have been planted. Let's let the Holy Spirit lead us and guide us to fresh expressions of care for the earth, care for one another and share, even more abundantly God's good news for the whole of creation. AMEN.

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Independent Auditors' Report

The Bishop and Diocesan Council Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina:

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying combined financial statements of Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina and the North Carolina Episcopal Church Foundation, Inc. (collectively the "Diocese" and each a nonprofit organization), which comprise the combined statements of financial position as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and the related combined statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the combined financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the combined financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Diocese as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

As more fully described in note 1(q) to the combined financial statements, we were unable to opine on the postretirement benefit obligation and change in postretirement plan obligation other than net periodic postretirement expense in the 2022 or 2021 combined financial statements because the Diocese elected to not have an actuarial valuation of this plan performed on an annual basis. Due to the limitations noted here, we were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence about the postretirement benefit obligation and change in postretirement plan obligation other than net periodic postretirement expense by other auditing procedures.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Combined Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Diocese and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Combined Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the combined financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of combined financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the combined financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Diocese's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the combined financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Combined Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the combined financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the combined financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the combined financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the combined financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Diocese's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the combined financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Diocese's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Report on Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedules of combining statements of financial position and combining statements of activities are presented for purposes of additional analysis of the 2022 combined financial statements rather than to present the financial position and change in net assets of the individual entities, and are not a required part of the combined financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the combined financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the combined financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the combined financial statements or to the combined financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, except for the effects on the schedules of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements as a whole.

Notes to Combined Financial Statements

(1) Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Organization

The Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina (the "Episcopal Diocese") is a nonprofit organization that serves as an administrative division of the Episcopal Church. It is a geographical area under the jurisdiction of a Bishop and is made up of parishes, missions, chaplaincies and other entities. The Diocese collects share revenue from member churches based on an equal flat rate for each church based on previous year's income. The staff offers support for local stewardship efforts, congregational development, outreach ministry, youth work, Christian education, and financial and business concerns. These combined financial statements do not include the individual activities of the parishes, missions, chaplaincies and other entities.

The North Carolina Episcopal Church Foundation, Inc. (the "Church Foundation") makes loans and grants to churches within the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina.

The Church Foundation is an organization of the Episcopal Diocese and is, therefore, combined with the Episcopal Diocese. The combined entities are collectively referred to as the "Diocese".

(b) Basis of Accounting

The combined financial statements of the Diocese have been prepared on the accrual basis in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP), except for the effects of the GAAP departure described in note 1(q).

(c) Basis of Combination

The combined financial statements include the accounts of the Episcopal Diocese and the Church Foundation. All significant intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated in the combination.

(d) Basis of Presentation

The Diocese presents its net assets and its support and revenue based upon the absence or existence of donor-imposed restrictions as follows:

<u>Net assets without donor restrictions</u> – net assets that are not restricted by donors or for which donor-imposed restrictions have expired.

<u>Net assets with donor restrictions</u> – net assets that contain donor-imposed time or purpose restrictions that have not currently been met or net assets that contain donor-imposed restrictions stipulating that amounts be maintained in perpetuity. The Diocese may expend part or all of the income earned according to donor stipulations.

(d) Basis of Presentation, Continued

Expenses are reported as decreases in net assets without donor restrictions. Expirations of net assets with donor restrictions (i.e., the stipulated time period has elapsed, or purpose was satisfied) are reported as net assets released from restrictions.

(e) Grants and Contributions

Grants and contributions are generally recorded when received or when an unconditional promise to give to the Diocese is received. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Diocese considers cash on hand, deposits in banks, and all highly liquid temporary cash instruments purchased with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

The Diocese holds cash receipt and disbursement records open for approximately one week after the end of the year in order to record year-end transactions with member churches which are postmarked as of December 31.

(g) Grants and Other Receivables

The Diocese periodically evaluates the balances in the various aging categories as well as the status of any significant past due accounts to determine the need for an allowance for doubtful accounts. Changes in the allowance are charged to the period in which management determines the change to be necessary.

When management determines that a receivable is uncollectible, the balance is removed from the receivables balance and is charged against the allowance. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited directly to revenues. The allowance for uncollectible accounts was \$5,000 as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Installment notes receivable represents funds advanced to churches within the Episcopal Diocese through the Church Foundation. Loans are stated at unpaid principal balances less an allowance for uncollectible amounts. Principal and interest on notes are due quarterly. These notes bear interest at 2%, with maturities through 2033. The loans are unsecured. The amount of the allowance for uncollectible amounts is based on management's evaluation of the collectability of specific notes. The allowance is increased by a provision for uncollectible accounts, which is charged to expense. No allowance for uncollectible accounts was deemed necessary as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

(h) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at cost at the date of acquisition, appraised value for assets for which original cost cannot be determined, or fair value at the date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation is computed over the estimated useful lives of the related assets using the straight-line method, generally as follows:

Buildings and building improvements	31.5 - 39 years
Leasehold improvements	15 years
Furniture and equipment	5 - 7 years
Land	nondepreciable

In accordance with the Diocese's policy, property and equipment are included in net assets without donor restrictions. The Diocese capitalizes expenditures for such items in excess of \$1,500, and lesser amounts are expensed.

The Diocese also holds title to mission properties and vacant churches. This arrangement is for canonical purposes rather than for actual utilization; therefore, the properties are not included in the accompanying combined financial statements.

(i) Investments

The Diocese carries investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities at their fair market values in the combined statements of financial position. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets in the accompanying combined statements of activities. Net unrealized gains and losses on investments, whose income is without donor restrictions or with donor restrictions as to use, is reported as without donor restrictions or with donor net assets as restricted by donor or by law.

The Diocese maintains investment accounts for its invested funds, which have been pooled with funds held for other Episcopal churches and institutions, under the direction of a professional investment manager. Realized and unrealized gains and losses from securities in the pooled investment fund account are allocated to the individual funds.

Expenses relating to investment income, including custodial fees and investment advisory fees, have been netted against investment income or custodian funds in the combined financial statements.

(j) Fair Value Measurements

Financial assets and liabilities required to be measured on a recurring basis (at least annually) are classified under a three-tier hierarchy. Fair value is the amount that would be received to sell an asset, or paid to settle a liability, in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

The classification of assets and liabilities within the hierarchy is based on whether inputs to the valuation methodology used for measurement are observable or unobservable. Observable inputs reflect market-derived or market-based information obtained from independent sources while unobservable inputs reflect estimates about market data. See note 4 for assets of the Diocese measured at fair value on a recurring basis.

Valuation techniques used to measure fair value are prioritized in the following hierarchy:

Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Diocese can access.

Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The Diocese diversifies its investments both by asset class and within asset classes. As a general practice, all investments of the Diocese are managed by external investment management firms and monitored by the Investment Committee. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used by the Diocese for assets measured at fair value:

• Common Stocks, certain Mutual Funds, and Money Market and Short-Term Reserve Funds: Valued at the closing price reported on the active markets on which the individual securities are traded (Level 1).

(j) Fair Value Measurements, Continued

• Alternative Investments: Alternative investments are composed of real estate funds (investments in real estate related assets). These investments are recorded at fair value based on relevant information available to the investment advisor such as type and nature of the investment, cost of the investment at the acquisition date, size of the investment, information from analysts, brokers, agents and market participants, and changes in market indicators. These investments are reported at their net asset values (NAV) as calculated by the investment managers.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Diocese believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

(k) Endowment Funds

The endowment funds of the Diocese consist of donor-restricted funds included in investments in the accompanying combined statements of financial position. The Diocese accounts for the endowment funds in accordance with the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) and GAAP.

The Diocese has interpreted UPMIFA as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Diocese retains in perpetuity (a) the original value of gifts donated to the endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the endowment, and (c) accumulations to the endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the funds. The remaining portion of the amounts not retained in perpetuity are appropriated for expenditure by the Diocese in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA. In accordance with UPMIFA, the Diocese considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purposes of the donor-restricted endowment funds, (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Diocese, and (7) the investment policies of the Diocese.

(k) Endowment Funds, Continued

Funds with Deficiencies. From time to time, the fair value of the assets associated with the donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Diocese to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with GAAP, deficiencies of this nature are reported in net assets with donor restrictions. There were no endowment fund deficiencies as of December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters, and Strategies. The Diocese has adopted investment and spending policies, approved by the Diocesan Council, for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment funds while also maintaining the purchasing power of those endowment assets over the long-term. Accordingly, the investment process seeks to achieve a rate of return, including investment income as well as capital appreciation, which exceeds the annual distribution with acceptable levels of risk. Endowment assets are invested in a well-diversified asset mix that is intended to result in a consistent rate of return that has sufficient liquidity to make an annual distribution of 4%, while growing the fund, if possible. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment funds; investment assets and allocation between asset classes, and strategies are managed to not expose the funds to unacceptable levels of risk.

Spending Policy. The Diocese has a policy of appropriating for distribution each year 4% of its endowment fund's average fair value of the prior rolling three-year average through September 30th of the preceding fiscal year in which the distribution is planned. In establishing this policy, the Diocese considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the endowment funds, a portion of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor restrictions, and the possible effect of inflation. The Diocese expects the current spending policy to allow its endowment funds to grow at a rate consistent with the Diocese's objective to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets as well as to provide additional growth through investment return.

(1) Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue consists of share amounts received related to a future period, which will be recognized as revenue in the following year.

(m) Custodian Funds

Custodian funds represent resources received on behalf of other organizations by the Diocese. These funds do not represent revenues and expenditures which are under Diocesan control. However, the Diocese is responsible for the custody of these funds until such funds have been used.

(m) Custodian Funds, Continued

Also, the Diocese acts as delegate agent for various groups receiving grants. As delegate agent, the Diocese can be held responsible for the grant if the recipient group does not comply with all grant requirements.

(n) Vacation Pay and Sick Leave

The Diocese's policy provides for a maximum accumulation of unused vacation leave of 34 days, depending on an employee's years of service, which can be carried forward at the end of each year, or for which an employee can be paid upon termination of employment with the Diocese.

The Diocese records the cost of sick leave when taken and paid rather than when the leave is earned. The maximum allowance accumulation of sick leave is 65 days. However, employees are not compensated for any unused sick leave upon termination of employment.

(o) Use of Estimates

The preparation of combined financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

(p) Income Tax Status

The Episcopal Diocese and the Church Foundation are exempt from income taxes under Section 501(a) as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, income tax expense is limited to activities that are deemed by the Internal Revenue Service to be unrelated to their exempt purpose. Each entity's primary tax positions relate to its status as a not-for-profit entity exempt from income taxes and classification of activities related to its exempt purpose. Each entity is not required to file a federal exempt organization tax return (Form 990) annually to retain its exempt status. However, the Diocese would be required to file an exempt organization business income tax return (federal and state) for any unrelated business income.

(q) Postretirement Benefit Obligation

Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pension. At retirement, Diocesan clergy and certain other employees who were employed as of June 30, 2002 receive lifetime family health insurance coverage if they have served full time continuously for their last ten years of service and remain enrolled in the plan. For employees retiring after attaining age 65, the Diocese will pay the Medicare supplement that would be paid if a person were age 65 and covered by Medicare. In the event retirement is necessary before age 65 as a result of medical disability, the Diocese will pay the full amount of insurance premiums until age 65 at which time it will pay the Medicare supplement. All spouses of deceased clergy who were already enrolled in the health coverage under Diocesan health and dental coverage can continue coverage at no cost to the spouse unless they remarry.

(q) Postretirement Benefit Obligation, Continued

GAAP requires an employer that sponsors a defined benefit postretirement plan to report the current economic status (the overfunded or underfunded status) of the plan in its statement of financial position, to measure the plan assets and plan obligations as of the statement of financial position date, and to include enhanced disclosures about the plan. Management of the Diocese elected to not have an actuarial valuation of this plan performed from 2014 to 2020. As such, the postretirement benefit obligation for that time period and the change in the postretirement plan obligation other than net periodic postretirement expense were estimated and/or adjusted based on the Diocese's actuarial valuation performed as of December 31, 2013. This treatment was a GAAP departure during that time period.

Management of the Diocese elected to have an actuarial valuation of this plan performed for the year ended December 31, 2021. The accrued post-retirement benefit obligation of the Diocese's post-retirement welfare plan was \$4,613,497 as of December 31, 2021.

Management of the Diocese elected to not have an actuarial valuation of this plan performed in 2022. As such, the postretirement benefit obligation as of December 31, 2022 and the change in the postretirement plan obligation other than net periodic postretirement expense for 2022 are estimated and/or adjusted based on the Diocese's actuarial valuation performed as of December 31, 2021. This treatment was a GAAP departure in 2022.

Furthermore, the enhanced disclosures required by GAAP are not available for disclosure for 2022. Disclosure of this information is also required to conform to GAAP. The effects of these departures from GAAP on the combined financial statements have not been determined.

The accrued post-retirement benefit obligation of the Diocese's post-retirement welfare plan was estimated to be \$4,554,838 of December 31, 2022, using actuarial assumptions from the December 31, 2021 actuarial valuation.

(r) Functional Allocation of Expenses

Management estimates the costs of providing the various programs and other activities on a functional basis in the combined statements of activities. The combined statements of functional expenses present the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. Expenditures are allocated to programs or supporting services by management based on what is considered to be the best available objective criteria, such as allocation of time of relevant personnel.

(s) Adoption of New Accounting Standard

The Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") has issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2020-07, *Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets (ASC 958)*. This ASU enhances presentation and disclosure requirements for gifts-in-kind, but does not change the recognition and measurement requirements for such contributions. ASU 2020-07 is effective as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022. There were no changes to net assets or the change in net assets as previously reported as a result of the adoption of this ASU.

(2) <u>Information Regarding Liquidity and Availability of Resources</u>

The Diocese regularly monitors the availability of resources required to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments. For purposes of analyzing resources available to meet general expenditures over a 12-month period, the Diocese considers all expenditures related to its ongoing activities, as well as the conduct of services undertaken to support those activities, to be general expenditures.

The Diocese's financial assets as of December 31, 2022 and 2021 consist of cash, investments, and accounts receivable, reduced by appropriated funds, board designated, custodian and donor restricted funds, resulting in net financial assets, all of which are available to meet general expenditures within one year of the financial statement date, as follows:

(3) Concentrations of Credit and Market Risk

Financial instruments that potentially expose the Diocese to concentrations of credit and market risk consist primarily of cash, cash equivalents, receivables and investments.

The Diocese maintains its deposited cash balances in several financial institutions, and amounts held may at times exceed federally insured limits of \$250,000. The Diocese has not experienced any losses on these accounts. The Diocese's investments are mostly maintained in a pooled investment fund held by various custodians. This pooled investment portfolio is diversified among issuers. Receivables are discussed in note 1(g).

Board designated net assets totaling \$10,325,609 and \$11,954,088 as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively, may only be used for the purposes expressly assigned as approved by individual Committee boards.

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Diocese relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Diocese targets a diversified asset allocation for its entire investment portfolio that places an emphasis on equity-based and fixed income investments and cash equivalents to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints. The Committee boards have elected to allow the capital growth and investment income of the Board designated net assets to continue to accumulate within these net assets.

(7) Postretirement Benefit Obligation

The Diocese has a non-contributory pension plan which covers substantially all clergy and lay employees. Total costs to the Diocese amounted to \$308,660 and \$173,080 for 2022 and 2021, respectively. The plan is comprised of individual contracts with The Church Pension Fund.

As described in footnote 1(q), management elected not to have an actuarial valuation performed for the year ended December 31, 2022, but did have an actuarial valuation performed for the year ended December 31, 2021.

The expected long-term rate of return on plan assets assumption of 2.75% for 2021 was selected using an approach set forth by the Actuarial Standards Board. Based on the Diocese's investment allocation for the pension plan in effect as of the beginning of each fiscal year, a best estimate range was determined for both the real rate of return (net of inflation and investment expense) and for inflation based on a long-term historical return on the applicable asset classes.

As of December 31, 2021, the accumulated benefit obligation was \$4,613,497. Accumulated benefit obligation represents the actuarial present value of benefits owed for service to date if the employees continue in employment until normal retirement age at current wage rates, but since June 30, 2002, this amount now equals the projected benefit obligation due to the curtailment of the pension plan.

(9) Paycheck Protection Program

In April 2020, the Diocese received a loan from the Small Business Administration under the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP"), which authorizes forgivable loans to small businesses to pay their employees during the COVID-19 crisis (see note 10). This loan, in the amount of \$514,290, was forgiven when loan proceeds were used for payroll and certain other allowed costs over the 24-week period, and certain other conditions were met. The loan accrued interest at 1% and was due in 2 years from origination if not forgiven.

The Diocese met the eligibility criteria of the loan (which occurs when the Diocese is legally released from being the loan's primary obligor). During December 31, 2021, the remaining \$505,201 of income under this program was recognized as other income.

(10) Impact of COVID-19

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared the global novel coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) outbreak a pandemic. The extent of COVID-19's effect on the Diocese's operational and financial performance will depend on future developments, including the duration, spread and intensity of the pandemic, all of which are uncertain and difficult to predict considering the rapidly evolving landscape. As a result, it is not currently possible to ascertain the overall impact of COVID-19 on the Diocese's operations.

(11) Subsequent Events

REPORTS TO CONVENTION

DIOCESAN COUNCIL

2022 Highlighted Actions of Council

- Feb: A joint retreat of the Standing Committee and Diocesan Council was held on **February 6th.** Progress on the development of the Mission Strategy (Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing; Congregational Vitality; Formation; Collaborations & Partnerships; Creation Care) was the focus of this retreat and continues to be the focus of the work of the diocese. On February 7th, Diocesan Council conducted the first business meeting of 2022. The budget process was reviewed, department assignments finalized, and the effects of the continuing global pandemic throughout the diocese were discussed. Council voted to reinstate the pre-pandemic policy that churches with annual operating income of \$500,000-\$1,000,000 must have their financial results reviewed by a CPA (or, if there has been a change in leadership, must have a CPA perform a full audit). Both meetings were conducted via Zoom. February 24th Council met once again via Zoom. Prayers were offered for the people of the Ukraine. A new structure for congregational support was announced with each parish assigned one of 7-point people that includes the bishops. Bishop Anne announced she would be retiring at the end of the year and plans for calling an assistant bishop were discussed. Fundraising efforts for St. Michael's and All Angels in Charlotte are underway. The process for discussing plans for 200 West Morgan Street is in place. A working group for diocesan property management was established. Groups participating in the Mission Founders group accepted recommendations. Constitution and Canons is looking at restructuring the canons without changing the text.
- Mar: On March 24th, Council held the first hybrid meeting since the beginning of the pandemic with some members meeting in person at Diocesan House and some joining remotely via Zoom. Bishop Rodman was visiting our companion diocese in Costa Rica. Closing dates for St. Christopher's Garner and St. Mark's Raleigh were announced. Conversation concerning clergy compensation and health insurance continue. NC Episcopal Church Foundation made a long-term commitment to the Sustainability Fund. The Rev. Kathy Walker will facilitate the finalization of the Sustainability Fund.
- Apr: Celebration for the 2nd hybrid meeting of Council on **April 21**st some members gathering at St. Paul's Winston-Salem and others joining via Zoom. Progress toward the return to pre-pandemic normalcy was a blessing. Reports from many parishes returning to in-person worship for Easter brought new energy and enthusiasm with cautious optimism. Council voted to adopt the revised charter for the Chartered Committee on Remuneration and Insurance as presented.
- May: Council rejoiced at the 1st in-person only meeting in two years on May 19th. We gathered at Galilee Ministries in Charlotte where we worshiped and toured the facility. It was announced that Creation Care will be the theme of our 207th Diocesan Convention in November. Both bishops will travel to Lambeth. Groundbreaking for St. Michael's and All Angels Charlotte is planned for May 21st. Plans for this year's HUGS camp are moving forward with much excitement. There was a presentation from the Chartered Committee on Remuneration and Insurance for consideration on how best to move

forward to address insurance coverage for clergy, active and retired, and lay employees. Council asked the committee to look at some educational programs and incentives that could encourage preventative care particularly among the clergy. Fair share % for 2023 will remain at 10.65. The Mission Strategy objectives continue to be the focus throughout the work in the diocese. The day concluded by visiting Chapel Christ the King to see the process being pursued to address the long-standing issues there with strategic plans to revision its place in their vital community.

- June: A hybrid meeting was held **June 30th** with some members at Diocesan House and some joining via Zoom. A Mission Strategy Coordinating Committee is being formed with the goal of hiring a Mission Strategy Coordinator. Council approved the recommendation to establish new processes for Property Planning and Management in the diocese. Process for submitting requests and information toward a 2023 budget were stressed. Work at All Saints' Warrenton continues. Council approved the consideration of the sale of 200 West Morgan Street. Dates to present the 2023 proposed Mission and Ministry budget were established. The lease of the Community Life Center at St. Mark's Raleigh was approved. It was resolved that the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount may postpone until 2023 the full external audit of 2021 required by diocesan policy without impact to its status under Rule III or the Canons; provided the Church completes the long-form self-audit of 2021 by September 1, 2022. That stipulation was not met.
- Aug: Council met on August 18th at All Saints Roanoke Rapids. It was announced that The Rt. Rev. Jennifer Brooke-Davidson will join the Diocese as Assistant Bishop in November 2022. Fair Share Appeal recommendations were reviewed and approved as recommended. Recommendations for disbursement from the Sustainability Fund for 2023 were approved with proviso for oversight. There was an in-depth presentation and discussion of the 2023 Mission and Ministry budget and how to reconcile a \$240K balance difference. This discussion included provisions for additional staff positions to implement the Mission Strategy. Council voted to recommend it is in the best interests of the Diocese for the Trustees of the Diocese to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the vestry of Calvary Church, Wadesboro ("Wadesboro") whereby Wadesboro assumes financial and operational responsibility for the property of All Souls Church, Ansonville, pending approval of the Standing Committee.
- Sept: Diocesan House was the site of the **September 15th** meeting. A Mission & Ministry budget discussion was led by Maria Gillespie, CFO. A 5% increase of clergy minimum salary in 2023 was approved with a recommendation that parishes paying above minimum entertain a 5% increase also. A similar increase was approved for Diocesan staff. Council voted to present the budget as adjusted to the Diocese during October. The first offer for 200 West Morgan Street has been received. Discussion on eventual relocation of the Archives as well as options for office space for the staff was had. The Mission Strategy Coordinating Committee has had their initial meeting and is working on a job description for the Coordinator position. Council was encouraged to recruit interested individuals to run for the new term on Council. Council approved moving forward the resolution on Property Management and the Planning Department to

- Constitution and Canons for presentation to the 207th Convention. The new Safe Church promulgated by The Episcopal Church will be reviewed in October. Support was given to move forward a resolution at Convention to reduce the age for Convocational youth delegates from 16 to 14.
- Oct: Council met in person on October 20th at St. Andrew's Haw River. Bishop Rodman introduced Catherine Massey as the Canon to the Bishop. The final 2023 Mission and Ministry budget was adopted for submission to Convention. The position for Mission Strategy Coordinator has been posted. The recommendations for Rule III waivers were approved. The new Safe Church program recommendations were presented to Council by Amy Campbell. A resolution acknowledging it is in the best interest of the Diocese to sell the St. Christopher's Garner property was approved and the process will be recommended to the Trustees for action. Housing allowance for Bishop Brooke-Davison was approved.

- Sacred Ground This video and discussion group around Race, Reckoning and Reconciliation is 10 biweekly, 90-minute sessions. Readings, two core books, and film and spiritual practices. The two core books for the class are "Waking Up White" by Debby Irving and "Jesus and the Disinherited" by Howard Thurman.
- Lay Preaching Training Initiative This lay preaching program, a two-year course of reading, writing, preaching, and attending classes in preparation for certification (at the bishop's discretion) as a Licensed Lay Preacher.

Children, Youth, Family

- The programmatic offerings plus support to local parishes dealing with all levels of issues related to pandemic protocols are too many to number. Suffice it to say the Children, Youth, and Family Department has done phenomenal work this year.
- **HUGS Camp** was held in person this summer at Haw River State Park after being virtual the past two years. This summer was a success on many levels as we had 35 new buddy/helpers and 36 campers. Our theme was Embracing our Feelings.
- TELL ME THE TRUTH ABOUT RACISM was a program offered to Formation and Youth Leaders. This program offers the story about the lie that has caused racism that tries to hide in plain sight. The story is told in six parts that frames the history of racism through the lens of our faith beginning with the creation of the world and ending with the world as it is today. This story is meant for children as young as 5 years old and offers a lot to adults as well.

Campus and Young Adult Ministry

- The Committee for Campus and Young Adult Ministry operates in vital mission fields for the church, where young people navigating a world in flux can find community and a sense of home created by Christ's love and our commitment to living out our Gospel calling.
- As the diocese discusses reparations, the CCYAM believes that well-funded ministries to HBCUs (NC A&T being the largest HBCU, and St. Augustine's being uniquely an Episcopal HBCU) should be a flagship priority.
- Many young adults in the diocese have fond memories at their time spent at diocesan youth events or campus ministry events. They are searching for that same level of community as young adults. This might be a perfect pilot event for CCYAM to lead the way by creating a network of young adult programs that will allow for future events geared toward this community around lay leadership, discernment, and resource sharing.
- The CCYAM is grateful for this diocese's sustained investment in campus and young adult ministries. These communities are spiritual homes for young people and serve in a sense as laboratories for intensive discernment for the future of the church.

Congregational Support and Development

- The Congregational Support and Development Department supports the development of resources to encourage the vitality of congregations of all sizes.
- During 2022, we have been particularly aware that all congregations have experienced change and transitions and are feeling vulnerable and unstable. We have had extensive

conversations with the Canons and Missioners on the Diocesan staff who provide support to congregations so that we have a better understanding of how to advocate for Diocesan strategies and funding that can allow growth and development to come from this time of vulnerability.

- The Department is particularly supportive of strategies such as a strong Mutual Ministry Review process for each congregation, development and enhancement of lay ministry and lay leadership, and targeted support for historically Black and Hispanic congregations who have been poorly resourced in the past.
- Our Department is anticipating taking a lead role toward the Mission Strategy Goal "congregational Vitality."

Finance and Administration

- This Department works with and supports the CFO of the Diocese.
- Reviewed the benefits packages for staff and clergy.
- Worked on the Salary and Compensation study, making a presentation to Council during the Mission and Ministry budget deliberations.

Outreach and Justice

- The Outreach and Justice Department continued its work of supporting and reporting on the activities of the 10 ministries that receive Diocesan funds through the budget process, ranging from the Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry to Refugee Ministries.
- Particular notice should be given to the work of the Chartered Committee on Global Mission, which convened a gathering of over 30 persons interested in global mission work at Church of the Holy Family in April, with the Rev. Titus Presler, at that time Chairman of the Global Episcopal Mission Network, as keynoter, and followed up by starting a series of quarterly, truly global, Bible studies via Zoom.
- We continue to commend the Augustine Literacy Project "mothership" in Chapel Hill for their outstanding work during the pandemic, nimbly switching to on-line tutoring (and now nimbly switching back to in-person work), at the same time training 50 new ALP tutors.

State of the Church

- The Department of State of the Church began the year by reviewing the narratives of all parishes in their parochial reports. It allowed us to measure the vitality and resiliency of our congregations in a post-COVID-19 world. We continue to be joyfully optimistic about the future of our diocese, understanding that shepherding on different levels will be necessary as we continue to move forward.
- The Department of State of the Church began a transition in mid-2022 to evolve into the Department of Planning. This involves the rewriting of Canon D-III.3, Section 4 (Canon 15, Section 4) which is presented to Convention in Resolution 207.1 for approval. Diocesan Council approved this transition on 15 September 2022 at their regular monthly meeting.

• In accordance with our transition, we began to work with the Historical Properties Commission of the diocese, the CFO and the Secretary of the diocese, along with the head of the Property Committee, to discern recommendations for the best use of certain properties. We also encouraged the joining of All Souls in Ansonville, NC with Calvary Wadesboro, who will manage and maintain All Souls.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE 207TH CONVENTION October 1, 2021 – September 30, 2022

Statement of Purpose

The mission and purpose of the Standing Committee is to interview candidates for the priesthood and diaconate, consider all consents required in relation to Episcopal elections, oversee real estate matters, and act as a Council of Advice to the Bishop Diocesan. In recent years, the Standing Committee seriously examined the impact of white supremacy on real estate matters and the ordination process. This Standing Committee spent significant time in prayer, spiritual formation, continued work on racial reckoning (especially how our structures and power dynamics influence the ordination process and property matters), and relationship building during regularly and specially scheduled meetings.

What work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese during the past 15 months?

The Standing Committee met regularly, the third Monday of each month via Zoom, with one in person meeting in August 2022. There was no meeting in July 2022.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION

Each meeting of the Standing Committee includes Spiritual Formation. A period of twenty minutes is led by members in turn, and is often a question put to the group, such as "What controls our thoughts, love or fear?" or "What is a quality you have inherited from one of your spiritual ancestors?"

BECOMING BELOVED COMMUNITY/RACIAL RECONCILIATION

The Standing Committee has committed to address systemic racism within the committee and the diocese during 2022. The work focused on applying the ground work and training the standing committee received in 2019 and 2020 to extricating white supremacy in real estate transactions and the ordination process. The committee continued the work in its regular meetings by consideration of white supremacy in our regular business and discussions, i.e., property matters, the ordination process, and inequitable access to resources. We employed deep listening and attention to the history of the Diocese of North Carolina, especially its bodies with financial and approval power, and its participation in actions and policies which reinforced white supremacy. A specific case which focused our discussions is the history of St. Michael and All Angels, Charlotte. Our conversations were deep and we were not always in agreement, but the result was the development of a history of that congregation and its influence on the continued deepening of our conversations and commitment.

In practice, we are committed to accessibility and diversity by holding our in person meetings at locations where our members live and worship. Our membership includes people who live and/or worship in each of the seven convocations of the Diocese. Our members are also diverse in culture, ethnicity, race, and age.

OTHER ACTIONS

November 7, 2021

The Standing Committee presented a cash gift donated by its members to Iglesia El Buen Pastor in memory of former Standing Committee Member the Rev. Habacuc Ramos Huerta.

February 6-7, 2022

The Standing Committee participated in a joint retreat with the Diocese of North Carolina Diocesan Council.

February 21, 2022

The Rev. Nancy Cox (2024) is also a member of the Commission on Ministry, Priesthood, and she presented the journey of ordination. This information was a great help to members as they review and interview candidates for the priesthood.

March 21, 2022

The Rev. Dr. Cathy Deats reported on a meeting with Constitution and Canons Committee, Chairman The Rev. John Talk. The purpose of the meeting was to explore opportunities for mission which do not qualify as missions or parishes under the current canons. Following the meeting, it was determined that mission efforts may be affiliated with the Diocese without being members of Convention.

June 20, 2022

The Standing Committee received a report on the Mission Strategy Committee. The Rev. Dr. Rhonda Lee's paper was made available to Standing Committee members (*The Diocese of North Carolina History of Institutional Racism*). They also received a report on the Diocesan House Group from Mr. Marcus Clarke, who is a member of that committee.

September 19, 2022

Mr. Marcus Clarke was featured in a video presentation created to encourage nominations for the election of Standing Committee members for the 2023 – 2025 term.

The Rev. Pamela Haynes presented a proposal for Mental Health Training for clergy and lay leaders in the Diocese. The training would be voluntary and paid for by the Diocese. The proposal was addressed to the Bishop and Diocesan Council.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina is very concerned about the well-documented regional crisis in the mental health of our people, which has been exacerbated by the Covid-19 pandemic. North Carolina residents, adults and youth alike, demonstrate higher incidence of anxiety and/or depressive disorders than the national average. Clergy and lay leadership in parishes and missions around the Diocese are experiencing this in their worshiping communities, and yet many do not have the training to identify problems and symptoms before moments of crisis erupt. We believe the Diocese needs to offer and fund training to clergy and lay leadership immediately. Such training at minimum would offer leaders skills in how to learn signs and symptoms to common mental health challenges; to lead in such ways as to reduce the stigma associated with mental health issues; and to have knowledge of resources available for assistance. We request that such training be offered as soon as possible, and that going forward, this be part of the programmatic offering of the Diocese to its parish and mission leadership, both clergy and lay.

They are particularly so to me, since I had the privilege of serving as Ed's vice chancellor and learning "at his knee" for most of those fifteen years. I will always remain grateful for the example Ed set, together with that of his precedessors Alfred L. Purrington, III, Joseph Blount Cheshire V, and Alfred L. Purrington, Jr.

When I acceded to Bishop Rodman's request that I succeed Ed, I confessed to him some concern that my duties as Dean of the University of North Carolina School of Law would infringe on my time to the degree that I would be a poor Chancellor. I am happy to say that the issues I have dealt with have been relatively straightforward, so that thus far there is on my part no cause for concern. (I am particularly grateful that I have largely been spared dealing with the COVID related issues that Ed and many of you were forced to deal with in 2020 and the earlier part of 2021.) If you are attempting to reach me to discuss a Diocesan, parish or mission legal matter, please email me at martin92@unc.edu. You may hear from my assistant, Jill Davis, with a request that we set up a call or Zoom session. If the matter is urgent, please do not hesitate to say so.

Here are a few of the matters that have required my attention:

BSA Bankruptcy. The Boy Scouts of America ("BSA") filed for bankruptcy protection during the latter part of 2020 in order to deal with the host of abuse claims made against it. Since churches are so frequently involved with either sponsoring a boy scout troop or hosting scout meetings, churches and the denominations they are members of quickly became active in the bankruptcy. The Diocese retained A. Lee Hogewood, III (Christ Church, Raleigh), Managing Partner of the Raleigh office of the K&L Gates law firm, to assist the Diocese with respect to BSA bankruptcy matters. Lee and his most capable colleague, Emily Mather, have continued to monitor activity in the BSA bankruptcy case and have provided helpful information to the Diocese and its churches. We are hopeful that case will resolve soon with an agreed plan of reorganization, although there are likely to be appeals that will go on for some additional time.

Real Estate Matters. The Diocese most often gets involved with real estate issues because the Diocesan Trustees are the owners of the real estate occupied by mission churches or real estate on which now closed churches are located. Those issues might involve leases, easements, encumbrances or outright conveyance. That work has been made vastly easier through the good services and availability of C. Steven Mason (Christ Church, Raleigh) of the Smith Anderson law firm in Raleigh. Steve is a corporate and real estate attorney and Chairman of the Trustees. Vice Chancellor Chip Howes (Christ Church, Raleigh) and a member of LongLeaf Law Partners continues to work closely with the Standing Committee and its approval of parish real estate conveyances as required by Canon 23.

Matters Involving Closing Parishes and Missions. The Diocese has had a small number of parishes and missions that have been in the process of closing, or have recently closed. Necessarily these events give rise to issues relating to various forms of real and personal

property that had been held and used at the parish or mission level, but must now be entrusted to the Diocese. I have worked closely with Bishop Rodman and Steve Mason on several of these situations.

Employment Matters. These arose this year either as matters involving employment by the Diocese or in assisting the Diocese in matters involving the separation of parish employees and their parishes.

Parish and Mission Bylaws. Canons 20 and 22 both contain provisions allowing the mission or parish meeting to adopt bylaws governing vestry elections and the conduct of those meetings. Those canons also provide that the mission or parish vestry can adopt bylaws governing the conduct of vestry meetings and the other business of the church. However, those bylaws must be submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority who, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, has the authority to disapprove any bylaw that is inconsistent with Constitution or Canons of the Diocese or The Episcopal Church. The Bishop naturally refers any church bylaws received by him to me for review and comment. This year I have reviewed submitted bylaws or provided bylaw guidance to approximately half a dozen churches.

Other Matters. There are other matters which I have been involved with. These involve generally either actual or threatened litigation. In the interests of confidentiality, it would be inappropriate for me to publish the details of these matters. Rest assured though that I do not operate alone with respect to these things. Bishop Rodman is usually involved in the ongoing aspects of them as well as their conclusion.

I have greatly enjoyed my first year of service to the Diocese as chancellor. It has been a privilege to work with Bishops Sam and Anne and to witness the extraordinary dedication of the Diocesan House staff, as well as the exemplary voluntary service of Chuck Till and Martha Alexander.

TRUSTEES

Statement of Purpose

The trustees discharge the duties set out in Canon 10.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

The trustees hold up to four meetings during the calendar year. In December of each year, the trustees and representatives of the investment committee meet with the investment manager for the Common Trust Fund to review the performance of the Fund. The trustees also act on various property matters, including sales and leases of property.

What are your plans for the coming year?

The trustees deal with property matters as they arise. It is anticipated that the possible sale of the Diocesan House property in downtown Raleigh will be one such matter.

SECRETARY OF CONVENTION

The Secretary of Convention, a constitutional officer whose duties are prescribed by Canon D-II.1, is elected each year by the Annual Convention upon nomination of the Bishop. The Secretary has two principal duties: (1) to organize and to publicize the annual and special conventions of the Diocese and to publish a journal of their proceedings, and (2) to serve as secretary of Diocesan Council.

Other duties include receiving and processing applications for admission of congregations, soliciting and receiving reports of diocesan institutions, and receiving and evaluating the annual parochial reports of all parishes and missions. In addition, the Secretary is responsible under the constitution and canons of The Episcopal Church for giving formal notice to the Convention of the Diocese when amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Episcopal Church or to the Book of Common Prayer, for reporting on the actions of the Diocese in response to acts of General Convention, and for certifying elections by the Diocese of bishops and of deputies to General Convention.

Actions of the 206th Annual Convention

I compiled the Acts of the 206th Annual Convention of the Diocese, communicated actions of the Convention to the necessary parties, and with the assistance of the Communications staff of the Diocese I published the Journal of the 206th Annual Convention. I published the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese and the Rules of Order of Convention as amended by the 206th Annual Convention and as corrected by the Commission on Constitution and Canons; see Exhibits A and B hereto.

Diocesan Council

As secretary of Diocesan Council, I scheduled, prepared the agenda, and arranged logistics for ten meetings since the 206th Annual Convention. I attended and wrote minutes for nine of these meetings. I notified various persons and Diocesan entities of the actions of Council and wrote summaries of actions for the website of the Diocese. I maintained consolidated electronic minutes of Council from 2011 onward and answered occasional inquiries pertaining thereto.

Ex-officio Meetings

Being an ex-officio member of the Commission on Constitution and Canons and the Chartered Committee on History and Archives, I participated in their meetings during 2022.

The Episcopal Church

I forwarded the Journal of the 206th Annual Convention to the Archives of The Episcopal Church. I notified the Office of the General Convention of the deputation from the Diocese to the 80th General Convention and the necrology of prior Deputies.

Organizing of the 207th Annual Convention

I gave formal notices of the 207th Annual Convention, published various forms, prepared the rolls of voting clergy and lay delegates, configured election ballots in Election Runner and assigned voter IDs to voting clergy and lay delegates, served as Secretary for the Committee on Dispatch of Business which met six times in 2022, solicited and received proposed resolutions, solicited and

received nominations, and tracked compliance of parishes and missions with the Constitution, Canons, and Rules of Order of the Diocese with respect to parochial reports, audits, and payment of Fair Share. I also responded to numerous inquiries from parishes and missions, members of the clergy, senior wardens, lay delegates, and Deans of Convocations on matters related to Convention.

Canon D-IV.4 and Rule III Reports

I communicated with 33 churches about incomplete, late, or missing parochial reports, audits, and payments of Fair Share. See Exhibit C hereto. The details of non-compliance are included in my annual letter to the Bishop Diocesan and the Standing Committee for their further deliberation with respect to Canon D-V.13.

Changes in Status of Churches

On February 6, 2022 the vestry of St. Christopher's Church in Garner, a mission of this Diocese, informed the Bishop Diocesan that they were unable to remain open and requested closure. The final service was held on April 3.

On March 6, 2022 the vestry of St. Mark's Church in Raleigh, a parish of this Diocese, informed the Bishop Diocesan that they were unable to remain open and requested closure. The final service was held on April 24. Title to the real property of the parish passed to the Trustees.

On August 20, 2022 the vestry of All Souls Church in Ansonville, a mission of this Diocese, informed the Bishop Diocesan that they were unable to remain open and requested closure. On November 1, the Diocese and Calvary Church, Wadesboro signed a memorandum of understanding whereby Calvary assumed responsibility for All Souls' membership and property.

Accordingly, I shall place before the 207th Annual Convention a motion to dissolve the union between Convention and St. Christopher's, Garner'; St Mark's, Raleigh; and All Souls, Ansonville.

I received no application from a parish or mission to enter into union with Convention.

Statistical Analysis

In my annual letter to the Bishop Diocesan and the President of the Standing Committee, I commented upon the statistics of the Diocese. Of note is the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on record-keeping for Average Sunday Attendance. At this time, I do not consider recent ASA statistics to be meaningful. Fortunately, ASA statistics are not used in the operations of the Diocese.

Reports to Convention

I solicited reports from 50 officers, commissions, committees, appointees, and entities of or related to the Diocese for inclusion in the Journal of the 207th Annual Convention. 47 reports were received.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of The Episcopal Church

Article XII of the Constitution of The Episcopal Church requires the Secretary of each Diocese to inform the respective diocesan Convention of amendments to the Constitution adopted by a

General Convention upon first reading. The 80th General Convention in 2022 adopted three such amendments. See Exhibit D hereto.

In Closing

I am blessed by the opportunity to interact regularly with so many dedicated, thoughtful, considerate, diligent, and inspirational disciples of Christ in this Diocese. Let me express my particular gratitude for assistance from the Bishops, staff, and other officers of the Diocese to make fulfilling my responsibilities as Secretary not merely less burdensome, but rather a pleasure.

I am committed to serving the Convention and its constituent churches and institutions. All clergy, lay delegates, senior wardens, parish administrators, and so forth are encouraged to contact me with their questions and concerns.

Exhibit A to the Report of the Secretary of Convention

Canon D-III.7.3(c) states:

After the close of each Annual Convention, the Commission [on Constitution and Canons] shall certify the changes, if any, made in the Constitution and Canons, including a correction of errors in spelling, punctuation, grammar, and references made in any portion of the Constitution or Canons to another portion thereof, and report the same to the Secretary of the Convention who shall include such corrections in the official edition of the Constitution and Canons published in the Journal. All such technical corrections shall be reported to the Convention.

On February 23, 2022 the Commission certified changes to the Constitution and Canons made by the 206th Annual Convention:

- Act 2021-10 amended the Constitution regarding the length of the term of the Treasurer (second reading).
- Act 2021-11 deleted Canon 13, Section 8, Paragraph (c); Canon 16, Section 8; and Canon 29.
- Act 2021-12 adopted a new Canon 47.
- Act 2021-13 adopted a new Rule of Order XXVI.

As of adjournment of the 207th Annual Convention, the Commission will publish a new edition of the Canons to make them more legible and useful to the Diocese. Prior to finalizing the new edition, the Commission published an introduction to the new edition in Exhibit B hereto, circulated a copy of the new edition for comment, and held a teleconference to collect corrections.

Parishes and missions of the Diocese may revise their bylaws to reflect the numbering in the new edition of the Canons without obtaining the usual prior consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority and Chancellor, so long as there is no change to the substance of the bylaws.

Exhibit B to the Report of the Secretary of Convention

Introduction to the New Edition of the Canons of the Diocese Commission on Constitution and Canons

Over the years, the Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina became increasingly difficult to comprehend and apply. The Canons were not arranged in a logical order. For example, provisions of the Canons relevant to the vestry of a church were scattered throughout the published Canons. Fractional numbers of new Canons had been used to avoid resequencing the Canons, which was a daunting undertaking because of the large number of cross-references to be corrected. Some Canons contained obsolete provisions of a transitional nature. Other Canons had sections or paragraphs that dealt with matters that would be more clearly described in a separate canon.

The net effect is that most persons in the Diocese who consulted the Canons found them to be impenetrable and obscure. Even the persons in the Diocese who consult the Canons weekly – the Bishops, the officers, and ourselves as the Commission on Constitution and Canons – often found it difficult to identify the Canons of particular interest in a given situation.

Until the adoption of Canon 12.2(c) by the 203rd Convention in 2018, the only mechanisms available to remedy these problems were a complete replacement of the Canons by Convention or a massive set of amendments. Neither mechanism was considered feasible, and therefore the problems in the published Canons continued to accrue. However, Canon 12.2(c) empowered the Commission on Constitution and Canons to make technical corrections.

After months of painstaking work, we are pleased to offer for your review and comment a new edition of the Canons of the Diocese.

At first, you will notice a new structure for the Canons:

The number of each Canon is prefixed by the letter D to denote a canon of the Diocese. The numbers of the Canons of the General Convention have no prefix. This eliminates ambiguity as to whether a given Canon is a Canon of the Diocese or a Canon of the General Convention. Everything we do in the Diocese is subject to the Canons of the General Convention.

The Canons are grouped into in seven titles, so that all Canons relevant to a given topic are found in the corresponding title. The titles are:

- Title D-I, Convention.
- Title D-II, Officers.
- Title D-III, Permanent Bodies. This Title describes the Standing Committee, the Trustees, the Diocesan Council, etc.
- Title D-IV, Finances.
- Title D-V, Congregations.
- Title D-VI, Ecclesiastical Discipline.
- Title D-VII, Administration.

To implement the new structure, there is considerable rearrangement of the sequence of the Canons. In a few instances, sentences or paragraphs were transferred from one Canon to another or to a new Canon.

Other corrections incorporated into the new edition:

- Transitional language no longer relevant to the Diocese was deleted. A typical transitional provision was to implement staggered terms of office 20 years ago. Now that the staggered terms have been in effect for so long, the transitional language served no purpose.
- Sections and paragraphs of some Canons were resequenced within the respective Canon to provide a more logical flow.
- Content that was haphazardly spread across multiple Canons was collected into a single place. For example, all provisions of the Canons that granted seat and voice at Convention to certain persons ex officio are transferred to a new Canon D-I.9.
- Titles of some Canons were modified to reflect more accurately the content of the respective Canons.
- All internal cross-references within the Canons were corrected to conform to the new structure.
- We found that a canonical amendment adopted by the 195th Convention in 2011 had not been accurately captured in the master document of the Canons. This oversight created ambiguity about the membership of the Disciplinary Board. By consulting the Journal of the 195th Convention, we have corrected the text of the relevant Canon.
- Various references to our church are standardized as "The Episcopal Church".
- Various references to the Canons of our church are standardized as "Canons of the General Convention."

In order to ease the transition from the old structure of the Canons to the new structure, the Table of Contents of the new edition contains references to the former numbers of the Canons.

We, the Commission on Constitution and Canons were careful to stay within the limits of the authority granted to us by what is now Canon D-III.7.3(c). Amending the Canons remains the purview of the Convention alone. Also, this process of canonical editing did not extend to the Constitution of the Diocese. The only way that even "one iota" of the Constitution may be changed is for two successive Conventions, each voting by orders, to adopt an amendment. However, it is our opinion that the compact nature of the Constitution and the infrequency of amendments to it, compared to amendments to the Canons, has allowed the Constitution to remain readable.

Exhibit C to the Report of the Secretary of Convention

Canon D-IV.4 Report

Article IX.7 of the Constitution of the Diocese and Canon D-IV.4.4 require the Secretary to strike from the voting rolls of Convention the lay delegates of and members of the clergy assigned to any church that failed to pay its Fair Share in full and on time. For the avoidance of doubt, this requirement does apply to churches with interim clergy or no clergy.

Two churches did not pay their Fair Share in full prior to the canonical deadline:

Battleboro, St John. Weldon, Grace.

Accordingly, their lay delegates and clergy cannot vote at the 207th Annual Convention. This consequence is not subject to the discretion of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Convention.

Churches should note that Canons D-V.2.4(h) and D-V.1.6(g), respectively, require payment of Fair Share to maintain union with Convention. Parishes should also note that Canon D-IV.4.4 establishes other consequences for non-compliance specifically by a parish. As long as a parish remains in arrears on Fair Share, its vestry shall not elect a rector, nor shall the rector call an assistant minister or other member of the clergy. If the parish fails for two consecutive years to contribute the amount required of it, the parish is automatically changed in status to a mission. These consequences are not subject to the discretion of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Convention.

Rule III Report

The Episcopal Church requires every church to submit a parochial report and an audit. General Convention sets the deadlines, which are March 1 and September 1, respectively. I remind churches with no clergy, interim clergy, or clergy on sabbatical that they are not exempt from these requirements. In those situations, the parochial report and the audit are the responsibility of the Senior Warden.

Rule of Order III of Convention, as rewritten by Act 2019-6, applies to a church that "fails to comply with Canon D-V.2.4(g) or Canon D-V.1.6(a), as the case may be, concerning the timely filing of an audit or with Canon D-V.8.5 concerning the timely filing of a parochial report".

Pursuant to the process defined by Rule III, the Secretary notified 11 churches that both their clergy and lay delegates would be deprived of vote at the 207th Annual Convention unless the churches were to apply to Diocesan Council for waivers of Rule III and Diocesan Council were to grant such waivers. On October 22, 2022, Diocesan Council granted 7 waivers:

Charlotte, Christ the King – no audit.

Durham, El Buen Pastor – no audit.

Greensboro, Holy Trinity – no audit.

Henderson, Holy Innocents – non-timely parochial report.

High Point, St Mary – no audit.

Kernersville, St Matthew – non-timely parochial report.

Lexington, Grace – no audit.

Diocesan Council did not decline any application for a waiver.

The following churches did not apply for a waiver. Accordingly, their lay delegates and clergy cannot vote at the 207th Annual Convention:

Halifax, St Mark – no audit and no parochial report. Louisburg, St Matthias – no audit. Mooresville, St James – no parochial report and no audit. Rockingham, Messiah – no parochial report and no audit

This consequence is not subject to the discretion of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Convention.

Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount received a waiver of Rule III from Diocesan Council for the 205th and the 206th Annual Conventions. The church did not submit an audit for 2021. As specified by Rule III, a church may not receive a waiver for a third consecutive year. Therefore, the clergy and lay delegates of Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount cannot vote at the 207th Annual Convention. This consequence is not subject to the discretion of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Convention.

Exhibit D to the Report of the Secretary of Convention

Amendments to the Constitution of The Episcopal Church Adopted on First Reading by the 80th General Convention

A031 - Amend the Constitution and Canons Relating to Mergers of Dioceses

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention amend Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution to read as follows:

Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese is formed and erected out of an existing Diocese or out of two or more existing Dioceses or parts of them, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese out of which it was formed, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese the formation process of the newly formed Diocese, including the adoption of its Constitution and Canons, shall be as set forth in the Canons.

Whenever a Diocese is formed out of two or more existing Dioceses, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of that one of the said existing Dioceses to which the greater number of Members of the Clergy shall have belonged prior to the erection of such new Diocese, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese.

A059 - Amend Article X of the Constitution of The Episcopal Church

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church repeal Article X in its entirety and replace it with the following:

Sec 1. The Book of Common Prayer is understood to be those liturgical forms and other texts authorized by the General Convention in accordance with this article and the Canons of this Church.

The Book of Common Prayer in this Church is intended to be communal and devotional prayer enriched by our church's cultural, geographical, and linguistic contexts. The Book of Common Prayer shall contain both public worship and private devotion.

The Book of Common Prayer, as now established or hereafter amended by the General Convention, shall be in use in all the Dioceses of this Church.

Sec. 2. No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the General Convention approve the same on first reading in one regular meeting of the General Convention and, by resolve so directing, be sent by the Secretary of the General Convention to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention at its next regular meeting, and be adopted on second reading

without alteration by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by an affirmative vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Art. I, Sec. 5 of this Constitution, except that concurrence in the affirmative by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies.

- Sec 3.No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless it has previously been authorized for Trial Use in accordance with this Article and the Canons of this Church.
- Sec 4. The General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders as previously set forth in this Article:
 - a. Amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms.
 - b. Authorize for Trial Use such alterations or additions in whole or in part to the established Book of Common Prayer as maybe proposed in accord with the Canons of this Church and duly undertaken by and implemented according to the directives of the General Convention.
 - c. Authorize for use throughout this Church, as provided by Canon, alternative and additional liturgies to supplement those provided in the Book of Common Prayer.
- Sec. 5. Nothing in this Article shall be construed as restricting the authority of the Bishops of this Church to take such order as may be permitted by the Rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer or by the Canons of the General Convention for the use of special forms of worship.

A157 - Amend Article I Sec. 7

Resolved, That Article I, Section 7 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. The General Convention shall meet hold its regular meeting not less than once in each three years, at a time and place determined in accordance with the Canons. In the event of a change of circumstances indicating the necessity or advisability of changing the date of such regular meeting of The General Convention beyond three years, said meeting may be rescheduled as provided by Canon. Special Meetings may be held as provided for by Canon.

BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Statement of Purpose

Bishop's Committee on Affordable Housing is charged with compiling resource information which includes but is not limited to practical assessment tools for community-based assets to expand their understanding of the complex issues related to affordable housing including their relationship to systemic racism and other social/environmental factors. The Committee is called to share the housing ministry stories and photos to inform and inspire congregational and convocational efforts.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Housing is a racial justice issue; residential segregation and discrimination (legally mandated in the past and actively practiced in the present) impact every aspect of our communities: disparities in household wealth, opportunities for education, public safety and health, even life expectancy. By advocating for adequate public investment in housing, helping people move from homelessness to housing, developing and managing affordable housing, restoring vacant buildings for safe places to live, and helping preserve homeownership through education and property tax assistance, we have expanded the ways that churches can advance the priority for racial justice.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

When congregations learn what they can do to support housing opportunities, they are "set on fire," to quote a rector when her congregation began an advocacy campaign. Several small churches are eagerly responding to God's call to welcome people to new homes, as they look beyond their doors to their neighborhoods.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Our committee prepares teaching materials for congregations to learn about housing needs and policies and the ways that they can become involved in supporting people experiencing homelessness, repairing and developing housing, and advocating for public investment and equitable policies. We are available to lead discussions, in-person or virtually.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

Affordable housing must be done in collaboration with community partners. We are eager to connect congregations with local organizations who can collaborate in building housing and in supporting people as they move to (or keep from losing) homes. Advocacy on a statewide level is crucial, since major budget and policy decisions are made at the state level, collaborating with other organizations and coalitions to impact these decisions.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

While we have not had a special focus on creation care, housing must be energy efficient and compact to be sustainable, rather than increasing sprawl which requires more transportation emissions and removes farmland and wetlands. Episcopal Church of the Holy Spirit Greensboro is carefully discerning the balance between preserving the environmental treasure of woods and streams with potential development of affordable housing. Other churches are considering adaptive reuse of their buildings for housing, rather than these sitting vacant or being demolished.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

We are working with the bishops and communication staff to bring affordable housing to the forefront of discussions of church property, mission priorities, and Diocesan/congregational initiatives, offering expertise in community engagement, affordable housing financing, and advocacy issues.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Our committee is clearly focused on the increasing gap between people who have housing at a price within their budgets and the growing population in our diocese who are unhoused or whose housing options are priced far above their paychecks. North Carolina demographics are moving towards a majority of people of color; with nonwhite households already having less access to adequate housing, the need for fair affordable housing is growing exponentially.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We met with Bishop Sam to talk about ways we can be more effective at engaging churches and diocesan bodies in housing ministries, with the following plans: compile the expertise resources of committee members, promote these resources on the diocesan website and communications, engage with diocesan decision-making to assure funding for housing ministries (especially from expected sale of Morgan St. office property), and provide advice to the diocesan property committee about the feasibility of creating affordable housing on the properties it reviews.

Statement of Purpose

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? In 2022, the Board of Examining Chaplains fulfilled our charge by advising the Bishop of the Diocese and the Commission on Ministry on the academic preparation of participants in the ordination process in the six areas of a theological education, as defined by the Canons of the Church.

This work includes

BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON LITURGY AND DIOCESAN LITURGICAL OFFICER

Statement of Purpose

The purview of the Bishop's Committee on Liturgy is to advise, plan, and execute diocesan liturgies for ordinations, conventions, and other special occasions, as well as to explore other ways the diocese can support congregations in liturgical revision and renewal.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

While not directly under our purview, we have advised and discussed liturgies pertaining to the annual Absalom Jones commemoration. We are also committed to diversifying our committee to reflect the breadth of the diocese.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

One of the ways we assist congregations is with liturgical resources.

Episcopalcommonprayer.org is the official liturgical resource for General Conventions Task Force for Liturgical and Prayer Book Revision. Here congregations can access all liturgies approved for use in our Church, how to use these resources, and translations when available.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Our committee understands how liturgy forms us to participate in God's mission. With that in mind, we are always trying to balance the need for liturgy to comfort and to inspire.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

This year's Diocesan Convention is focused on Creation Care. We have worked closely with Bishop Rodman to ensure that each of our liturgies inspire stewardship of God's creation as we reflect on this mission strategy priority. We have also decided to fully eliminate the use of paper worship leaflets at Convention. Convention attendees are now well-versed in the use of the YappApp, and evolving technologies allow us to provide translations and fulsome liturgies without paper waste.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

In 2022, we have planned and celebrated the ordination of 1 candidate to the diaconate, 5 candidates to the transitional diaconate, and we are in the planning stages for 2 ordinations to the priesthood in December and 2 ordinations to the diaconate in January. We have also working closely with Bishop Rodman to receive and review liturgies for diocesan use, such as the Swindell Liturgy for Longing and Lament. We also work closely with our bishops to prepare for convention liturgies.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

We are committed to diversifying our committee to reflect the breadth of the diocese. We are also working to create a standard for how we offer bilingual liturgies in that diocese that respect and value Spanish-speakers and English-speakers alike, while maintaining our goal for accessibility.

What are your plans for the coming year?

For the coming year, we will focus on diocesan liturgies and ordinations. There has been some conversation about a diocesan LGBTQ service in the near future, which we will consider with our bishops. We have worked hard in the past to create standards and commonality for diocesan ordinations, and we are hoping to create guidelines for all liturgies of the diocese.

BISHOP'S COMMITTEE: PASTORAL RESPONSE

Statement of Purpose

The Pastoral Response Team's canonical purpose is to ensure the Pastoral Response mandated by the provisions of the Canons of the General Convention of The Episcopal Church (Title IV. Canon 8) in matters of Ecclesiastical Discipline. The work of the team extends beyond this mandate, however, as members of the Team have been called upon to bring insight and guidance to congregations in situations where the normal pastoral resources of the congregation are at their limits, and to be available as a council of pastoral advice and/or pastoral backup to the bishops and diocesan staff.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

We have recognized our need to have more diversity on the Pastoral Care Team, which becomes particularly relevant when working with historically Black parishes and in majority-Latino parishes. To that end we have recruited people for the team who can bring perspective from these populations and/or speak their native language.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

The work of the Pastoral Care Team has encouraged and led programming designed to sustain and support lay and ordained leadership in the Diocese. Our mission is to support the well-being of parishes and clergy, particularly in times of crisis.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

The PRT engages in spiritual formation among its members which has an indirect effect on their home communities. We have also supported and led programming on the spiritual life and spiritual practices for lay and ordained leaders in the past year.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

The Pastoral Care Team is itself a collaboration between psychotherapists, social workers, clergy, and lawyers. We have not been directly involved in New Communities.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

We have not directly addressed Creation Care in the past year, except in making better use of technology to reach further with less physical transportation across the diocese.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

The Pastoral Care Team met four times in 2022 for its own formation, discussion of matters arising in the Diocese, to debrief on parish interventions, and to imagine ways of proactively

supporting clergy. We were also part of a parish-wide meeting with the bishop and his staff, in late 2021.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

We are seeking, constantly, ways to support lay and ordained leadership in the church such that the parish crises we are often called on to address occur less frequently.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We will continue to meet quarterly and remain in close contact with the bishop and his staff for ways the Pastoral Care Team could offer support or leadership.

BISHOP'S COMMITTEE ON PRISON MINISTRY

Statement of Purpose

The Bishop's Committee on Prison Ministry serves as a resource for education, communication, and networking, as it relates to ministers to the incarcerated within the Diocese of North Carolina. The Bishop's Committee on Prison Ministry is also a vehicle to facilitate hands on ministry to the jails and prisons of our diocese, while working to bring awareness of prison and jail related matters to the wider community.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

By virtue of the fact that a large percentage of incarcerated individuals are minorities, and by the fact that "felons" in our state have serious discrimination issues as they face reentry into society, the commission's work involves opening doors and creating opportunities for justice involved individuals as they seek to reenter society.

The Committee recognizes and supports many other efforts in the pre-detention and post-detention (e.g., elimination of the bail-bond system, and diversion to other non-detention programs or processes). We seek ways to embody Jesus' call from Matthew 25:36, "I was in prison and you visited me."

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Those of us involved in Prison Ministry have found it to be a meaningful and fulfilling ministry to and with those who are justice involved. The members get to see what the church looks like from the perspective of those justice involved individuals with whom we are privileged to have relationships with.

Their involvement in the life of our parishes help to break down the stereotypes of "felons" and receive the blessings of their hope and gratitude for the basics of freedom and a new opportunity to start life anew.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

By the members involvements and commitments to the various prison ministry endeavors in their areas, they bear witness to and invite involvement with others engaged in prison ministry.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

All members of the Prison Ministry Committee bring their involvements with, and commitment to, a variety of local prison ministry efforts. The larger committee provides a network for sharing information and activities of our various local prison ministries.

Vivian Rogers writes about prison work in her area: "I got 3 new volunteers from our mission

day at St. Alban's. Fifteen boys were served September 17. We meet with them again monthly starting October 4. We love to see the program in Edgecomb county. Do you have contacts in Rocky Mount Wilson area?"

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

We share with the justice involved individuals with whom we work the many involvements of our parishes in creation care.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? In Hillsborough, David Stanford is actively involved with Reentry House Plus, Inc., providing housing and programs for justice involved residents and community members through SWIT (Success While in Transition).

At the Womenn's Prison in Raleigh, Jenny Brown is working with the Women's Interfaith Prison Ministry to provide a chaplain and programs at the facility.

Mark Davidson and Jamie Edwards are actively involved with the Forsyth County Jail.

Martin Fowler is actively involved with St. Philip's Ministry of teleconferencing with the inmates of the Durham County Jail.

Joan Sherrill is actively involved in letter writing and support of 12 Step programs in her area. Vivian Rogers is active with the state youth facility near Davidson.

David Bland is active in lobbying for the repeal of the Bail Bond system.

David Stanford also provides a connection with the state Yokefellows Prison Ministry that has volunteer groups in a number of correctional facilities throughout the state of North Carolina.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The committee has evolved into a resourcing and networking committee, dedicated to enhancing the ministries that are currently in process, and providing consultation to others who would like to see prison ministry in their local areas.

The committee members are slowly getting back into prison facilities after the COVID pandemic limited direct contacts for the last 2 years.

What are your plans for the coming year?

Our committee will continue to meet quarterly to share resources and ideas for furthering prison ministry in our areas and in the diocese.

CHARTERED COMMITTEE FOR CAMPUS AND YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

Statement of Purpose

The Council for Campus and Young Adult Ministry (CCYAM) is charged with financial oversite of the 10 campus ministries, 1 episcopal service corps, and other young adult ministries looking for diocesan support. We are focused on creating an inclusive and welcoming environment to the churched and church seeking students and young adults we meet in our places of worship and around our campuses. CCYAM works with all our constituent campus to build relationships and strategically discuss best practices in ministry development.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

CCYAM is working hard with local parishes located near HBCU's in the diocesan boundaries to ensure that we are supporting students at as many institutes of higher education as feasible. This work builds off the success we have had at North Carolina Central University and our foundational program at St. Augustine's University. We look forward to increasing the number of formal programs of the next few years to reflect this work.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

As we come out of the COVID-19 pandemic, the campuses and programs supported by CCYAM are taking the time to evaluate how these programs will move forward. Many of our campuses and programs have significantly reduced attendance or involvement due to the lack of evangelism opportunities during the past few years. This is a wonderful blessing to allow us to take the time to reflect on how campus and young adult ministry has evolved over the last 10 - 15 years. We are working with our students to understand the new student experience and expectations of campus ministries.

We also started a new partnership with the Diocese of Western North Carolina and the campus ministries of the UNC-Chapel Hill and Wake Forest University that creates resources that will support LGBTQ+ affirming student athletes and allies to have a space to engage discipleship in Jesus Christ without discrimination for their sexual identity or affirming ally ship. What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

At every campus you will find a unique bible study opportunity, whether it is Elon for Coffee, UNC-Greensboro for some Dungeon's and Dragons, or compline in the Duke Chapel on a Tuesday night. Our students lead many of these sessions with the passion that equals the creativity. We are unafraid to innovate on meaningful ways to engage the Bible and other ancient text and practices. For every post-modern activity, there is a reflection of the ancient and lived practices. We invite you to reach-out to our programs and find times that you can join us to learn about how we are merging the old with the new.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

We would like to start by congratulating Niners United for their work with the Diocesan partner Diocese of Costa Rica and the investment of time and talent to build up the work of campus ministries.

Additionally, we look-forward to reviewing the results of the first full year of the Christian Athletes Circles in the spring of 2023 to understand the importance of partnership across our diocese and our diocesan neighbors. This may be a model that can be replicated in other areas of diocesan priority and outreach.

And as with everything we do, we are consistently challenging ourselves and our students to look outside our community to engage the not-yet-churched and the previously-harmed-by-church to show them the welcoming embrace of the Episcopal Branch of the Jesus Movement. Often times we work in collaboration with other protestant churches on our campuses embracing the one apostolic church and the ecumenical relationship ties of the national church.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

Creation Care has always been an important aspect of campus ministry. We have spent time during the pandemic assessing our worship and outdoor spaces to understand how best to utilize the blessings around us. Many of our campuses have revitalized our outdoor spaces to include firepits and community gardens. We want to ensure that we have a safe space to worship as the pandemic and other illnesses cycle through our campuses.

Additionally, we are consistently looking at our building carbon footprints and reviewing energy assessments. Our students are passionate about the environmental impact of their campus communities and identifying ways to be less wasteful and more intentional about their resource usage. As we return to in-person dinners and fellowship, we are rethinking our waste strategies and water usage.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

The CCYAM is charged with Financial oversight of the budget for the Campus and Young Adult ministries of the Diocese. Every program augments the funding received by the diocese with fundraising, grants, and pledges. Diocesan funding is often the backbone to these programs that lets the community know that we are a priority of the diocese and not an afterthought. We have been blessed in the funding we have received during the leaner years of the pandemic to keep and grow these programs. We have used this funding to look outside our historic programs and grow our presence on HBCUs and in programing areas often overlooked. We continue to lead the way on collaboration outside our campuses with other campuses and other Episcopal church entities. We know our students/members are only with us for a few years and we are privileged to guide them to the next stop on their church journey.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

CCYAM is always looking at our storied programs for growth and outreach to the changing demographics of our campuses and to ensuring that we can provide support to as many young adults as possible. We are limited in our options due to the highly secular nature of many campuses in the UNC system of higher education and in the changing way in which higher education is delivered. Post-COVID, online classes and online education has continued to flourish.

Nevertheless, we have dedicated the last two years to outreach at HBCUs in the Piedmont-Triad region of the state with some small success as we build up campus ministry as an extension of parish ministry in the model of St. Titus with NCCU. We are hopeful that this growth will be sustainable and we will be adding another Diocesan supported program in the next year or two.

Lastly, as you look at the number of D1 schools that have campus ministries in our diocese, it might surprise you that we have never had great success with student athletes and providing a safe space for the Christian development of these individuals. Because of practice, game, and school commitments, many athletes are unable to attend regular campus ministry programing. A team-up with the diocese of Western North Carolina is looking to offer another type of student athlete engagement that demonstrates the inviting presence of God for all regardless of the how we define our lives.

What are your plans for the coming year?

It is a rebuilding year across all our campuses. Many of the freshman who were part of our last real recruiting class will be graduating in the spring. We will be focusing the fall of 2022 and spring of 2023 on outreach to our campuses. We will need the support of all youth programs to help identify graduating seniors that will be attending a North Carolina college or university in the fall.

The Johnson Service Corps is also taking the Fall 2022 - Spring 2023 service cycle to evaluate and restructure their ministry to best serve young adults post-COVID. They hope to come back in Fall 2023 with a strong service corps ready to take on the challenges of today.

Lastly, with the support of a few parishes in the Diocese, we hope to support a Young Adult Festival in the heart of North Carolina Bar-Be-Que. This event will look to unite the young adult programs across this diocese and be a celebration of the importance of the shared table. We are still in early planning for this event, but will utilize diocesan funding specifically to get the event off the ground. Additional funds will come from fundraisers, grants, and/or participant fees. Many young adults in the diocese have fond memories at their time spent at diocesan youth events or campus ministry events. They are searching for that same level of community as young adults. We feel that this might be a perfect pilot event for CCYAM to lead the way as anticipated under Goal 1, 2, & 4 of the Diocesan priority of Congregational Vitality by creating a network of young adult programs that will allow for future events geared toward this community around lay

leadership, discernment, and resource sharing. Additionally, it will be a great program to review processes for collaboration and partnership from the formation of the event through to the debrief and report to the diocese of the outcome.

CHARTERED COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL MINISTRY

Statement of Purpose

The primary purpose of our committee is to promote the work of Environmental Ministry in the Diocese. It is our goal to demonstrate that concern and care for God's ongoing Creation is not a peripheral concern to our spiritual path as Episcopalians but is instead at the very heart of the Gospel message to love God and love one's neighbor as one's self.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

One of our six Creation Care goals is "Creation Care and Racial Justice." Our ministry has recognized that Creation Care and Social and Racial Justice connects in the area of Environmental Justice, and we continue to identify ways that our committee can promote Environmental Justice as a way to advance Racial Reckoning, Justice and Healing.

Example: In 2021, we supported St. Ambrose Raleigh's successful application for an Episcopal Church Green Grant to address Environmental Justice related to the restoration of the Walnut Creek Wetlands. We plan to continue our support as their work on this project continues.

We intend to continue intentionally exploring the confluence of civil rights, racial justice, and environmental concern in the area of environmental justice. By recognizing that issues of social injustice and inequality are often rooted in and exacerbated by environmental factors, we can work to mitigate these conditions and therefore make a greater contribution toward achieving the goal of becoming Beloved Community.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

We have continued to support a vibrant Green Grant Program particularly aimed at small congregations looking to begin the work of Environmental Ministry. This work has been closely connected with our energy efficiency program, but we are open to grant proposals to fund a variety of environmental ministry projects. We have created a grant proposal document to publicize these grants in order to help congregations in need of financial assistance to begin a project to green their church. Grants are typically in the \$500-\$1000 range. Thus far in 2022, we have allocated over \$1200 of grant funds and plan to allocate approximately \$1800 more in grant funds before the end of the 2022 budget year. Projects frequently include maintenance projects that will lead to cost savings such as building insulation and energy and water efficiency projects.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

One of our six Creation Care priorities is "Becoming Deeper Green Churches," a primary component of which is connecting Creation Care with our traditions of scripture and worship. We have also advocated for the use of environmental curricula including Living in an Icon,

co-authored by Robin Gottfried, former Director of the Center for Religion and Environment at Sewanee: The University of the South. Our members also frequently promote the work of Environmental Ministry through talks at education forums throughout the Diocese.

We also worked with Diocesan Formation to sponsor a Diocesan webinar presented by Dr. Steve Jurovics entitled, "Creation Care and Formation: Climate Change is a Biblical Issue" in April of 2022.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

During 2022, we have continued to connect Diocesan mission work with creation care collaborations locally, regionally, nationally, and globally. Examples include but are not limited to the following:

- Province IV Environmental Ministries
- Connecting on Creation Care (Charlotte)
- Interfaith Creation Care of the Triangle
- NC Interfaith Power and Light
- GreenFaith
- Center for Religion and Environment at Sewanee: The University of the South
- Creation Care collaboration with neighboring Dioceses
- Creation Care Alliance of Western NC

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

Every aspect of our ministry is devoted to fulfilling the goals of the Creation Care priority.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

As representatives of our Diocese, members of our committee have participated in discussions with the World Resources Institute's Faith and Sustainability Initiative, the NC Interfaith Power and Light Energy Working Group, the Center for Religion and Environment at Sewanee, and the Episcopal Church Building Fund regarding improving the availability of solar technology in our Diocese. We have also worked closely with solar companies including Eagle Solar and Light and Southern Energy Management in order to promote the expansion of solar implementation in churches in our Diocese.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Creation Care work is never tied to a particular demographic but is instead invested in fostering a love and care for God's Creation among all of God's people. While we have had no explicit discussions of a changing mission field or changing demographics in our Diocese, we feel that our ministry is well equipped to address the task of promoting environmental ministries as an integral part of following our Christian call to love God and love our neighbors.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We plan to continue our work promoting the following Creation Care goals in the Diocese:

- 1. Becoming Deeper Green Churches
- 2. Creation Care and Racial Justice
- 3. Climate stabilization through emissions reductions
- 4. Restore earth using natural systems
- 5. Engage in Environmental Advocacy
- 6. Points of intersection with other diocesan priorities

The Environmental Ministry Committee will also be working to promote the Communion Forest Initiative among Diocesan Congregations. The Communion Forest Initiative was promoted at the 2022 Lambeth Conference, and our committee will be sponsoring a resolution at Diocesan Convention to encourage its implementation in congregations throughout the Diocese.

All engagement in global mission and advancing relationships with the global church by definition advances racial reckoning, justice and healing. Our grants program provides specific aid in addressing human need.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

We have encouraged congregational engagement through our diocesan-wide conference on global mission in April, have encouraged establishing or deepening relationships with global partners through our grants program, and have encouraged participation in virtual global Bible studies quarterly.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Our conference in April, with a keynote address by Titus Presler, missiologist who heads the Global Episcopal Mission Network and with a variety of workshops, served a ministerial formation purpose.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

We entered into collaboration with the Environmental Ministry Committee to host an educational and advocacy event on global creation care on the Thursday preceding convention, and joined with that committee in presenting a resolution on global creation care at convention.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

See above under collaboration.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

We secured approval of our charter, permitting expanded membership, and we revised our grant guidelines for clarity and breadth.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Aside from our ongoing grant program, all of the initiatives described above sought to challenge our diocesan engagement in global mission, encourage great dialogue with partners, and deepen relationship with global partners.

What are your plans for the coming year?

The incoming chairperson, Rebecca Yarbrough, writes: "I hope that we can continue to expand and build upon the wonderful work that has been done over the past two years. I would love to see us have another Global Mission gathering that this time focuses on sharing stories and the how-tos of planning trips and building relational time into them. I also hope that we can continue and expand the quarterly global Bible Studies. I'm hoping to hear from the Committee their hopes and dreams."

CHARTERED COMMITTEE ON GRANTS

Statement of Purpose

In accordance with Diocesan policy and budget availability, the committee receives applications and authorizes disbursements to clergy and laity for theological education, rather broadly defined. The committee also provides parish grants for new and expanded ministries. Allocations for these purposes in the Diocesan budget for 2022 are: Clergy grants - \$7,500, Laity grants - \$5,500, Parish grants - \$18,520.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? The committee does not directly address the mission strategies. Grants to individual clergy and laity and to parishes are supportive of these strategies.

To date, during 2022, the Chartered Committee on Grants has approved and disbursed grants as follow:

- Clergy \$2,880
- Laity \$2,000
- Parish \$8,000.

All applications received have been approved in amounts consistent with Diocesan policy.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The work evolves and adapts to the extent applications received and approved are reflective of these changes.

What are your plans for the coming year?

Current policies for the work of the Chartered Committee on Grants are several years old and should be reviewed to determine if modifications need to be made.

The Chartered Committee for Lifelong Christian Formation seeks to form, equip, teach, and inspire parishioners in the Diocese of North Carolina to become disciples of Jesus and share the gospel in their daily lives. To make our work as relevant and effective as possible, we focus on initiatives that individual parishes and missions could not do alone. We seek to connect members and leaders from multiple congregations, and we try to engage leaders that not all congregations can access easily. We also make sure that our efforts reflect and support the mission priorities of the Diocese of North Carolina.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

CHARTERED COMMITTEE ON RENUMERATION AND INSURANCE

Statement of Purpose

The committee shall study the remuneration of the clergy and make an annual recommendation to Diocesan Council for minimum clergy salaries and other remuneration in the Diocese. The committee shall make an annual recommendation to Diocesan Council for healthcare and other benefits to be provided to qualifying clergy and lay employees.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? Our committee made two presentations to Diocesan Council in 2022:

- 1. We studied the cost of individual and family healthcare coverage provided by Church Pension Group ("CPG"). We compared these rates to those available on the open market. Our Diocese rates are on average 5% below the national average; however, our rates are skewed by the aging clergy population and will continue to increase. The committee recommends exploring cost sharing and greater education, options, and preventative care opportunities from CPG. In addition, we annually analyze the Compass Report, provided by CPG, which highlights healthcare spending trends across the Diocese.
- 2. We presented a clergy compensation report comparing the national average with our Diocese based on a study by CPG. The committee endorsed a minimum clergy salary with a 5% cost of living adjustment and a Diocesan Staff increase of 5% for cost of living.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

We adapt our focus on remuneration and insurance as the clergy and lay employees of the Diocese change.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We will continue to monitor healthcare costs and health claims data. Our remuneration report will be updated annually as well.

CHARTERED COMMITTEE ON YOUTH

Statement of Purpose

Our mission is to provide children, youth and families in the diocese safe, affirming spaces to learn about God, scripture and The Episcopal Church. We want them to have fun and build strong, faithful relationships in the process! The CCY and youth missioners work with youth and their families to come together to grow in spiritual formation and develop leadership within the church. This mission includes supporting children, youth leaders and congregations in their ministries.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

This past summer we invited children and families to read and wonder with us through the Green and Growing Season. Families that signed up received weekly a postcard with a book suggestion, one or more Bible stories to check out, and some questions to consider. Our hope was to give families resources and ideas to foster Christian formation at home, while encouraging conversations about ideas that are central to Becoming Beloved Community. We also included links for additional resources and videos of each book being read to make it easy for families to join in while they are on vacation, at home or around town.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

The Chartered Committee on Youth has worked with congregations who have requested assistance to give them resources and leadership to offer programming, events and formation.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

- We have offered at home formation clubs for families, as well as virtual offerings for youth, parents, and leaders, and have encouraged intergenerational offerings.
- Diocesan confirmation, LGBYQ+ offering for youth, as well as a separate offering for adults, workshops during Bishops Ball. We have offered access to the Forma Conference in 2022, and continue to offer resources and curriculum through our Trello board and in our monthly children and youth leadership gatherings.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

We continue to gather children's formation and youth leaders (paid and lay staff) from across the Diocese to share ideas and collaborate on offerings together.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

For Earth Day 2022 we curated resources and shared with congregations events and program offerings across the Diocese.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

As part of our continuing work, we are charged to administrate Safe Church Training. Currently this involves a complete reboot of the way training is offered. We are currently working with congregations to move their people onto an online system, get a baseline of who has been trained, and who needs to take the training. We are working with our bishop and Council to revise the Best Practices for Safeguarding God's Children.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Adapting programs and events to meet the needs where our congregations are.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We will continue to connect and collaborate with church leaders to provide programming for children, youth and families, while offering in person program events for youth as a diocese. We are considering ways in how to engage leadership and parents about dismantling racism in the hope that they will in turn share with the younger members of their congregations. We are also looking at expanding our summer offerings for children and their families.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

We work to ensure that our Constitution and Canons cause no damage, and deepen no wounds. We recognize the need to expand the viewpoints expressed in our meetings by encouraging a changing membership on the commission.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We will continue to assist the diocese in using the re-ordered and re-numbered canons as appropriate. We will continue to seek ways to expand the utility of the canons in creating a common space for ministerial growth.

COMMISSION ON HISTORIC PROPERTIES

Statement of Purpose

Identify and preserve those properties (churches and cemeteries) owned and overseen by the Diocese which are central to its history and the evolution of the Episcopal faith in North Carolina.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Prioritized the survey and status of all minority-based Episcopal churches for inclusion as either Living Historical Properties or as vacant properties where a support group can be developed to create a Preserved Living Historical Property.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

In the process of actively surveying 17 missions and 13 parishes whose property/building is 75+ years old to document their historic significance to the Diocese but also what building and structural challenges they face where we can help bring funds and grants in their support.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

In the process of actively surveying 17 missions and 13 parishes whose property/building is 75+ years old to document their historic significance to the Diocese but also what building and structural challenges they face where we can help bring funds and grants in their support.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Our work seeks to preserve and uplift the many struggling, often rural parishes and missions that are in areas of economic decline and often feel they are ignored by the Diocese. We help them to understand that the continuation of the Episcopal faith in their location is important and we provide an ear and voice to their needs.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We will complete a full Historic Survey of all diocesan properties and will submit a report and recommendations to the Bishop and the Diocesan Council on additional properties to be included as Diocesan Historic Properties (Living). In addition, we will compile a listing of congregational building needs that could benefit from historic preservation. We will pursue funding for the historic preservation via grants, foundation gifts, and at-large benevolence.

COMMISSION ON MINISTRY FOR THE DIACONATE

The role of the Committee on the Diaconate (COM-D) is to advise and assist the Bishop in the selection of persons through discernment of an individual's call to ministry for the vocational diaconate and in the guidance and pastoral care of the candidates during their formation.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

The work varies depending on the internship sites that those in the discernment process are appointed to. These themes are integrated into the broader formation and reflection of those in discernment. Additionally, we work with other committees and groups as well as individual congregations to see that historically underrepresented communities are supported in the discernment process.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

The work varies depending on the internship sites that those in the discernment process are appointed to. These themes are integrated into the broader formation and reflection of those in discernment. Additionally, it is our hope that the formation and ordination of new deacons will contribute to vitality in both individual congregations and the wider Church.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

The work varies depending on the internship sites that those in the discernment process are appointed to. These themes are integrated into the broader formation and reflection of those in discernment. Additionally, we have paid special attention to the intellectual and spiritual formation of those in discernment. This year marked the first time that we have had two internships, both a primary discernment internship and a second field education internship in a different congregation. It is our hope that this will more greatly contribute to the preparation of new deacons to serve faithfully and well in the church.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

The work varies depending on the internship sites that those in the discernment process are appointed to. These themes are integrated into the broader formation and reflection of those in discernment. As of now, we're working with the Diocese of Massachusetts to host an intern who is in discernment with MA but resident in NC.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

The work varies depending on the internship sites that those in the discernment process are appointed to. These themes are integrated into the broader formation and reflection of those in discernment.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? As of now, we have nine people in various stages of discernment. There was also one deacon ordination in 2022.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

We are having more meetings virtually, which enables people to participate better, regardless of their location. We're also working with the Bishop's Committee on the Diaconate to ensure that recruitment for discernment reflects these changes.

What are your plans for the coming year?

In the coming year, we intend to carry on as we have done previously, supporting both individuals and congregations as the Church continues to raise up new deacons. As of now, we do not have significant changes planned for the discernment and formation process.

COMMISSION ON MINISTRY FOR THE PRIESTHOOD

Statement of Purpose

We discern God's movement in the lives of those exploring a call to ordained ministry, and offer advisement and counsel to Bishop Sam Rodman regarding the education and evaluation of a person's formation as a priest in the Episcopal Church.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Racial Reckoning, Justice and Healing is a part of the recruitment and formation of new clergy in the Episcopal church through our work with candidates of color, as well as our own education in these topics. Each member of the Commission, and everyone who enters the ordination process, must complete Anti-Racism training. We advance this diocesan strategy by working to create opportunities not only for persons of color to succeed in ministry, but for non-minority candidates to explore their own stories of racism and bias, and learn how to grieve and heal.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

We prioritize the development of leadership in the Diocese of NC that can serve not only our thriving parishes, but bring vitality to our vulnerable congregations. The Commission seeks ordained leaders who are able to adjust to the changing needs of the church and explores the ways bi-vocational ministry can provide options for congregations to thrive with part-time leadership.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Formation is a key aspect of the making of new priests. The Commission attends to formation in individual mentorship, spiritual direction, the parish diocesan internships, our Episcopal seminaries and Anglican studies programs, and other formation requirements such as Clinical Pastoral Education, Anti-Racism training, Title IV training, Safe Church training, and the evaluation process of the General Ordination Exams.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

The Commission's work with the formation of new priests looks ahead to ways the Episcopal Church can grow, establish new faith communities, and serve as creative entrepreneurs of Christ's work in the world.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

Creation Care is not directly addressed in the work of the Commission on Ministry, though the Commission agrees that this is an important aspect of future ministry in the church.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

We are always reviewing and revising our process of interviews and applications to receive leaders from all different backgrounds and future paths in ministry.

What are your plans for the coming year?

To continue our work of discernment with those who are interested in pursuing a call to Holy Orders.

COMMITTEE ON GLOBAL MISSION – COSTA RICA

Statement of Purpose

The purpose of our Committee is to both broaden and deepen the relationship between our two dioceses by way of relationship-building diocese to diocese, church to church, and most important person to person relationships. We do this most effectively by creating relationships and do things with each other instead of for each other.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

As we well know, racism is a global issue. In Costa Rica, the Episcopal church is known as the black church and most of its parishes are located on the Caribbean side of the country. One of the biggest things we are doing is telling the story of how the Episcopal Church came to Costa Rica to start the conversation about who the church is and what the church is doing in Costa Rica from the very beginning. This provides our diocese with a contextual understanding of racial issues in Costa Rica.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

In prioritizing relationship building, we encourage groups (youth & adults) to spend time with their Costa Rican peers on more than just Sunday Morning. We encourage conversation about what is going well, and what both churches/groups are finding challenging. It gives both delegations and idea of how similar our churches really are and a since of solidarity in working through the day-to-day life of the church.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Through the conversations together, both groups often share what has worked well for their own congregations. This often creates brainstorming sessions and further discussion around Formation opportunities that extend well beyond their time together. Also, Costa Rica has begun participating in the quarterly global mission bible studies that take place on zoom, which is connecting the diocese of Costa Rica with places all over the world for the first time at a parishioner level.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

While it may not be official new communities, our two dioceses are working together to re-open many of the after-school programs that were shut down by COVID. Upgrades to facilities and new ways of doing things are establishing new traditions and trends in old programs.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

This is something the country of Costa Rica takes very seriously and so we have much to learn

from them in the area of creation care. They have so much to teach us about preservation as most of their country's industry revolves around ecotourism.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The largest shift taking place is an emphasis on relationship building rather than "nails & hammers."

What are your plans for the coming year?

Our committee is working hard are reinvigorating relationships and establishing new relationships between our two dioceses now that travel is over and a new generation of youth and adults are coming of age that can engage in partnering with Costa Rica.

DISCIPLINARY BOARD

Statement of Purpose

Clergy take vows to uphold the "doctrine, discipline, and worship" of the Episcopal Church. When there is a question about whether a bishop, deacon or priest may have been involved in misconduct, the Church has two responsibilities. One is to see that justice is done. The other is to provide pastoral care for all involved, including the accused clergy person. Both of these responsibilities are entrusted to the diocesan bishop, and the Canons of the Church govern how matters are to be handled.

In the Diocese of North Carolina these two responsibilities of the Diocesan Bishop are handled by two different groups of people. The Disciplinary Board, as described in Title IV of the Canons of the Episcopal Church, has the responsibility to investigate the matter, consider and decide whether a violation of the Canons has taken place, and discern what must be done to bring about healing, reconciliation and justice for all involved. The Pastoral Response Team has the responsibility to provide pastoral care, under the guidance of the bishop, for each person and community impacted by a situation. The Pastoral Response Team has other gifts to offer clergy and congregations outside of the discipline process.

The Disciplinary Board meets annually to reflect on best practices for the process including work with members of the pastoral response team, and the bishops. It is sacred work and we are privileged to serve in this unique way.

In 2022 I report that there were no cases.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

The ministry of the Disciplinary Board is to assure justice is done and to seek healing for all involved.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

The ministry of the Disciplinary Board is to support the vitality of a congregation where misconduct may have occurred.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

The ministry of the Disciplinary Board is a collaborative effort that is a model for healing where mistrust or hurt has occurred.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? The work of the Disciplinary Board is required to respond to any matter pertaining to Title IV.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

We look to the Disciplinary Board to be a diverse community of clergy and laity representing the diversity of our diocese.

What are your plans for the coming year?

We will gather this year for a day long review of how we have handled cases that have come before us and seek to learn from what we have done well as well as improve where we could do better.

Past initiatives have included bringing nationally known speakers to conferences and retreats at the Summit Conference Center, holding an on-line interactive book study with Diana Butler-Bass and Bishop Michael Curry a decade before the pandemic, giving \$100.00 to every congregation at convention to engage a new mission in their community, hosting a round table breakfast the following year to share the results of the experience, creating a Diocesan Convention Eucharist to be held in the public square, and creating a bible study, More and More, to recognize the call in scripture to expand the tent of faith and inclusion.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

As reported last year, in 2021, the committee created an interactive Liturgy of Lament, Longing and Hope in two formats to be used in both in-person and remote worship. The liturgy addresses the disappointment, grief, and suffering the pandemic brought into our individual and collective lives. It also names the civil divisiveness, and racial strife apparent in our county today, as well as anxiety brought on by future unknowing. In addition to the worship service, a deck of Go Speak cards which encourage small group or family storytelling and the holding space for truth and faith. A list of resources for children and families navigating loss were also developed to be used in Christian Formation settings. The liturgy and all materials were presented to the clergy at their weekly Zoom meeting in late August. A Liturgy of Lament, Longing and Hope was the Diocesan Streamed Service on September 12th, celebrated at Church of the Advocate, Chapel Hill.

In 2022, the Committee celebrated the good leadership and work of Sarah Hollar and Ayliffe Mumford who had shepherded the committee for the past 8 years. We welcomed new members, Jennie Beaumont and Gabe Lamazares, and new leadership in Matt Addington and Lisa Fischbeck.

2022 has been a year of regrouping, as we have welcomed new members and met with Bishop Rodman and Diocesan staff to better coordinate and facilitate our efforts moving forward. As a result, our work in 2022 has largely been to update earlier offerings. In the Spring, the Liturgy of Lament, Longing and Hope was updated for a new year and continues to be available. In the Fall, we began to re-work the Bible Study for Expanding the Tent to incorporate new understandings of faith and inclusion since our first launch of More and More in 2019. This updated edition will be available in the Spring of 2023.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

What are your plans for the coming year?

EPISCOPAL FARMWORKER MINISTRY

Statement of Purpose

Episcopal Farmworker Ministry responds to the physical, emotional, and spiritual needs of farmworkers and actively supports opportunities for them to become self-directive.

We seek to minister to farmworkers in three principal ways:

- through direct services;
- through the development and support of programs that work towards the empowerment of farmworkers;
- by encouraging leadership development, advocacy, and education aimed toward a systemic change of agricultural policy.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Episcopal Farmworker Ministry has a long-standing relationship with la Sagrada Familia, a mission in the Diocese of East Carolina. This relationship has been strengthened over the past year with stronger communication and collaboration. The Ministry is excited about the ground-breaking for a church building for la Sagrada Familia on our shared property.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

The Episcopal Farmworker Ministry (EFWM) continued its outreach to the Latino community of farmworkers, processing plant workers and other immigrant families of eastern North Carolina, providing a place, both physically and virtually, where these individuals and families can find support for the physical and emotional demands they confront and opening a door for them to find a path toward meeting their spiritual needs. Through direct services—food distribution events, providing access to mental health services, immigration assistance and intervention, and home repair made possible by Episcopal Relief and Development; leadership development, especially our Women's Group (Grupo de Mujeres), whose herb garden cooperative has just successfully incorporated, with big plans for a greenhouse and expanded production, drawing in a growing number of women from our community, as well as our vital group of promoters (promotores) who play key leadership roles in all of our programs; and advocacy which is far reaching over all of our programs, gaining energy from and bringing our experience to a broad network of farmworker organizations who, collectively make their presence felt and their voices heard in the hall of power—we continue to seek to affirm each worker's value and dignity and provide multiple opportunities for them to gain strength from one another and provide programs and information for them to grow as individuals and as a community. One notable sign of this growth is the Ministry's hiring of a number of young people—the children of these same farmworkers—who become key links in carrying out our programs, gain experience and confidence in the process, and who take this experience back home with them and then on to college or university as a demonstration to their families that this growth of which we speak is a very real thing.

All our programs were seriously tested by the pandemic, as was the life of the churches of the two dioceses who support our work. But we have found and are still finding our way to the other side of this challenge. Our numbers of families supported—boxes of food distributed, visits to H2A camps, homes repaired, emergency kits distributed, immigration services appointments (including appearances in court), vaccination events coordinated with local and state health authorities, emergency funds distributed to families whose work and livelihoods are turned upside down by sickness or other factors beyond their control—continues strong and virtually unabated from the previous year, irrespective of the continuing challenges.

What are your plans for the coming year?

Episcopal Farmworker Ministry has been in a time of leadership transition for most of 2022, following the departure of the Executive Director February 28. The interim has worked to support the staff in maintaining programs, monitoring and executing grants, and assisting the Ministry in preparing for new leadership. A primary goal for 2023 is to employ a new Executive Director.

EFWM's goals and objectives for 2023 are to essentially continue the direct delivery of services within our community. We meet a keen and continuing need for these services and know, firsthand, of the ways in which these services are alleviating human suffering and providing hope to families who otherwise would have none. These include, but are not limited to, twice monthly food distributions, school supply and Christmas present distributions, vaccination clinics, distribution of accurate information in the local community, mental health referral, and immigration assistance.

Statement of Purpose

Episcopal Relief & Development is the compassionate response of The Episcopal Church to human suffering in the world. Hearing God's call to seek and serve Christ in all persons and to respect the dignity of every human being, Episcopal Relief & Development serves to bring together the generosity of Episcopalians and others with the needs of the world.

Episcopal Relief & Development faithfully administers the funds that it receives from the church and raises from other sources. It provides relief in times of disaster and promotes sustainable development by identifying and addressing the root causes of suffering.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

- Bringing clean water to communities in need
- Protecting children from the threat of malaria
- Responding to disasters and emergencies in the United States and abroad
- Empowering women through microfinance

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Episcopal Relief and Development helps congregations come together to heal a world beyond our local communities.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Episcopal Relief provides worship resources, projects, and opportunities for congregations to reach beyond their own walls, working together for lasting change in the world.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

This is not a focus of Episcopal Relief and Development. Episcopal Relief and Development works in the area of relief for natural disasters within the United States. Episcopal Relief & Development facilitates healthier, more fulfilling lives in communities struggling with hunger, poverty, disaster and disease around the world.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

We collaborate with communities around the world to address three life-changing priorities – women, children and climate – creating authentic, lasting results that can be sustained by the communities themselves.

Our work with women focuses on helping communities promote the rights of women and children and move toward the vision that everyone deserves a life free from violence in a society where they are treated with dignity and respect. Only then can communities truly heal and thrive.

Our work with children supports and protects kids under age six so they reach appropriate health and developmental milestones. This focus on early development is foundational and critical to helping children achieve their full potential as future contributing members of their communities.

Our climate-related work focuses on how families and communities can work together to adapt to the effects of rapidly changing weather patterns. This work includes preparing for and recovering from climate-influenced events such as floods, hurricanes and other disasters.

Originally called the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief (the PB Fund), the organization was established in 1940 by The Episcopal Church.

What are your plans for the coming year?

To work with congregations to bring knowledge of Episcopal Relief and Development's work around the work to their congregations.

The FASB is comprised of members from both the lay and clergy orders, with members serving for a three-year term. To provide continuity, the members serve in three-year staggered terms, thus assuring new insights as well as historical precedence.

This year, the FASB was charged with reviewing and making a recommendation to Diocesan Council for three completed applications submitted by a parish for its 2023 asking. The FASB prayerfully and dutifully handled its responsibilities and communicated its recommendations to Diocesan Council for its final determination.

FRANCIS J MURDOCH SOCIETY

Statement of Purpose

The Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society administers a trust fund governed by Canon 37 of the Diocese of North Carolina which exists to aid "fit persons who desire to prepare for the ministry of the Church" (Canon 37, Sec.3). Under all ordinary circumstances, this aid is given in the form of a loan to a person enrolled in a seminary and which becomes cancelable upon ordination. Otherwise it shall be in full legal force and effect until paid.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

The committee is in conversation about how best to prioritize seminarians of greatest need, and how these funds might be used to assist with curacies in the diocese. We have not explored how this change might advance the mission priority of racial reckoning, given our narrow charge, but this is something the Trustees should consider in the near future. Changes to our funding model have proven difficult due to the original donor documents, but we are continuing the conversation.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Our work of funding seminarians allows newly ordained clergy to return to the diocese free of seminary debt, which is an essential part of fostering congregational vitality.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

We directly fund seminarians who are formed for the priesthood at their respective divinity schools.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

We have no participated in this work directly, however, we are more closely collaborating with the diocese in our funding.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

In 2022, the Murdoch Society distributed awards totally \$7,000 to 7 qualifying seminarians from the Diocese of NC. We have been in conversation with Missioner Maria Gillespie regarding how the Murdoch Society can streamline our own process in greater communication with the Diocesan Seminarian Support Grants. As part of this conversation in 2021, we again joined the Krebs application process so that the Diocese might be better stewards of both funds while collecting a more fulsome understating of each seminarian's particular financial needs.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The committee is in conversation about how best to prioritize seminarians of greatest need, and how these funds might be used to assist with curacies in the diocese. We have not explored how this change might advance the mission priority of racial reckoning, given our narrow charge, but this is something the Trustees should consider in the near future. Changes to our funding model have proven difficult due to the original donor documents, but we are continuing the conversation.

What are your plans for the coming year?

The Rev. Jacob Pierce has served as chair of the trustees since 2017. He has decided to step down from this role. Bishop Rodman has appointed the Rev. Marion Sprott-Goldson to take his place. The society will continue to explore how it can participate in the mission strategy priorities in conversation with diocesan staff.

GALILEE MINISTRIES OF EAST CHARLOTTE

Statement of Purpose

Founded in 2015 by the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, Galilee Ministries of East Charlotte (GMEC) operates the Galilee Center where we share our historic buildings and lush grounds with other nonprofits to provide direct services and programs to refugees, immigrants, migrants and our neighbors in East Charlotte. GMEC is a Special Ministry Mission, as defined by Canon 20, Section 2. Our mission is to provide radical Christian hospitality, welcome and refuge to our nonprofit partners, their clients and our neighbors in East Charlotte. Galilee Ministries relies on the generosity and kindness of donors such as the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, the Episcopal Parishes, individuals and grants to sustain our mission and share these gifts with the community we serve. We use these gifts for the purpose of "feeding body, mind and spirit."

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Galilee Ministries of East Charlotte serves a multi-cultural and multi-generational community. The partnerships we have at Galilee are core to advancing racial reckoning, justice and healing. It starts with who we serve.

East Charlotte is home to primarily working-class families with pockets of lower income individuals. Given the recent emergence of gentrification, we see young professionals of all races and ethnicities moving into the area. The primary refugee resettlement agencies working with the state of NC are Carolina Refugee Resettlement Agency and Catholic Charities. Catholic Charities (a GMEC partner) operates an after school childcare program serving refugee students from elementary to high school at the Galilee Center. Refugees who visit Galilee for services are from Afghanistan, Ukraine, Sudan, Ethiopia, Eretria, Syria, Myanmar, Congo, and other African and Central American countries. We also serve lower socio-economic individuals and families as well as schools with mostly Hispanic and African-American children from the neighborhood. The elderly and differently abled are also included in those who are welcomed at Galilee—that includes our immediate neighbors who live at St. Andrew's Homes adjacent to the Galilee Center.

We are advancing the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice and Healing through collaboration and donating our primary assets (i.e. our buildings and grounds) to nonprofits to provide food and nutrition; education; vocational training/workforce development and after school childcare. We have an edible garden and play space and a community garden worked by those we serve. Our partnerships, programs and services are targeted to achieve our goals, create community and connect all to opportunities and resources. The number of refugees being served by our partners is increasing with the re-opening of indoor activities post the height of the-COVID- 19 pandemic. Collectively we are serving >600 people at Galilee monthly.

To advance racial equality, justice and advocacy as well as to eliminate racial barriers we form partnerships to provide:

- 1. A safe and welcoming space for organizations and individuals to meet and make connections and form new friendships.
- 2. Culture classes for refugees, community meals, aquaponic tower garden workshops, and other opportunities for fellowship.
- 3. We share our buildings for worship services for various faiths and multiracial congregations.

Our Direct Services Partners

- Catholic Charities: After-school and summer enrichment programs for ~20 refugee children.
- Central Piedmont Community College: English as a Second Language (ESL) classes, career preparation counseling, workforce development (started Fall 2022) and U.S. Citizenship Naturalization Classes (resumed October 2022). (On avg. ~50 students/month attend classes.)
- Carolinas Road Runner Club's Community Kitchen Program: ServSafe Manager Certificate Training in culinary skills food handling, preparation and catering. Twelve students enrolled.
- Loaves and Fishes: Food pantry individual clients served have increased by 58% since the start of the year. There were 418 individual clients served in September. Families served during this period saw a 36% increase (146 vs. 107).

Inter-faith worship communities at Galilee

- Ethiopian Ministry 30 adults attend and 15 children are in Sunday School.
- Matters to Mission Charlotte (Presbyterian Church (USA)) 20% growth since worshipping at Galilee (30 regular attendees).

During 2022 some of the activities we have undertaken to advance this diocesan priority have included:

- All Galilee Board members completed Dismantling Racism: Reclaiming our Baptismal Promise by The Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina. The Board followed with a debrief and teambuilding led by Makeda Pennycook, Consultant and member of Christ Episcopal Church Charlotte, and Jenny Beaumont, Bishop's representative to the Galilee Ministries' Board and Missioner for Adult and Life-Long Formation for the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina.
- Galilee Ministries joined St. Peter's clergy and Social Justice Ministry to support March for Our Lives in advocating for an end to gun violence.
- Organizations such as Truth and Reconciliation Commission Reimagining America Project Charlotte's Board of Directors of the Commission use our facilities for meetings and a place to gather.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Galilee Ministries was formed as a missional initiative to serve God's call. While Galilee does not currently have a congregation of our own, we partner closely with Parishes in the Charlotte convocation who send volunteers to Galilee to serve in numerous ways e.g. as greeters, help with administrative tasks, serve in our kitchen, serve on our Board/Committees and to feed our neighbors at St. Andrew's Homes (a few examples). There are many generous offers of time and talent. We also receive grants/donations from several Parishes, special collections and individuals who have been friends of Galilee over the years.

This year the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina Council, with the Rt. Rev. Sam Rodman and bishop suffragan the Rt. Rev. Anne Hodges-Copple met at the Galilee Center. There was the celebration of a Holy Eucharist, the first since St. Andrew's Episcopal Church closed and Galilee was formed.

The Charlotte convocation Clericus met at Galilee. Offices at our Center are also used by the Sacred Ground instructors to plan and prepare for their classes. The Rt. Rev. Sam Rodman and The Rt. Rev. Bishop Anne Hodges-Copple and the Galilee Board of Directors will be having an upcoming lunch reception for the Rectors of the Charlotte Convocation, on October 26th 2022, at the Galilee Center.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

At Galilee there are numerous ways in which Formation is done. It is at the core of all that we do. We started with all Board members taking Dismantling Racism as the foundation of not only how we engage with the larger community but with a diverse Board, staff and the community we serve. This formation is essential to our success. Formation is being advanced through education as well as interacting and engaging with people from other countries, nationalities, races, ethnicities, backgrounds and ages that you find at Galilee.

We hosted >60 Episcopal youth this Spring/Summer from Palisades Episcopal School, Episcopal Outreach Camp, St. Martin's, Christ Episcopal Church Charlotte, St. Margaret's, Holy Comforter and other Parishes. The youth worked in our garden, helped fulfill Galilee's commitment to Adopt-A-Street and built relationships with ~10 children from the Catholic Charities after-school program.

With St. John's Episcopal Church and others, we celebrated Teachers' Appreciation Day with 100 teachers, staff, administrators and facilitators at Merry Oaks Elementary International Academy, Greater Enrichment Program and the Galilee Center partners.

People come to Galilee and can discern and hear where God is calling them. Dreams come true at Galilee. There is the opportunity to serve as a mentor and connector; to welcome a new family to America. Through our partnerships with other nonprofits in Charlotte and working with our

partners we were able to refer 2 new Afghan students to the Year Up workforce development program at CPCC. The young adults have been accepted to the program, are taking classes with CPCC and Year Up and are looking forward to internships and attractive well-paying careers (www.yearup.org).

At Galilee we provide a sanctuary for worship and fellowship and Sunday school for children to learn about Christ. We partner with other religious denominations and veteran agencies for them to deliver culture classes to 25 Afghan women and their 15 children.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

GMEC was formed through collaboration and partnerships and this continues to be our strength. In partnering with other nonprofits to provide direct services, workforce development and programming we can advance the diocesan mission strategy of collaboration and new communities. People come to Galilee and build community. Galilee is a place of building beloved community and collaboration. God's love is reflected everyday through the work we are doing at Galilee. A perfect example of collaboration at Galilee was introducing Central Piedmont Community College to our Community Kitchen Program partner. This collaboration during a monthly partner meeting gave birth to the new immersive language ESL workforce development program being offered at the Galilee Center, with 12 students initially enrolled for the inaugural class. Graduation will be in November 2022 and since starting in mid-September the students have served ~1165 meals, at various events. The next cohort of students will begin their 10-week course in January 2023, with 50 students having already expressed an interest in enrolling. CPCC/CKP are building a pipeline to fill seats in future cohorts.

Other outcomes of collaboration and new communities at the Galilee Center include the return of the U.S. Citizenship Naturalization classes, starting this month. Additionally, we now have the Charlotte Mecklenburg Mobile Library Unit visiting the Galilee Center monthly. We have hosted medical clinics and health fairs at Galilee, including Mecklenburg County Public Health COVID and Flu vaccine clinics. Forty people attended the recent health fair, of which >24 needed follow up medical care. There were 11 physicians and 23 other medical staff and volunteers in attendance. The mobile medical unit (One Charlotte Health Alliance with Novant and Atrium) visits Galilee each month providing basic medical services to the community. In early 2023, Galilee in conjunction with other inter-faith and Veteran nonprofits, will begin to host community meals for Afghan families experiencing isolation since arriving in the US—giving them an opportunity to gather and connect.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

Galilee has continued to enhance our urban park, Galilee Green and Community Garden, where neighbors gather to enjoy the environment, our green space in the heart of the city, enjoy the fruits and vegetables grown and cultivate vegetables from their native countries. We have 40 garden plots in the Community Garden and 100% of them are leased (each leased for a nominal

fee of \$10 annually) and there is a waiting list. We installed an irrigation drip system to water the orchard where we grow fig trees, pear trees, goji berries and blueberries.

The Universal Sacred Harvest 12 Hydroponic Tower Gardens are a new addition to the Galilee Center. This new project has been a way for fellowship and making new friends. People come together for workshops to learn about the tower gardens, how the vegetables are grown and harvested and to share new recipes.

Caring for our building and grounds and investing in maintaining our physical assets remains our priority to do God's work in serving others.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? We have also spent much of 2022 adopting best practices and enhancing our policies and procedures e.g. personnel manual, emergency preparedness plan, Board development and training, implementing enhanced controls, strengthening financial reporting, documenting

finance policies and procedures, having an audit that followed the Diocesan guidelines, updating partner agreements and insurance coverage, revising our Bylaws and team building.

At the end of October 2022, the Rev. Tom Brackett, Missioner for New Church Starts and Missional Initiatives, will be journeying with the Galilee Board on a pilgrimage to discern where God is leading our mission in crafting our vision for what is next for Galilee Ministries of East Charlotte.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The Galilee Ministries Executive Director of 6+ years retired at the end of 2021. We have had a part-time interim Executive Director who will also be retiring at year end. We have formed a Search Committee to recruit a new full-time Executive Director. This is opening doors for new ways of collaboration and engaging with new communities, with congregants, clergy and lay leaders. We are being more intentional on who is invited to serve on the Search Committee, seeking to have a diverse slate, people with the required knowledge and expertise in hiring, as well as a mix of those skilled/experienced in listening and discerning God's voice. Additionally, we met with Canon Catherine Massey, to learn best practices, the process of transition and transformation and to collaborate with her through this process.

What are your plans for the coming year?

Our goals are focused on Becoming a Beloved Community: Feeding Mind, Body and Spirit:

- Economic mobility make East Charlotte a prosperous and happy neighborhood to live, go to school and to work; make available access to education and skills-based training at Galilee.
- Outreach form strong partnerships to address the needs of vulnerable populations e.g. refugees, immigrants, migrants, elderly, differently abled, children and those struggling with other issues such as isolation.

- Through partnership provide access to healthcare and food
- Advocate for racial justice and equality (e.g. explore partnerships with EMM and GEMN)
- Be environmentally responsible
- Sustainable growth for our mission
- Spiritual ministry

Strong consideration should be given to:

- Programs that work toward empowerment; and
- Those programs where the award of small grants makes a significant impact.
- To begin or support programs designed to support racial justice and reconciliation, including programs that provide equitable access to enrichment opportunities for low-income African-American children who otherwise would lack such access.
- To provide emergency support for needy African American families and individuals
 (This may consist of special grants to pastoral discretionary accounts in missions with
 limited resources to support discretionary funds; it also might be done by funding a
 special emergency grant program through a community resource such as Crisis
 Assistance Ministries.)
- To support the initiation of new mission activities specifically aimed at low-income African Americans within and outside the worshiping community, provided that there is a plan for the sustainability of such activities within three years of the program's inception.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board's Mission, Goals and Purpose is in complete agreement with the Diocesan Mission Strategy of Racial Reckoning, Justice and Healing. 100% of the grants awarded by this board have been given to support initiatives in the African American Community in Charlotte, NC. That was the original intent at the inception of the Good Samaritan Fund and it remains the major tenant of grant awards even today. This work will continue into the foreseeable future.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board's goal is to support, (medium to long term), two African American Episcopal congregations in Charlotte. Our hope and prayer is that these grant will help these two congregations do more than just survive, but begin to thrive.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board awarded grants to St. Michael and All Angels - Charlotte and to The Chapel of Christ The King - Charlotte. These grants are eligible to fund initiatives that are most emergent including funding for Formation.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board supports the Diocesan Mission Strategy of Collaboration and New Communities through awarding grants to community groups, specifically The Charlotte School Choir and The Academy of Goal Achievers.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board supports the Diocesan Mission Strategy of Creation Care through individual member commitments and corporate prayer. The Fund's By-Laws do not allow for direct funding of this purpose.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board recognizes that there are increasingly fewer funding sources for church/religious organizations and our churches have fewer places to go for funding support. The Good Samaritan Fund Board's position is that we will unapologetically support sharing the Good News of God in Christ. After some lengthy discussions, the Board decided to significantly support two missions within the Charlotte Convocation with their multiple needs.

What are your plans for the coming year?

The Good Samaritan Fund Board will continue to fund its priorities with a focus on the African American Community within the Charlotte, NC Community at-large.

HISTORIOGRAPHER AND THE CHARTERED COMMITTEE FOR HISTORY AND ARCHIVES

Statement of Purpose

By Canon, the historiographer is charged with collecting, classifying, preserving, and publishing materials relating to the history of the Diocese. The historiographer is also responsible for the oversight of the Diocesan Archives and for providing oversight and direction to the archivist. The Chartered Committee serves as a council of advice to the historiographer.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

In April, the Committee hosted a diocesan History Day in Warrenton. The keynote speaker, Ebonee Davis of Virginia Theological Seminary, described the Racial Reparations work that she and others at VTS are doing. The History Day also highlighted the life and ministry of the Ven. Odell Greenleaf Harris, a native of Warren County, who led the fight for desegregation in Southern Virginia and Georgia in the 1940s and 50s. The event afforded attendees the opportunity to visit and learn more about 3 historic black churches in Warren and Halifax counties.

The historiographer and archivist are also actively engaged in providing timelines, documentation, images, and text for the "Telling Our Stories" Project, highlighting the black congregations of our diocese.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

The archivist has consulted with local congregations on establishing or maintaining their historical records, and she has assisted in collecting materials to help them with the celebration of landmark anniversaries. This work deepens vitality through fostering a congregational appreciation of abiding identity and mission in a particular community. The special initiative, begun by the historiographer, continues for locating and restoring (as needed) the early parish registers of our historic black churches.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

The historiographer has offered historical addresses at four parishes this year and continues to teach church history annually in the Deacons' Formation Program of the Diocese. He also taught a course on "Religion in Local North Carolina History" for the OLLI program at Duke University.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

By hosting a diocesan-wide "History Day" in April and "History Keepers" workshop in October, the historiographer and archivist have fostered collaboration among congregations. In their

research and writing, the historiographer and archivist have also highlighted earlier collaborative efforts, such as the founding of La Iglesia El Buen Pastor in Durham and the Ministerial Training Program at St. Augustine's School which operated between 1867 and 1894.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

The archivist has made available records of our past work in the area of Environmental Ministries.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? In September, the archivist and historiographer drafted a report on diocesan archival storage and processing requirements in anticipation of the sale of our current Diocesan House property. The archivist has also been active in helping to secure the records of recently-closed churches and transfer them to diocesan custody.

The archivist has also been active in helping to secure the permanent records of recently-closed churches for transfer to diocesan custody. For the past two years volunteer assistance from History & Archives Committee member Margo Acomb has helped reduce the backlog of closed church processing.

Staff and external research requests and on-site church consultations remain vital aspects of the archivist's work. For 2022, these have included: (1) documented responses to more than 75 individual requests for information; and (2) consultations with congregations regarding local church history and the storage and organization of records. Additional consultations were made with five congregations celebrating 150th or 200th anniversaries between 2021 and 2024.

The historiographer responds to queries that concern matters of historical assessment and interpretation.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

The historiographer and archivist are acutely aware of the impact of such changes and seek to provide historical context for the challenges the diocese is currently facing, by reminding us of how we have sought to address similar challenges in the past. For example, demographic change in North Carolina was something Bishop Thomas Fraser called upon the Diocese to confront in his 1964 Convention Address. Demographic change has been an especially profound and abiding factor in our racial history. For example, Bishop Henry B. Delany noted the challenges for black congregations posed by the Great Migration after World War One.

What are your plans for the coming year?

The historiographer and archivist are prepared to assist in the relocation of the diocesan archives in the coming year. They also will work with the Chartered Committee and other interested parties in hosting another History Day and a History Keepers Workshop.

The archivist is working with an intern from the School of Library Science at UNC-CH to complete the digitization of our diocesan newspapers and make them accessible.

The historiographer will continue work toward completing the National Register Nomination for All Saints', Warrenton, and toward compiling a racial history of the diocese.

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

Statement of Purpose

We are responsible for hiring the investment managers to invest the proceeds of the diocesan Consolidated Pooled Funds. As of 9/30/22 the market value of said fund was \$\$34,756,503.42. This represents a decline YTD of 22.80%, or roughly .40 ahead of the custom benchmark for the investment pool. Our last 3 years produced an annualized average annual return net of fees of 2.01%, ahead of the benchmark, which was 1.86%. Since inception date of 12/31/16, the Fund has returned 5.20% average annual return versus the benchmark of 4.88% Our investment manager of record has been Sterling Capital Management, LLC, a division of Truist.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Our committee has diverse representation, our Funds have an ESG overlay, certified by Sterling Capital Management, LLC on a quarterly basis.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Our outreach includes presenting the investment report to member Parishes throughout the Diocese and the report is available on the diocesan website.

What are your plans for the coming year?

Our goal is to oversee the fund in such a manner as to meet or exceed the benchmark with a risk adjusted return, and provide for 4.5% distributions to member Parishes to allow them to support the work of their congregation.

KANUGA

Statement of Purpose

Kanuga is a gathering place inviting all people to connect with each other, nature, and the Creator.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? If 2021 was an intentional but careful step toward welcoming guests to return "home" to Kanuga as we began to emerge from the darkness of the pandemic, 2022 was a sinking into a renewed rhythm of worship and healing—made possible by the Kanuga community's support and a much stronger financial position.

Kanuga is indeed continuing along a path toward financial health, and has made progress again in 2022. We were fortunate that our fundraising efforts in 2022 resulted in strong annual giving, a trend that has been on the increase since 2020. These funds are now being utilized to move Kanuga forward in programming, rather than to prop up our operations. Operations are now close to a break-even scenario in which expenses are covered, staff are compensated well, and improvements to many areas, including food and beverage, are well underway.

With this renewed focus on excellence in programming, in 2022 we were pleased to host and sponsor myriad events and programs, including Nuevo Amanecer, Winterlight and Youth Week, Camp Kanuga, Awakening Soul, Daughters of the King, dozens of parishes, Kanuga Christian Formation, Renewal, Iconography, Mountain Trail Outdoor School, and many more. We have introduced twice-annual service weekends to the calendar, and developed a new concert series of outdoor performances. We are thankful for these successes, but this list doesn't begin to describe the depth of spirit that exists on campus as we re-gather to worship in person.

In 2022, as a community grounded in appreciation and empathy, we prayed for each other and the world in a visible way through a new prayer ribbon ministry that began as a response to the invasion of Ukraine. Within days, dozens of ribbons were inscribed with personal prayers and hung in The Chapel of The Transfiguration. And then, one day, we were asked if a prayer could be added for a loved one. Soon, an entire system was developed using ribbon colors to denote specific types of prayer, and a growing rainbow of gently swaying ribbons was suspended from the ceiling.

Indeed, thousands of campers, youth conference teens, adult conference participants, staff members, lodging guests, mountain bikers, clergy and lay leaders, and people from all walks have written prayers on these ribbons. The meditations themselves include everything from prayers for the ill to those who are victims of war, violence, and poverty, to those who govern, those who sin, and those who bring us joy.

In effect, Kanuga's prayer ribbon ministry has evolved to serve as a visible form of the Prayers of the People. When I walk into the Chapel now, underneath these prayers that are lifted high

toward the Spirit, thousands of ribbons dancing in the sunlight, I sense the strength of the Kanuga mission in a real and tangible way, and feel the Holy Spirit at work.

I feel hope. I feel gratitude. And I hope you will join me in praying:

"For the good earth which God has given us, and for the wisdom and will to conserve it, let us pray to the Lord." —from Prayers for the People

Thanks to all who have shared their wisdom, voice, financial resources, friendship, partnership, and commitment to Kanuga. Our community demonstrates every blessed day the wisdom and the will to keep Kanuga intact and thriving for many generations to come.

With 18 denominations representing over 6,200 congregations in N.C., the Council provides incarnational evidence of Christian Unity. By creating unity without expecting uniformity, member bodies collaborate on matters that contribute to the flourishing of God's creation. We are grateful to Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina for their support and for the leadership on our Governing Board provided by the Reverend Sarah Woodard.

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? Currently our priority areas include:

- Reparations to Restoration: A Call to Action. With representation from each of the 18 denominational members of the Council, we are creating a resource that can used by any congregation or individual to learn about the need for government reparations while beginning the work of local restoration. We are drawing on the wisdom of those who have written about reparations while framing our work through the Christian teaching of confession, forgiveness, and restoration. - Confederate Monument Removal. Related to the above, but with its own emphasis, the Council has joined the work of the N.C. Commission on Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Criminal Justice in their effort to move confederate monuments from courthouse lawns. - Eco-Justice Connection (EJC). This multi-faith program area focuses on environmental and climate justice, with an emphasis in "advocating with compassion." A keystone initiative of EJC is NC Interfaith Power & Light. EJC's program mission is to educate, inspire, and mobilize people of faith and conscience to act on climate change as a moral imperative. - Partners in Health and Wholeness (PHW) provides tools to help faith communities form healthy habits by supporting congregation based health ministries with resources and mini-grants. Other PHW focus areas include mental health, substance use disorder, and issues related to healthy aging. We are currently offering grant opportunities to BIPOC faith communities to enhance their mental health capacity. For more information, contact phwinfo@ncchurches.org.
- The Opioid Crisis and HIV/AIDS educates faith leaders about compassionate responses to these growing health concerns and opportunities to reduce the associated stigmas. We provide avenues to engage the overdose crisis and the AIDS epidemic by connecting congregations to resources in their communities. - Gun Violence Prevention advocacy focuses on telling the truth about gun violence in our country. We know the majority of gun deaths are suicides; the next highest number is homicides, usually among people who know each other or who are related to one another. NORTH CAROLINA EPISCOPAL CHURCH FOUNDATION

Statement of Purpose

"The purposes for which the Corporation is formed are to aid by making loans, grants, gifts, or otherwise, parishes, missions, or unorganized groups of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, or institutions owned by the Diocese, in the erection, repair, renovation, or improvement of church buildings, grounds or property, the acquisition of church properties and the payment of priests or lay workers, under such rules and regulations as the Directors of this Corporation shall hereafter from time to time establish." (from 1955 charter)

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Our support of the Sustainability Fund assists several historically Black congregations and offers our commitment to them as diocesan partners.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

ECF voted to give 40% of its annual income to the Sustainability Fund of the Diocese to support selected vulnerable congregations, so that they might develop mission plans over a longer horizon and not have to worry about applying for funding each year. A few more Innovation and Adaptation Grants to vulnerable congregations were also made from the monies ECF made available during the Covid-19 pandemic.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

ECF was privileged to award a grant to Church of the Advocate in Carrboro for its Fold and Field initiative which, among other benefits, will provide more Christian Formation space.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

ECF has offered Green Grants totaling \$13, 100 to churches to reduce their energy consumption and their carbon footprint. We also received updates from churches which received grants in 2021 showing their progress in installing solar panels.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

With the advent of the Sustainability Fund, the NCECF is adjusting its evaluation of grant applications to comport with the reality of less discretionary award money. In addition to the merits of the proposals, we are considering any past awards the congregation may have received as well as the capacity of the congregation to fund their project through other means. We hope that this adjustment will help our resources go where they are most needed and most helpful.

What are your plans for the coming year?

As our granting process has become more competitive, we might take a look at our application cycle to insure that we have funds available throughout the year for disbursement.

PENICK VILLAGE

Statement of Purpose

We are a loving family creating a loving community by making each day great for one another. What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? After two years of leadership changes and challenges with the Covid pandemic, Penick Village has begun a new chapter in its history. As an organization, Penick Village has been deeply engaged over the past year in the transition of its new CEO Chip Cromartie; the creation of a campus expansion plan; and a dedication for Penick to become a premiere employer of choice as it addresses staffing challenge facing our industry.

As a faith-based community, Penick offers programs and opportunities on multiple levels to engage residents for well-being, spiritual growth, meaning and quality of life as they move through the continuum of care offering independent living, assisted living, skilled nursing and memory care.

Weekly worship services are held in all levels of care, including Sunday mornings in the Chapel of the Transfiguration and in our North Building Chapel for health care residents. Each week there are two Bible studies offered on campus, and numerous other programs like newly introduced "Meditative Coloring and Prayer."

Penick Village continues to engage the cares of the world and reach out as neighbor. Its largest program is one that offers the assurance of Bishop Penick half a century ago, that no person would be asked to leave Penick should their finances run out. Through this "Benevolent Assistant" (BA) program, residents are able to live out their lives in the comfort of the community they called home. Some data includes for 2022:

Benevolent Assistance Program:

- 14 received benevolent assistance and 7 received Medicaid adjustments, so 21 total received Charity Care over our last fiscal year.
- Penick Village reported \$871,871 in Charity Care, of that \$478,841 went to the Benevolent Assistance.
- The BA program is supported by the annual Penick Art Show, which netted \$101,846 in 2022.

Other Outreach

- Residents created "Ukraine Bracelets" of yellow and blue beads, worn as a sign of the community's prayers for the people of the Ukraine.
- In 2022 Penick was involved with Habitat for Humanity's "Apostle's Build" through financial support and involvement by residents and Chaplain's participation with Habitat's monthly pastors group meetings.
- Penick continues to support the Thrift Shop of Emmanuel Church in Southern Pines' through monthly donations by residents.

 Penick Chapel has been working with members of Emmanuel Church to create a new visitor's program for Emmanuel's care team to make visits at Penick's nursing and memory communities.

Staff Support

- Penick Village maintains its Theide Program offering grants and loans to help staff who are in a crisis situation. The Theide Program also provides education grants for staff members with \$1,000 a semester in education support.
- Penick is just completing the creation of its employee housing initiative that would provide staff rental units on its' Shibiu Gardens property. The initiative is meant to address employees who are unhoused, endure long distance commutes, or find themselves unsafe where they are living.

The Chaplain is a member of the Faculty/Staff Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging (DEIB) Committee, along with being a Co-Advisor for the student Inclusion Ambassadors. Recent efforts have included addressing DEIB issues in school Chapel services, hosting "Difficult Dialogues" with students, raising awareness about the history of slavery on campus, and intervening and educating in situations where racial or ethnic bias is displayed.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Congregational Vitality isn't directly applicable to our setting, but we do work to educate our students and broaden their horizons with regard to the enormous variety of worship traditions and styles and spiritual practices that fall under the umbrella of Christianity (while remaining rooted in the Episcopal tradition).

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Formation is a huge focus of the Chapel program at Saint Mary's. We treat our twice-weekly all-school services as a kind of "Worship Laboratory," allowing students (and employees) to explore the perennial, and often difficult, questions of faith together. Formal and informal study of Scripture, including its application to our everyday lives, is a constant thread through all of our programming.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Collaboration & New Communities?

We have hosted guest preachers from Episcopal parishes and other denominations, and this fall has seen a small "new community" gather in our Chapel every Tuesday evening -- a meditative engagement with Scripture and prayer in Spanish, called "La Palabra."

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Creation Care?

SMS has "adopted" both a section of Hillsborough Street and the Pigeon Run Branch (stream) in Edna Metz Wells Park through the City of Raleigh, and groups of students regularly patrol and sweep those areas of all trash and recyclables. We also include messages about Creation Care in our regular prayers and our worship services.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Our School's recently updated Strategic Plan includes goals and action items related to increasing local partnerships, affirming and enhancing our DEIB efforts, and diversifying the communities and networks from which we draw prospective students and families.

What are your plans for the coming year?

Engaging worship, multiple options for study/formation, courageous conversations, organized prayer time, fellowship opportunities, moral and character development, and more!

SEWANEE, THE UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese? Former Vice-Chancellor Reuben Brigety was confirmed in July by the U.S. Senate as the U.S. ambassador to the Republic of South Africa and has taken up his post. His official portrait was unveiled at the fall meeting of the Trustees and his parents attended on his behalf.

Nancy Berner, former Provost and Professor of Biology, is serving as the Acting Vice-Chancellor this year. The Search Committee for the 18th Vice-Chancellor is in place, search consultants have been identified, listening sessions with all constituencies (students, faculty, staff, parents, alumni, and community members) have been conducted, a leadership profile has been shared, and interviews with applicants have begun.

The Names and Places Committee is wrapping up its research and is in the process of making their final recommendations to the Board of Regents. The Roberson Project on Slavery, Race, and Reconciliation at the University of the South recently celebrated its 5th anniversary of investigating the university's historical entanglements with slavery and slavery's legacies. Sibby Anderson-Thompkins is in her second year as the inaugural Vice-Provost for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Future goals include the creation of a Truth, Racial Healing, and Transformation campus center.

The Regents and administration are working together to address the faculty and staff housing shortage and the hiring and compensation of faculty.

There are 440 students in the first-year class, including a large class of international students, and the class is 6% more diverse than last year. They are 19% Episcopalian. The total number of applications for matriculation in 2023 is up by 50%. The early decision pool has more than doubled. These admissions gains are especially important as the upcoming demographic cliff approaches.

60% of students in the College participate in Greek life. Many lessons have been learned over the past couple of years and the College is working to build a culture of healthy socializing.

The University celebrated the 50th anniversary of Title IX and inducted an all-women athlete class into the Hall of Fame in 2022.

A strategic planning process begun in 2021 has continued, albeit at a modified level, to allow input from the new Vice-Chancellor. Following a vote by the College faculty to pause the strategic planning process, Provost Scott Wilson has worked with other administrators to formulate a revised timeline. The goals of revision are to remove operational elements, provide more flexibility for input by the next Vice-Chancellor, and foster greater collaboration among subcommittees.

The School of Theology's renovation project at Hamilton Hall will begin in early 2023 with an anticipated completion date of fall 2024. \$13 million has been raised, out of the total \$18 million needed. An additional capital project is underway at Thompson Union, which is slated to contain a lounge, café, event space, and outdoor commons.

The Rev. Jemonde Taylor of the Diocese of North Carolina received the 2022 service award from the School of Theology.

Statement of Purpose

Thompson Child & Family Focus (Thompson) is called to strengthen children, families and communities through healing, teaching, worship and play. Founded in 1886 by the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, we transform lives through early childhood, family stability and mental health services. We take a trauma-informed, evidence-based, whole-health, 2gen approach to serving our community. Our vision is "All children healthy, all families thriving, all communities strong."

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Racial Reckoning, Justice & Healing?

Thompson is committed to the ongoing transformational work that seeks to address both the visible and invisible practices, policies, and biases that shape organizational culture and work experiences. Our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion is critical to the organization's overall success. Our goal is to foster an inclusive environment by celebrating what makes each of us unique and by encouraging authenticity among our staff and the clients we serve.

To this end, Thompson's DEI committee, supported by Chief Operations Officer, developed a comprehensive action plan to ensure compliance with CLAS standards and to maintain agency focus and rigor on continuous quality improvement regarding diversity, equity, and inclusion. We set specific targets in the categories of Governance, Leadership & Workforce, Communication & Language Assistance, and Engagement, Continuous Improvement & Accountability.

Governance, Leadership & Workforce

• Thompson offers a multitude of virtual diversity training opportunities for all staff. At least two of these trainings are incorporated into program-specific staff meetings each year.

Communication & Language Assistance

- Our community-based services and child development center intake packets and assessments are available in Spanish.
- Our agency's website content can be translated into multiple languages.
- Interpreters are available as needed for meetings with parents or communicating with clients who speak other languages.
- Our signage and marketing materials include alternative language versions.

Engagement, Continuous Improvement & Accountability

- Our DEI policy and practices are discussed at new employee orientation.
- We maintain a calendar of events aligned with celebratory national days, weeks, and/or months of recognition for ethnic, gender, religious, and other groups.
- We distribute a report on our agency's demographic information quarterly to all staff.

- We conduct an annual staff survey to gather feedback on staff awareness, understanding and support and ideas around diversity issues and initiatives.
- We complete an annual review of our Cultural & Linguistic Appropriate Services policy and CLAS standards.
- At present, 72% of our leaders are minority and 79% are female. Compared with the minority EEOC Benchmark of 50.5%, we are 21.5% above the target. Compared to our minority leadership percentage in October 2021 (69.3%) we have increased by 2.7%.
- Seventeen percent (17%) of our board members are Black/African American, 83% are White. Fifty-six percent (56%) are male and 44% are female. Our current Board Chair is Black/African American male.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Congregational Vitality?

Thompson aligns with the diocesan mission strategy of recognizing the impact of the pandemic on congregations for external collaboration and community-building. We seek to engage parishioners in our mission and work by serving on our Board and/or committees and volunteering in various capacities that utilize their talents to strengthen the communities we serve.

What work has your committee, commission or board done to advance the diocesan mission strategy priority of Formation?

Thompson aligns with the diocesan mission strategy priority of offering lifelong and multigenerational formation to support discipleship throughout the diocese by offering health and wholeness programs that build resilience and address trauma. We also support and strengthen the faith journeys of the youth in our residential mental health programs as they engage with our Spiritual Life and Arts Facilitator.

How is your work evolving and adapting to a changing mission field and the changing demographics of our diocese?

Thompson is flexible and adaptable to the needs we see in the communities we serve. As a needs-based organization, we evaluate the most pressing concerns facing children and families, and respond with appropriate evidence-based services while taking care not to duplicate the efforts of other organizations. Especially considering the COVID-19 pandemic and economic downturn, we are acutely aware of the social-emotional and financial needs of children, youth and their parents/caregivers, and are positioned to meet those needs by delivering high-quality services. We also know the changing demographics of our communities, and implement the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion strategies detailed above to be sure that our clients are represented and served well.

In 2023, we continue to work toward our strategic goals, including but not limited to:

- preparing infrastructure for growth
- implementing current/new programs
- acquiring & retaining funding partners, and high-quality, top tier talent
- increasing brand awareness

TRINITY CENTER

What other work has your committee, commission or board done on behalf of the Diocese?

For many reasons this has been a great year for Trinity Center. Although we still have some hurdles to climb as a result of COVID, we have experienced some major milestones. After a lengthy search process, we were able to hire an outstanding new Executive Director for the Center. John Koch, a native North Carolinian, but coming to us from the Bishop's Ranch in California, accepted the job as the new Executive Director of Trinity Center. He brings a wealth of experience and knowledge of conference center and camping program management. We are extremely excited and pleased to have him on board.

We sold approximately 3.5 acres of undeveloped oceanfront property that was not developed and we had no plans to develop. This enabled us to repay the debt we had incurred to the diocese for helping us survive the closure due to COVID. It also is allowing us to set up a sizeable endowment to insure the future of Trinity Center. This has been something the Center has needed since its inception.

Our summer camping program operated at 80% capacity this summer, based on CDC and ACA recommendations. Our summer Sound to Sea program was also very successful. We had to deal with one short COVID outbreak in summer camp. Now that the school year has begun, our residential Sound to Sea program is up and running and accepting school groups for the year.

CONSTITUTION, CANONS, AND RULES OF ORDER OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

As of Adjournment of the 207th Annual Convention, November 19, 2022

CONSTITUTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Article I

The Church in the Diocese of North Carolina accedes to and adopts the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, as set forth in General Convention thereof, and acknowledges its authority accordingly.

Article II

- **Section 1.** There shall be an annual Convention of the Church in this Diocese at such time and place as may be determined by the next preceding Convention, or in the event of no such determination, then at such time and place as may be fixed by the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Standing Committee.
- **Section 2.** The time and place of the annual Convention may be changed, or Special Conventions called, by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, subject to such canonical provisions as may hereafter be made.
- **Section 3.** Written notice of a Special Convention shall be given by the Secretary to every member of the clergy who is eligible for a seat and vote in the Convention and to the senior warden of every parish and every mission therein at least 60 days before the date thereof. This notice shall specify the purpose for which the Special Convention is called, and no other business shall be in order except by unanimous consent of the delegates.

Article III

- **Section 1.** The Convention shall be composed of the two orders, clerical and lay.
- **Section 2.** The Bishop of the Diocese, or in the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor, or any bishop in charge, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall, in the order named above, if present, preside at all meetings of the Convention and shall appoint all committees unless it be otherwise ordered.
- **Section 3.** The members of the Clergy Order of the Convention include (i) every active and resigned bishop of this Diocese whose principal residence is located therein, (ii) every member of the clergy of the Church who is canonically resident in the Diocese and whose principal residence is located therein, and (iii) every other member of the clergy of the Church, or member of the clergy of a church in full communion with The Episcopal Church, who is regularly serving a parish or mission in union with the Convention or another ministry within the Diocese recognized by the Ecclesiastical Authority. All members of the Clergy Order are entitled to seat and voice in the Convention. The restriction of residence as above required shall not apply to professors, tutors, or students in any recognized theological seminary of this Church, or college maintained and

governed in part by the Diocese, or to any officers or members of the staff of the Executive Council, or to chaplains in the Armed Forces of the United States, or to members of the clergy in charge of congregations of this Diocese.

Except as otherwise provided in Article IX, Section 7, every member of the Clergy Order who is canonically resident in this Diocese and is regularly serving the Diocese, a parish or mission in union with the Convention, or another ministry within the Diocese recognized by the Ecclesiastical Authority is entitled to vote. [Amended by Act 2007-2; Amended by Act 2010-1; Amended by Act 2018-1; Amended by Act 2019-5.]

Section 4. Except as otherwise provided in Article IX, Section 7, each parish and mission in union with the Convention shall be entitled to be represented at its sessions by lay delegates whose number shall be determined in proportion to the number of enrolled adults who are communicants in good standing of the parish or mission as specified by canon.

These delegates shall be elected by the vestry from among the enrolled confirmed adults who are communicants in good standing of the parish or mission.

The delegates shall be chosen in a manner provided by canon to assure that approximately one-third of the entire lay membership of the Convention is subject to election each year. The initial terms of delegates elected by virtue of this article shall be determined by the Secretary of the Convention in accordance with canon. Subject to changes in representation required by changes in the numbers of enrolled adults who are communicants in good standing of parishes and missions, and upon the expiration of each term thereafter, each vestry shall elect for a term of three years a successor for each lay delegate whose term has expired.

Each vestry shall be entitled to elect, for one-year terms, a number of alternate delegates, subject to the same qualifications, equal to the delegates elected, who shall be authorized, in the order of their election, to fill any vacancy that may occur in the delegation originally chosen. [Amended by Act 2007-3; Amended by Act 2010-1]

Section 5. When a mission desires to be admitted into union with the Convention, it shall follow the same procedure, so far as applicable, as that prescribed for the admission of a parish.

Section 6. No person, clerical or lay, under ecclesiastical censure publicly declared by a competent tribunal, shall be admissible to a seat in the Convention. No person shall be allowed to represent more than one parish or mission in the same Convention.

Section 7. If any parish or mission shall neglect or decline to appoint delegates, or if any of those appointed shall neglect or be prevented from attending, such parish or mission shall nevertheless be bound by the acts of the Convention.

Section 8. The Convention may admit into Union with the Convention a worshipping community associated with a campus ministry established by the Diocesan Council and recognized by the Ecclesiastical Authority. Each such community shall be entitled to elect one lay delegate to be chosen for a term of one year in a manner prescribed by Canon. The lay delegate shall be elected from among the members of the community who are enrolled, confirmed, adult communicants in good standing of a parish or mission of The Episcopal Church. A lay delegate so chosen is not eligible for election as a

delegate from any parish or mission in Union with the Convention. [Added by Act 2011-3]

Section 9. The Convention may by canon make provision for the selection of not more than seven lay delegates to represent the youth of the Diocese. Such delegates shall be enrolled confirmed communicants in good standing of a parish or mission of this Diocese who are between the ages of sixteen and eighteen as of the convening of the Annual Convention for which chosen and who have not matriculated at an institution of higher learning. [Added by Act 2016-1]

Article IV

[Amended on Second Reading in 2000]

Section 1. The Convention shall be the sole judge of the election of its own members. It shall have power to adopt rules of order for its own government, elect officers and raise funds, and shall also have such other legislative powers as may be necessary and proper for the well-being of the Diocese.

Section 2. The Convention shall have no power to pass any canon infringing the Episcopal Authority, or affecting the spiritual condition of the Diocese, against the express dissent of the Bishop stated at that or the ensuing annual Convention. This shall not prevent the Convention from offering independently of the Bishop resolutions of advice or inquiry.

Article V

[Amended on second reading in 2009]

To constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, the presence of a majority of all the clergy entitled to vote, and of a majority of all the lay delegates authorized to be chosen as provided by canon, shall be necessary. Any lesser number shall be competent to receive reports and to recess or adjourn.

Article VI

Section 1. Upon any question before the Convention, on the request of any clerical or lay delegate sustained by ten other delegates present and voting, the two orders shall vote separately. In all cases of a vote by orders each clerical member shall be entitled to one vote, and each lay delegate shall be entitled to one vote, and a concurrence of majorities of both orders shall be necessary to a decision. When no such division is called for, each member shall be entitled to one vote.

Section 2. All elections shall be by ballot, unless otherwise unanimously ordered.

Article VII

[Amended on Second Reading by Act 2021-10]

Section 1. Upon nomination by the Ecclesiastical Authority, the Convention shall annually elect a Secretary, who shall hold office until the next annual Convention, or until a successor is elected and qualified.

Section 2. Should a vacancy occur in the office of Secretary, by death or otherwise, the unexpired term shall be filled by appointment by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Section 3. The Secretary shall perform the duties prescribed by canon, and such other services as may be required by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Section 4. Upon nomination by the Ecclesiastical Authority, the Convention shall annually elect a Treasurer of the Diocese, who shall have such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by canon or required by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Treasurer shall hold office until the next annual Convention, or until a successor is elected and qualified. Should a vacancy occur in the office of Treasurer, by death or otherwise, the unexpired term shall be filled by appointment by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Section 5. The Secretary and the Treasurer shall be eligible to hold other offices in the Diocese either by election or appointment.

Article VIII

[Amended on Second Reading in 2000, 2008, and 2021]

Section 1. The Standing Committee or Council of Advice to the Bishop, shall consist of five clergy of the Diocese and four members of the laity who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing. The term of office shall be for three years, with three members being elected at each annual Convention. Any member of the Committee whose immediately prior service has been for less than three continuous years shall be eligible for re-election to a full three year term; otherwise, no elected member shall be eligible to serve again until two years have elapsed following the expiration of their term of office. [Amended by Act 2008-1 and Act 2021-1]

Section 2. The Committee shall have power to fill any vacancy that may occur in its own body between the annual meetings of the Convention in accordance with the applicable canon. [Amended by Act 2008-1]

Section 3. When there is no Bishop, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and as such may invite the temporary services of other bishops, and, for due cause, may change the time or place of the annual meetings of the Convention. It may also summon Special Conventions when there is no Bishop, and shall do so upon the call of one-third of the clergy of the Diocese, or of one-third of the parishes in union with the Convention, as appearing upon the lists of the Journal last before published. And although there be a Bishop, the Standing Committee shall have power to call Special Conventions for the purpose of considering and dealing properly with threatened or existing disciplinary proceedings against a Bishop, and shall do so upon a similar requisition by the clergy or laity.

Article IX

[Amended on Second Reading in 2006]

Section 1. Any 100 or more confirmed adult communicants in good standing of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States may organize themselves into a parish, and be received into union with the Convention, by taking such steps as may be provided for by canon. And the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese may organize a mission in

such manner as shall be provided by canon, in any part of the Diocese not included within the neighborhood of a parish in union with the Convention.

- **Section 2.** It shall always be competent for the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, with the written consent of the rector of any parish, a copy of which shall be filed with the Secretary of the Convention, to organize a mission within the neighborhood of said parish. The ministers of such a mission shall be independent of the rector and responsible only to the Ecclesiastical Authority. If the consent of the rector be denied, an appeal may be taken to the Bishop, whose decision, if with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, shall be final.
- **Section 3.** In all parochial and mission elections only those shall be entitled to vote who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing, and who thereby consent to be governed by the Constitution and Canons of this Church as are or may be adopted by the General Convention, and the Convention of the Diocese pursuant thereto.
- **Section 4.** Any parish or mission ceasing to be represented in the Convention for two successive years, or any parish or mission resisting the authority of the Convention or the Ecclesiastical Authority, may be suspended from the right of representation, or its connection with the Convention be dissolved, by a vote of a majority of all the clergy present and entitled to vote, and a majority of lay delegates present and entitled to vote. For purposes of this section, the authority of both the Convention and the Ecclesiastical Authority is as defined by the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America and by the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina. No such suspension or dissolution shall take place without previous inquiry by the Standing Committee or a committee appointed by the Standing Committee for the purpose, and a report to the Convention upon the facts of the case; nor until 30 days' notice to the rector or vestry of the parish or the vicar or vestry of the mission, or in the case there be none then to a member of the parish or mission in default. [Amended by Act 2007-4.]
- **Section 5.** Any parish which receives aid from the mission funds of the Diocese and does not, for two consecutive years, pay its proportion of the salary of the minister serving it, shall be deprived of the right to vote in the Convention until such arrears be paid or remitted by the Convention.
- **Section 6.** Any parish or mission which shall fail to observe and comply with the conditions and requirements of Title I, Canon 8, of the General Convention relative to the Church Pension Fund, shall be deprived of the right to vote in the Convention until its obligation is fully discharged.
- Section 7. Each parish and mission shall give in support of the Mission and Ministry Budget of the Diocese an amount equal to a tithe (10%) of its total operating income for the preceding year, or such greater percentage, not to exceed fourteen percent (14%), as may have been established by the Convention. The Diocesan Council may reduce the amount required of any parish or mission for good cause shown. The clergy and lay delegates of any parish or mission which fails to comply with this obligation shall be deprived of the right to vote in the Convention and the parish or mission shall be subject

to such other sanctions as may be imposed by canon until the obligation has been fully discharged. [Amended by Act 2010-1]

Section 8. All real and personal property held by or for the benefit of any parish, mission, or congregation is held in trust for the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and the Diocese of North Carolina. The existence of this trust, however, in no way limits the power and authority of the parish, mission, or congregation otherwise existing over such property so long as the particular parish, mission, or congregation remains part of, and subject to, the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and its Constitution and Canons.

Article X

- **Section 1.** Any presbyter regularly called to the charge of a parish and entering thereupon, shall during the time of such charge, be held to be the rector of said parish.
- **Section 2.** Rectors are recognized as having, by virtue of their office, the exclusive regulation, under their canonical superiors, of all the spiritual concerns of the parishes they serve; as being entitled at all times to have access to the church building, and to open the same for the services or instruction of this Church, as they may deem proper; to call meetings of the vestry or congregation; when present, to preside in the same, and, in case of a tie, to cast the deciding vote.

Article XI

The Convention shall pass canons for the trial of members of the clergy.

Article XII

[Amended on second reading in 2009]

When a Bishop is to be elected the Convention shall vote by written ballot and separately by orders; and a concurrence on the same ballot of a majority of all the clergy entitled to vote in the Convention, whether present or not, and of a majority of all lay delegates authorized to be chosen as provided by canon, whether present or not, shall be necessary to an election.

Article XIII

No new canon, or change in an existing canon, shall be considered or adopted, without first having been submitted to and reported on to the Convention by its Commission on Constitution and Canons. Nor shall the same be adopted on the day on which proposed, except by a two-thirds vote of those entitled to vote at that Convention.

Article XIV

This constitution may be altered or amended only upon:

- (a) The concurrence of a majority of both orders who are present and entitled to vote at the annual Convention at which the alteration or amendment is proposed, voting separately by orders; and
- **(b)** The adoption of the proposed alteration or amendment at the next ensuing annual Convention by the concurrence of a majority of both orders who are present and entitled to vote, voting separately by orders. At this Convention the consideration of a proposed amendment may be postponed to the next annual Convention by a vote of two-

thirds of both orders present and entitled to vote, not voting by orders unless required under the provision of Article VI.

Article XV

[Amended on Second Reading in 1991]

All constitutional and canonical enactments shall take effect from and after the adjournment of the Convention at which they shall have been ratified or adopted.

CANONS OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

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Title D-I: Convention

Canon D-I.1 Members of Convention

Section 1. *Clergy*. Before the opening of the annual Convention or of a Special Convention, the Secretary shall apply to the Ecclesiastical Authority for a list of clergy entitled to seats, and shall receive such list at least 120 days before the opening of an annual Convention, or 60 days before a Special Convention. From this list the Secretary shall prepare, at least 90 days prior to the annual Convention and 30 days prior to a Special Convention, and publish from this list the official clergy roll of the Convention, which roll shall be *prima facie* evidence of the right to seats therein. After the Secretary's publication of the roll, the Ecclesiastical Authority may certify to the Secretary additional clergy entitled by the Constitution to seat in the Convention until one hour prior to the opening session of the Convention. [Amended by Act 2007-5; Amended by Act 2018-3]

Section 2. *Laity*. The clerks of the several parish and mission vestries electing lay delegates to the Convention shall furnish two certificates showing the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the lay persons elected. One shall be provided to the delegates-elect, and one shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Convention. The latter shall be mailed at least 110 days before the opening session. From these certificates the Secretary shall prepare and publish at least 90 days before the opening of the Convention a roster of lay delegates to that Convention. The Secretary shall not insert any name upon the roll without the evidence of one of these certificates or an amended certificate signed by the rector or clerk of the parish or by the vicar or clerk of the mission, submitted to the Secretary not later than one hour prior to the opening session of the Convention, unless specifically directed to do so by the Convention upon recommendation of its Committee on Credentials. Defective or doubtful certificates shall be laid aside, to be acted on after the Convention shall have organized.

Each congregation (parish or mission) shall be represented in the Convention in accordance with the average number of its enrolled adult communicants in good standing, as contained in the last three annual statistical reports printed in the Journal as follows:

Section 3.

- (a) Lay persons who meet the constitutionally required qualifications shall be elected delegates and alternate delegates to the Convention in accordance with the terms of this section. The length of initial terms under this system shall be prescribed by rule of order; upon the expiration of initial terms each lay delegate shall be elected for a term of three years except as may be required under the provisions of Subsection (b) below. At the time delegates are chosen the vestries shall elect for one-year terms alternate delegates equal in number to the number of delegates authorized by Section 2, above.
- **(b)** Should the average number of enrolled adult communicants in good standing of a congregation at any time require that it elect a greater or smaller number of lay delegates than initially prescribed, the Secretary of the Convention, not later than 200 days prior to the Convention at which the new representation is first to take effect, shall notify the parish or mission of that fact, specifying in the notice which delegates, if any, are to be elected for terms of less than three years in order to maintain so far as possible the division among the Convention's lay membership prescribed by the Constitution. Upon the expiration of the initial terms required under this subsection, each lay delegate from the affected parish or mission shall be elected for a term of three years. [Amended by Act 2007-6.]

Canon D-I.2 Campus Ministry Delegates [Added by Act 2012-1]

Each campus ministry worshipping community that has been admitted into Union with Convention may elect one lay delegate to the Convention in a manner prescribed by its bylaws. Such bylaws shall provide that members of the community who are enrolled, confirmed, adult members in good standing of a congregation of The Episcopal Church are eligible for election, and that only those members who are eligible for election are eligible to vote. The bylaws shall be submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval. The Secretary of the Convention may promulgate rules governing the timing of delegate elections and the manner of certifying the results.

Canon D-I.3 Youth Delegates [Adopted in 1997; Amended by Act 2015-2]

- **Section 1.** For purposes of this Canon, the term "the youth of the Diocese" shall mean the enrolled confirmed communicants in good standing of the parishes and missions of the Diocese between the ages of sixteen and eighteen who have not matriculated at an institution of higher learning.
- **Section 2.** The youth of the Diocese shall be entitled to be represented at the sessions of the Convention by one lay delegate from each Convocation of the Diocese elected for a one-year term by the clergy and lay delegates of each such Convocation. Each Convocation shall elect, for a one-year term, one alternate delegate, subject to the same qualifications to fill any vacancy that may occur.

Section 3. Nothing in this Canon shall be deemed to restrict or otherwise limit the election of an enrolled confirmed adult communicant in good standing of a parish or mission who is also a member of the youth of the Diocese as a delegate from such parish or mission.

Canon D-I.4 Presiding Officer of the Convention

In the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese and of any other bishop qualified by the provisions of the Constitution to preside, the President of the Standing Committee, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall act as presiding officer of the Convention, unless the Convention itself shall otherwise provide.

Canon D-I.5 Worship at the Convention

The Holy Eucharist shall be celebrated at each annual or special Convention. Other devotional services may be held at the discretion of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Canon D-I.6 Rules of Order

The Convention shall adopt rules of order, which shall continue in force until altered.

Canon D-I.7 Conduct of Annual or Special Conventions by Remote Technology [Added by Act 2021-5]

The Convention may adopt Rules of Order providing for the conduct of business by teleconference, videoconference, or any other technology that allows all persons participating to hear each other at the same time and to participate in discussion and voting. Members participating in a meeting by means of remote technology are deemed present in person at the meeting.

Canon D-I.8 Convention Committees [Amended in 1997; Amended in 2005]

Section 1. Appointment of Committees. Not later than 40 days prior to the annual Convention, the Bishop (or presiding officer of the Convention) shall annually appoint, at least three clerical and five lay persons, being members of the Convention who have served as delegates in at least one prior annual Convention of this Diocese, to each of the Convention Committees listed below, shall

name the presiding officer of each such committee, shall notify each committee member of the appointment, and shall inform the committee's presiding officer of the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the members. Should a larger membership be desired for any Convention Committee, the Bishop (or presiding officer of the Convention) may appoint additional members with the requisite Convention experience but shall retain approximately the same proportion of lay and clerical members. The committees so constituted shall be:

- (a) The Committee on Constitution and Canons
- (b) The Committee on Administration of the Diocese
- (c) The Committee on Credentials
- (d) The Committee on Elections
- (e) The Committee on Faith and Morals
- (f) The Committee on National and International Affairs
- (g) The Committee on the Program of the Church
- (h) The Committee on Social Concerns

In addition, there shall be a Committee on Dispatch of Business which shall be constituted and have the duties and responsibilities set out in Section 2 of this Canon.

[Amended by Act 2006-6]

- **Section 2.** The Bishop (or other person entitled to preside in Convention) shall appoint a Committee on Dispatch of Business and designate a presiding officer who shall have been a member of a preceding annual Convention in either the lay or clerical order. The Diocesan bishop and any other bishops then active in the Diocese, the Secretary of the Convention, the Chancellor of the Diocese, and the chairs of the legislative committees of the Convention shall be members *ex officio*. The Committee on Dispatch of Business shall serve the Convention of the Diocese in the following ways:
 - (a) Before a Convention: the presiding officer of the Committee shall
 - (1) Prepare the agenda for the forthcoming Convention;
 - (2) Recommend to the Commission on Constitution and Canons four weeks in advance of the Convention any suggested changes in the Rules of Order.
- **(b)** During a Convention: the Committee shall provide requested assistance to the presiding officer of the Convention, and a member of the Committee shall always be entitled to the floor on the business of the Committee. The presiding officer of the Convention shall refer to this Committee without debate all resolutions or motions suggesting orders of the day. The Committee shall also:
 - (1) Suggest special orders for the dispatch and furtherance of Convention business;
 - (2) Recommend the disposition of all resolutions referred to it; and
 - (3) Recommend the disposition of any unfinished Convention business.

[Amended by Act 2007-8 and Act 2021-11.]

- **Section 3.** All of these committees are to serve until the adjournment of the Convention for which they are appointed. The Bishop shall also fill vacancies as they occur.
- **Section 4.** Each Convention Committee shall consider the measures referred to it, shall offer the sponsors and other interested Convention delegates reasonable opportunity within the time allotted by the Convention's agenda to explain their views thereon, and shall report each measure to the Convention as prescribed by the Rules of Order. However, at any time prior to the convening of

the Convention a Convention Committee to which a measure has been referred may request the Bishop to refer it to a different Convention Committee.

Section 5. The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall receive and consider all legislative proposals contained in the Report of the Commission on Constitution and Canons and any other proposals for amendments to the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese.

Section 6. The Committee on Credentials shall review, investigate, and make recommendations to the Convention on all matters referred to it regarding the claims of delegates to seats and votes in the Convention.

Section 7. The Committee on Elections shall supervise and conduct all Convention elections, certifying the election results to the presiding officer and the Secretary. The committee may, with the consent of the Bishop, appoint laypersons who are communicants in good standing in the Diocese to assist as tellers.

Section 8. *Resolutions Referred to Committees.* Except by a two-thirds vote of those entitled to vote in the Convention, and subject to the provisions of the Rules of Order, no proposed legislation or resolution (other than resolutions of courtesy or appreciation) shall be considered or adopted until the presiding officer of the Convention has referred it to one of the Convention Committees required by Section 1 of this canon and the committee has reported its recommendation on the measure to the Convention.

Canon D-I.9 Seat and Voice at Convention

The Secretary, the Treasurer, the Chancellor, and the Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business shall have seat and voice *ex officio* at Convention if not otherwise entitled thereto.

Title D-II: Officers

Canon D-II.1 Secretary of the Convention

[Amended in 1997; Amended by Act 2018-7]

Section 1. The Secretary shall:

- (a) Take all necessary steps to inform the Convention delegates not only of the time and place of annual and special Conventions, but also of the particular business of each Convention.
- **(b)** Notify vestries of the number of lay Convention delegates their parishes and missions are entitled to elect and the length of terms for which such delegates are to be elected.
- (c) Prepare the canonical lists of the clerical and lay delegates entitled to membership in the Convention.
- (d) From the roster of the preceding annual Convention ascertain the names of clerical and lay delegates whose membership in the next annual Convention can be presumed and, not later than

- August 15, inform those persons that Convention Committees are to be appointed by the Bishop and request that, not later than September 10, they inform the Bishop in writing of the committees to which they have an interest in being named.
- (e) Call the Convention to order for the purpose of organization in the absence of the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop (if there be such), and the President of the Standing Committee.
- **(f)** Keep a record of all Convention proceedings, prepare and issue its journals, and publish the journals in an easily accessible format.
- (g) Preserve and have ready for reference all Convention papers not specially given into other hands.
- **Section 2.** The Secretary shall mail notices of all Conventions to each member of the clergy who is entitled to a seat and vote therein, and to the senior warden of each parish and mission. These notices shall include the forms for certifying lay delegates and alternates and, in the case of the annual Convention, shall be sent at least 140 days prior to the date thereof, and not later than 60 days prior to the date of a Special Convention.
- **Section 3.** The Secretary, who shall be a member of the clergy canonically resident in this Diocese, or an enrolled confirmed adult communicant in good standing resident in this Diocese, shall serve as Secretary of the Diocesan Council.
- **Section 4.** The Secretary shall be accountable to the Diocesan Council for the due performance of the duties of the office, including publication of the *Journal of the Convention*.
- **Section 5.** The Secretary shall receive all applications for admission or re-admission of parishes and missions into union with the Convention of the Diocese at least 30 days before the opening session of the Annual Convention. Such applications shall be referred to the Bishop for endorsement, verified by the Secretary, and reported to the Convention for appropriate action. Upon the report of the Secretary that the appropriate constitutional and canonical requirements have been met, the parish or mission applying may be received in its appropriate status by vote of the Convention, and its delegates admitted to seats and votes therein.
- **Section 6.** The Secretary shall solicit and receive reports from each of the institutions related to the Diocese.
- **Section 7.** The Secretary shall receive, review, and evaluate the annual statistical reports on the strength and condition of the Diocese and the parishes and missions therein.

Canon D-II.2 Treasurer of the Diocese [Amended in 1997]

The Treasurer shall be a person knowledgeable in finance and investing and shall:

(a) Have custody of and be responsible for all money, stocks, bonds and other intangible personal property belonging to the Diocese, both current and permanent; cause current funds to be

deposited in a bank designated by the Diocesan Council; and cause trust and permanent funds to be invested as directed by the Trustees of the Diocese;

- **(b)** Hold, use, and dispose of current funds and the income of trust and permanent funds as directed by representatives of the Diocese empowered by canonical authority to do so;
- (c) At least quarterly, or such other interval as may be specified by the trust instrument, disburse the accumulated income of trusts held for the benefit of beneficiaries other than the Diocese to those beneficiaries entitled thereto:
- (d) Keep a complete record and account of all transactions of the office, reporting them in summary form to the annual Convention;
- (e) Give to the annual Convention a summary report of all assets of the Diocese then held by the Treasurer; and
- **(f)** Give bond for the faithful performance of the Treasurer's duties in such amount as the Diocesan Council may prescribe. (This bond shall be deposited with the Trustees of the Diocese.)

Canon D-II.3 Chancellor of the Diocese

The Bishop shall nominate and the Convention confirm a person learned in the law to be Chancellor of the Diocese, whose duty it shall be to advise regarding any questions of law which may arise in the administration of Diocesan affairs. The Chancellor shall be an enrolled confirmed adult communicant in good standing and resident of the Diocese. The term of office shall be three years and until a successor has been chosen and confirmed. The Bishop may, with the advice and consent of the Chancellor, nominate and the Convention confirm one or more Vice-Chancellors to assist the Chancellor in the performance of the duties of that office.

Canon D-II.4 Historiographer and Archives [Amended in 1997]

Section 1. The Historiographer shall be nominated by the Bishop and confirmed by the Convention for a three-year term of office. The Historiographer shall collect, classify, and preserve materials relating to the history of the Diocese. It shall also be the duty of the Historiographer, at the request of the Bishop or Diocesan Convention, to prepare and publish materials concerning the history of the Diocese, and, from time to time, to prepare such materials for publication on the Historiographer's own initiative. The Historiographer shall also encourage parishes, missions, and institutions affiliated with the Diocese to preserve historical materials and encourage the writing and publication of materials concerning the history of the Diocese, its parishes, missions, and affiliated institutions.

Section 2. Diocesan Archives shall be a repository for books, papers, and documents which belong to the Diocese and which are important as historical records of the Diocese. Except for such records as are currently in use by Diocesan officers and agencies, these archival materials shall include, but not be restricted to: journals of the Diocesan Convention; journals of the General Convention

of The Episcopal Church; minute books, official records, and reports of all Diocesan officers, agencies, boards, and committees operating under the authority of the Diocesan Convention or Diocesan Council (including the minutes of the Diocesan Council); histories and documents of historical interest pertaining to the parishes, missions, and institutions affiliated with the Diocese, including the registers of congregations which have ceased or which may hereafter cease to be active; together with any other documents and records necessary or desirable in preserving an accurate history of the Diocese.

The Historiographer shall be responsible for the oversight of the Diocesan Archives and, subject to any personnel policies adopted by the Diocesan Council, for providing oversight and direction to any person who may be employed or volunteer from time to time to work in the Archives. [Amended by Act 2011-4.]

Canon D-II.5 Continuation in Office [Added by Act 2021-3]

In the absence of any contrary provision, all officers of the Diocese whose positions are filled by action of the Convention, whether by election or confirmation of appointments made by the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall hold their positions until their successors are chosen and qualified, so long as they continue to be eligible to hold the position in question.

Title D-III: Permanent Bodies

Canon D-III.1 The Standing Committee

[Amended in 2002; Amended by Act 2013-1]

Section 1. Members of the Standing Committee take office on January 1 following election or upon adjournment of the electing Convention, whichever is the later date. The Standing Committee shall annually elect a President and a Secretary from its own membership. The Committee shall fill vacancies in its membership for the remainder of the unexpired terms. It is the duty of each member to attend all regular and special meetings. The President may require a member who has failed to attend two successive meetings to show good cause why he or she should not be removed from office. If the Committee finds that the member has failed to show good cause for non-attendance, the Committee may declare the seat vacant and may proceed to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Convention. [Amended by Act 2006-10 and Act 2007-7.]

Section 2. The President shall call a meeting of the Committee:

- (a) Whenever the President may deem it advisable.
- (b) Whenever required to do so by the Bishop, or by any three members of the Committee.
- (c) Within 30 days after knowledge of a vacancy in the Episcopate.

Section 3. When a bishop is to be elected, nominees shall be proposed to the electing Convention through a process established by the Standing Committee. The process shall ensure that all persons

to be nominated shall have been identified and announced to the Diocese not less than 60 days before the first day of the electing Convention.

Section 4. The Standing Committee shall report to the annual Convention the transactions of the preceding year. A record of all its official acts shall be kept by its Secretary and be available for inspection by the Bishop and the Convention.

Canon D-III.2

Trustees of the Diocese

[Amended in 1997, 2000, and 2008]

Section 1. *Membership.* The Trustees of the Diocese shall consist of the Bishop or other Ecclesiastical Authority, and six persons who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing in the Diocese or clergy of the Diocese elected by the Convention upon nomination of the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Treasurer of the Diocese and the Chancellor of the Diocese shall sit with and advise the Trustees but shall have no vote.

The elected Trustees of the Diocese shall, at the first annual Diocesan Convention at which the number of elected Trustees has been increased from two to six, be elected for such terms, not to exceed three years, as may be specified by the Secretary of the Convention to the end that two members shall be seated for three-year terms, two for two-year terms and two for one-year terms. Thereafter, all elections shall be for three-year terms. No person who has been seated for two full three-year terms shall be eligible for re-election as a Trustee until one year shall have elapsed following the expiration of the term of office. Any vacancy occurring in the office of elected Trustee shall, on nomination of the Ecclesiastical Authority, be filled by the Diocesan Council for the remainder of the unexpired term. [Amended by Act 2008-4]

Section 2. Real and Tangible Personal Property. (a) The Trustees shall in all cases not otherwise provided for, hold title to all real property and tangible personal property of the Diocese, except property the title to which is vested in a parish or corporation. The Trustees shall convey, mortgage and encumber or otherwise alienate any real property or interest therein and tangible personal property held by them:

- (1) If held for the benefit of any parish or corporation, upon an appropriate written resolution of the vestry of such parish or the directors or other governing body of such corporation, and with the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice of the Standing Committee of the Diocese;
- (2) If held for the benefit of a mission, upon an appropriate written resolution of the mission vestry, concurred in by the Trustees, and with the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese;
- (3) And if otherwise held, upon an appropriate written resolution of either the Diocesan Council or the Convention, concurred in by the Trustees, and with the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.
- (b) Any real or tangible personal property the title to which is not held by the Trustees but is otherwise held by or for a corporation or institution affiliated with the Diocese, shall be conveyed, mortgaged, encumbered, or otherwise alienated by the title-holder only with the written consent

of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

- (c) The consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority required by this section shall be evidenced by the signature of the Bishop who is at the time the Ecclesiastical Authority, and if there is no Bishop who is then the Ecclesiastical Authority, by the signature of the President of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.
- (d) The Trustees shall obtain the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, before acting on behalf of a mission or institution under the control of the Diocese to engage in any borrowings or other similar financing transactions, the aggregate amount of which exceeds 50% of the normal operating income of the mission or institution for the previous calendar year or the repayment of which may extend beyond a term of 12 months.
- **(e)** Any instrument executed by the Ecclesiastical Authority and at least three of the Trustees shall have the same force and effect as if executed individually by the Ecclesiastical Authority and all of the Trustees; provided that any such instrument shall recite that the Ecclesiastical Authority and the signing Trustees are acting on behalf of all the Trustees of the Diocese.

Section 3. *Other Property.* The Trustees shall hold title to and possession of all other property not specified in Section 2 of this Canon, including properties delivered to the Trustees in trust for The Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, its parishes, missions, bishops, and other clergy, organizations and agencies. The Trustees shall deliver the possession of properties not specified in Section 2 above to, and place them in the name of one or more banks or trust companies for purposes of safe-keeping and investment. Any such bank or trust company shall guarantee to the Trustees the safe custody of any property delivered to or held by it.

Section 4. *Investments*. The Trustees may establish a subcommittee to be known as the Investment Committee, which shall consist of not fewer than five nor more than seven enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of this Diocese elected by the Trustees upon nomination of the Bishop initially for a term of three years. Any vacancy on the Investment Committee shall be filled by the Trustees for the unexpired term. A majority of the Investment Committee shall control its actions. Properties not specified in Section 2, above, belonging to the Diocese or held in trust for its benefit, or for the benefit of any of its parishes, missions, bishops, or other clergy, organizations, or agencies, shall be invested, reinvested, sold, delivered, assigned, and transferred and otherwise managed and controlled by the Trustees through the Investment Committee.

The Trustees are authorized to appoint and employ (and pay reasonable compensation to) such attorneys, investment counsel, investment managers, and other agents as the Investment Committee may deem necessary or advisable in the course of its investment functions; and the Trustees may delegate to an investment manager on the advice of its Investment Committee, as much of the Investment Committee's duties and responsibilities hereunder as the Trustees deem necessary or desirable. The Trustees shall have no authority for the expenditure of current funds of the Diocese without authorization from the Convention or the Diocesan Council. [Amended by Act 2006-12.]

Section 5. Administration of Trust Funds. The Trustees shall be responsible for seeing that the fiduciary responsibilities of the Diocese are faithfully discharged with respect to the expendable principal and income of all trust funds held by the Diocese for its own benefit or for the benefit of

others. The Trustees shall maintain complete records that specify in detail the purpose or purposes for which the assets of each trust may be expended as evidenced by the will or other instrument whereby the trust was established. Distributions from trusts whose principal or income is expendable at the direction of the Diocesan Council shall be disbursed by the Trustees at such times and in such manner as the Council may direct. The Trustees shall certify to the Diocesan Council any restrictions as to the use of such funds imposed by the will or other instrument whereby they were obtained, and the Council shall observe any such restrictions.

Section 6. *Records of Trustees.* The Trustees of the Diocese shall keep a record of their actions and shall make a full report thereof annually to the Diocesan Convention, which report shall be published in the Journal of the Convention.

Section 7. Exceptions to Consent Requirement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this canon, no consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Standing Committee shall be required for any of the following transactions involving real property that is not consecrated for the use as a church or chapel: (1) leases that can be canceled without penalty upon notice of 30 days or less to the lessee, (2) temporary easements of less than 12 months duration, and (3) cemetery lots or other interment rights.

Canon D-III.3 Diocesan Council [Amended in 1997]

Section 1. Composition of the Council. There shall be a Council of the Church in the Diocese known as the Diocesan Council, which shall be composed of the persons entitled to preside in the Convention and 15 persons to be elected by the Convention. These 15 persons shall consist of six members of the clergy eligible to vote in the Convention and nine members of the laity (who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of the Church in the Diocese) who are elected to the Council for terms of three years, staggered so that one-third of the 15 are elected each year. A member of the Council who has served for five or more consecutive years is not eligible for re-election until one year has elapsed following expiration of the current term. The Council shall fill vacancies in its membership for the remainder of the unexpired terms. Members take office on January 1 following election or upon adjournment of the electing Convention, whichever is the later date. It is the duty of each member to attend all regular and special meetings. The Bishop may require a member who has failed to attend two successive meetings to show good cause why he or she should not be removed from office. If the Council finds that the member has failed to show good cause for non-attendance, the Bishop may declare the seat vacant and the Council may proceed to fill the vacancy.

[Amended by Act 2006-10, Act 2007-13, Act 2013-, and Act 2015-1.]

Section 2. The Role and Function of the Council. Between sessions of the annual Convention, the Diocesan Council shall, within the limitations established herein, perform all duties specifically committed to it by the Convention and function as and for the Convention in conducting the affairs of the Diocese. In doing so, however, the Council shall not contravene the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese and of the General Convention, nor shall it contravene

the powers of the Ecclesiastical Authority. Consistent with its stated role and function, the Council shall:

- (a) Assist the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, in planning and developing the work of the Church in the Diocese.
- **(b)** Assist the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, in administering the work of the Church in the Diocese through whatever departments, divisions, commissions, or other agencies may be established from time to time for that purpose.
- (c) Supervise, coordinate, and review the work of all departments, agencies, and Diocesan officers charged with holding title to property; be responsible for maintaining such property; and be responsible for designating qualifying church buildings as "Historic Churches."
- (d) Direct, coordinate, and administer the financial affairs of the Diocese not vested by canon in other officers or agencies.
- (e) Directly or through agents under its direction and control, fix all compensation except that fixed by the Convention.
- **(f)** Supervise and coordinate all departments, agencies, and Diocesan officers charged with record-keeping, maintenance of archives, and preserving and writing the history of the Diocese, its departments, agencies, and congregations.
- (g) As deemed desirable, adopt bylaws, rules, and regulations for its government and for the government of its officials, agents, employees, departments, and agencies.
- (h) Make and preserve a full record of its acts and of the work of each of its departments and furnish to each annual Convention a full report of all its actions and all moneys expended under its direction during the preceding year, including a report from each department of the Council with respect to the work done by such department.
- Section 3. Officers and Staff. The Bishop of the Diocese shall serve as presiding officer of the Council; in the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor or any bishop in charge, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall, in the order named, serve as presiding officer. The Secretary of the Convention shall, by virtue of that office, serve as Secretary of the Council. Upon nomination of the Bishop, the Council shall annually employ an Administrator and such principal administrative staff members as it shall deem necessary. Similarly, upon recommendation of the Bishop, the Council shall have authority to terminate any such employment. Vacancies in such positions shall be filled in the same manner as initial employment. The duties and compensation of persons named to these positions shall be fixed by the Council. In addition to the positions named, the Council shall also have authority to provide for the employment, compensation, and termination of other persons named to staff Diocesan offices, departments, and agencies not otherwise provided for by canon.

Section 4. Departments. The Diocesan Council shall organize from its membership, supplemented as herein provided, a Department of Outreach and Justice Ministries, a Department of Christian Formation, Department of Youth and Young Adults, a Department of Congregational Support and Development, a Department of Finance and Administration, and such other departments as in its judgment may be necessary; and it shall provide the manner and means by which its departments shall be staffed and financed. From the Council membership the Bishop Diocesan shall appoint the members of each department and designate its chair. The chair of each chartered committee within a department shall be a member of the department. Subject to confirmation by the Council, the Bishop may appoint additional members to departments of the Council. Each department shall

meet at least three times each year and report its activities to meetings of the Council. It shall receive and review budget requests from its chartered committees and submit its departmental budget to the Diocesan Council. The Bishop Diocesan, the Bishop Suffragan, and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be members of each department. The chairs of the several Departments, the Bishops, and a minimum of two other members of the Diocesan Council appointed by the Bishop, shall constitute the Council Committee on the State of the Church.

Subject to Council review and approval:

- (a) The Department of Outreach and Justice Ministries shall be responsible for the work of the Diocese with respect to those programs and activities that embody our ministry locally, nationally, and overseas;
- **(b)** The Department of Christian Formation shall oversee those bodies that provide program and resources for education and formation throughout the Diocese.
- (c) The Department of Youth and Young Adults shall oversee Diocesan programs for youth, ministry in higher education, and young adults.
- (d) The Department of Congregational Support and Development shall coordinate the work of those agencies that work directly with congregations.
- (e) The Department of Finance and Administration shall oversee the development and administration of the Diocesan budget and disbursement of grants; shall oversee the business, personnel, and property affairs of the Diocese, including the work of the Treasurer and the annual audit of the Diocese and shall include a committee on administrative and personnel policies consisting of three persons elected by the Diocesan Council from its membership which shall be responsible for formulating and reviewing administrative and personnel policies and reporting to Council as may be necessary or appropriate. [Amended by Act 2006-11, Act 2013-2, and Act 2018-9]
- Section 5. *Investment Income*. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall recommend to the Diocesan Council each year a plan for the expenditure of all trust fund income and expendable principal except that designated for the Bishop's discretionary use. The Council shall have power and authority to prescribe and designate the purposes, and to make allocations and apportionments among such purposes, for which any investment income not otherwise designated for specific purposes shall be expended. To the extent feasible, the Council shall use Diocesan trust funds to supplement and not to supplant support from the Diocesan budget.
- Section 6. *Planning Function*. The Bishop and the Diocesan Council working through the Council Committee on the State of the Church shall have responsibility for a continuing study of the long-range objectives of the Church's work in the Diocese. The Council Committee on the State of the Church shall present to the Council and the Convention an annual report which shall, within the context of these long-range objectives, evaluate the present work and program of the Diocese and make specific recommendations for the program and the budget of the Diocese of the fiscal year next following that for which a budget is being adopted. The Convention may by resolution express its opinion on this report for the guidance of the Diocesan Council in preparing and submitting a program and a budget for the Diocese for such fiscal year.
- **Section 7.** *Structure and Organization of the Diocese.* The Council Committee on the State of the Church shall keep the structure and organization of the Diocese under continuing study, shall review all chartered committees at least every five years to determine if they are viable, and shall,

from time to time, make such recommendations to the Convention as it may find appropriate to enable the Diocese to fulfill its ministry.

Canon D-III.4 Deputies to the General Convention [Amended by Act 2018-5]

Section 1. No later than 12 months before the opening date of each triennial meeting of the General Convention, the Annual Convention shall elect as clerical deputies four ordained persons, presbyters or deacons, canonically resident in this Diocese, and four lay deputies, who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of this Church and resident in this Diocese.

Section 2. After all deputies have been elected, up to four clergy alternates and four lay alternates shall be chosen from the remaining candidates in the order of the number of votes received on the most recent ballot in the appropriate Order.

Section 3. Deputies elected to represent this Diocese in the General Convention who find themselves unable to attend shall notify the Bishop immediately. The Bishop shall inform the Secretary of the Convention, who shall certify to the Secretary of the General Convention the name and contact information of the alternate deputy chosen to serve in the resigned deputy's place.

Canon D-III.5 Deputies to the Synod of the Fourth Province [Amended in 1997]

Section 1. The deputies and alternate deputies to the Synod of the Fourth Province from the Diocese of North Carolina shall be enrolled confirmed adult communicants of this Church in good standing and clergy canonically resident in this Diocese, and (1) shall be deputies and alternate deputies to the General Convention in the years when that body meets and (2) in other years shall be elected by the Diocesan Council, upon nomination of the Bishop, and shall be members of such departments, committees and organizations of this Diocese as may be prescribed from time to time by the Ordinances of the Fourth Province.

Canon D-III.6 Convocations

[Amended & renumbered in 1997; Amended in 1999; Amended by Act 2011-6; Amended by Act 2014-1]

Section 1. The Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina shall establish, on recommendation of the Bishop and Diocesan Council, at least two convocations of the Diocese of North Carolina, and the Convention shall determine the number and the boundaries of the convocations in response to recommendations from the Bishop and Diocesan Council.

In determining the number of convocations and in defining their boundaries, the Bishop, Council, and Convention shall consider at least

- (a) the furtherance, welfare, and efficiency of Diocesan programs and administration;
- (b) the communicant strength produced in each convocation under each proposal for drawing boundaries;
- (c) the geography of each convocation as proposed, including the convenience of travel among the congregations in the territory; and
- (d) the regional or community ties and economic, social, and other similarities existing within each proposed convocational area.

Section 2. Each convocation shall elect a dean from among the resident clergy and a warden from among resident lay enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing. The duty of the warden is to serve with and assist the dean. The offices of dean and warden (1) shall be for 3 years, (2) shall be staggered with the warden being elected in the year following the dean and (3) shall not be held by the same person for more than two successive terms.

In the event of a vacancy in the office of dean or warden, the bishop may appoint a replacement until the convocation holds an election to fill the position.

Section 3. Each convocation shall meet at stated times for at least the following purposes:

- (a) To advance the missionary work of the Diocese;
- (b) To support the ministry of the bishop(s) of the Diocese;
- (c) To provide education and training for both clergy and laity;
- (d) To offer opportunities for worship and devotion;
- (e) To (i) discuss the Mission and Ministry Budget of the Diocese and other matters to come before the Annual Convention of the Diocese, including elections and resolutions, (ii) to elect a dean and lay warden, (iii) to elect a youth representative and alternate to the Annual Convention, and (iv) other matters of business. A range of dates and locations of meetings for these purposes shall be set by the Diocesan Council.

Section 4. All members of the clergy resident or doing duty in any convocation shall be members of the convocation, and each parish and mission in the convocation shall be invited to send lay delegates to every meeting of the convocation. The number and nature of the lay delegates to be sent, and the purpose of the meeting, shall be indicated by whomever shall have called the meeting — dean, warden, or bishop.

Canon D-III.7

Commission on Constitution and Canons

[Amended in 1997; Revised in 2005; Amended by Act 2013-3; Amended by Act 2018-4]

Section 1. The Bishop shall appoint as members of the Commission six persons, three of whom are clergy of the Diocese and three of whom are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing in the Diocese. The Chancellor of the Diocese and the Secretary of the Convention shall serve as members of the Commission, *ex officio*. Appointments shall be for three-year terms staggered in such a manner that one clergy member and one lay member are appointed each year. No person who has been seated for two full three-year terms shall be eligible for reappointment

until one year shall have elapsed following the expiration of the term of office. The chair of the Commission shall be designated by the Bishop and shall be entitled to a seat and voice in the Convention but shall not be entitled to a vote therein unless a delegate to the Convention.

- **Section 2.** No new canon, or change in an existing canon, or proposed amendment to the Constitution, shall be considered by the Convention unless it has been submitted to and reported on to the Convention by the Commission on Constitution and Canons.
- **Section 3.** (a) The Commission on Constitution and Canons shall conduct a continuing comprehensive review of the Constitution, Canons, and Rules of Order with respect to internal consistency and clarity and conformity to the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention. On the basis of such a review, the Commission may propose amendments necessary or desirable for such purposes. Upon request, the Commission shall review any proposal calling for amendment to the Constitution, Canons, or Rules of Order, and may express its views with respect to the substance of such proposal to the proponent thereof.
- **(b)** At least four weeks in advance of the annual Convention, the Secretary of the Convention shall report to the Commission all resolutions timely filed which propose or appear to entail amendments to the Constitution, Canons, or Rules of Order. The Commission shall consider such resolutions and report to the appropriate legislative committee of the Convention its findings with respect to conformity of the measure to the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention and the Constitution of this Diocese; its recommendations, if any, as to the form of the measure; and any views the Commission may wish to express as to the merits of the measure. This subsection does not apply to proposals by the Committee on Dispatch of Business to adopt or amend Rules of Order.
- (c) After the close of each Annual Convention, the Commission shall certify the changes, if any, made in the Constitution and Canons, including a correction of errors in spelling, punctuation, grammar, and references made in any portion of the Constitution or Canons to another portion thereof, and report the same to the Secretary of the Convention who shall include such corrections in the official edition of the Constitution and Canons published in the Journal. All such technical corrections shall be reported to the Convention.

Canon D-III.8 Commission on Ministry [Revised by Act 2012-3]

- **Section 1.** The Commission on Ministry shall consist of the Committee on the Diaconate (Section 2 below) and the Committee on the Priesthood (Section 3 below). The chairs of these two committees shall be the co-chairs of the Commission.
- **Section 2.** The Committee on the Diaconate shall be made up of twelve persons, consisting of a reasonable balance of lay persons who are enrolled confirmed communicants in good standing, deacons, and presbyters who are all canonically resident in the Diocese. Subject to the provisions of Section 6 (a) below, all members of the committee shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority at the annual Convention. There shall be three classes of persons each serving a three-

year term, with four persons appointed in each year. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint the chair of the Committee, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

- **Section 3.** The Committee on the Priesthood shall be made up of twelve persons, consisting of a reasonable balance of lay persons who are enrolled confirmed communicants in good standing and members of the clergy who are all canonically resident in the Diocese. Subject to the provisions of Section 6 (b) below, all members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority at the annual Convention. There shall be three classes of persons each serving a three-year term, with four persons appointed in each year. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint the chair of the Committee, who shall serve at the pleasure of the Ecclesiastical Authority.
- **Section 4.** The Ecclesiastical Authority may fill any vacancy on the Commission or any of its committees. The appointee shall then serve the remainder of the unexpired term. The Ecclesiastical Authority may in addition appoint liaisons to the Commission and to any of its committees, with such duties as the Ecclesiastical Authority may designate.
- **Section 5**. Each committee of the Commission shall organize itself and establish such rules of order, subject to the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority, as it finds necessary to conduct its assigned duties, provided that such rules are not inconsistent with the Constitutions and Canons of the General Convention or this Diocese. Each committee of the Commission may appoint subcommittees from among its members, with such duties as the committee may establish.

Section 6. The membership of the two committees following the effective date of this Canon shall be as follows:

- (a) Those persons who have been serving on the diaconate subcommittee of the Commission on Ministries as constituted prior to the enactment of this Canon shall continue to serve the balance of their original terms as members of the Committee of the Diaconate as established upon the enactment of this canon. Those vacancies in the Committee on the Diaconate which shall be created following the enactment of this Canon shall be filled pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 above
- (b) Those persons who have been serving on the priesthood subcommittee of the Commission on Ministries as constituted prior to the enactment of this Canon shall continue to serve the balance of their original terms as members of the Committee of the Diaconate as established upon the enactment of this canon. Vacancies in the Committee on the Priesthood which may be created following the enactment of this Canon shall be filled pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 above.

Section 7. The Commission on Ministry shall advise and assist the Bishop:

- (a) In the implementation of Title III of Canons of the General Convention.
- (b) in the determination of present and future opportunities and needs for the ministry of all baptized persons.
- (c) In the design and oversight of the ongoing process of recruitment, discernment, formation for ministry, and assessment of the readiness therefor.
 - (d) Such other related matters as may be directed from time to time by the Bishop.

Historic Properties

[Adopted in 1997; Amended 2005]

Section 1. Historic Properties Commission. There shall be a Historic Properties Commission responsible for oversight of historic churches, cemeteries, and other historic Diocesan properties other than those facilities which are occupied, used and/or maintained by parishes and missions in union with the Convention. The Commission shall promote and encourage historic preservation. The membership of the Commission shall be named by the Bishop, with one member being chosen from nominee(s) submitted by each active support group for Preserved Historic Churches (as defined in Section 2, category 1), and six being chosen at large. In addition, the following three members shall serve ex officio: the Diocesan Historiographer, the Diocesan Archivist, and a representative from the Diocesan Council. The members who do not serve ex officio shall serve staggered three-year terms. The Bishop shall appoint a Chair of the Commission. The Commission shall report annually to the Diocesan Convention. [Amended by Act 2011-4; Amended by Act 2019-8.]

Section 2. Historic Churches. There shall be two categories of Historic Churches: (1) Preserved Historic Churches—churches not in union with the Convention and for which the Historic Properties Commission shall have responsibility for oversight; and (2) Living Historic Churches—churches in union with the Convention and having active congregations, whose historic status may be acknowledged by Diocesan Council upon recommendation by the Historic Properties Commission but over whose facilities the Commission would have no jurisdiction. The Commission shall recommend to the Diocesan Council the appropriate Historic Church designation for qualified church buildings after establishing criteria and examining each potentially qualified church for such designation. The Commission, in developing the criteria to be applied in determining whether a given site meets the Historic designation, shall observe the following minimum standards:

- (a) The church building must be at least 75 years old.
- **(b)** The church building must have architectural or historic significance.
- (c) The structure must be physically sound or restorable.
- (d) In the case of "Living Historic Churches," there must be an active congregation able and willing to maintain the structure.
- (e) In the case of "Preserved Historic Churches," there must be an organized group, committee, or other body from the community in which the structure is located or elsewhere that is able and willing to maintain and (if necessary) restore the building.
- **(f)** The Commission will establish guidelines for operation of the local committees of Preserved Historic Churches.
- **(g)** There must be at least one service of the Church regularly scheduled at any Preserved Historic Church building in each calendar year.

The Bishop shall assign a member of the clergy who resides in a place convenient to the site to have general clerical oversight of each Preserved Historic Church that is not occupied and used by a congregation in union with the Convention. [Amended by Act 2012-2.]

Section 3. *Historic Cemeteries*. The Commission shall have the following responsibilities with respect to Historic Cemeteries, that is, those identifiable burial places that are owned by the

Diocese but are no longer associated with or maintained by parishes or missions in union with the Convention:

- a) It shall establish and maintain a list of Historic Cemeteries. The list shall include the location, size, and general condition of each Historic Cemetery;
- b) It shall provide for the maintenance and supervision of each Historic Cemetery and ensure that records with respect to such property are maintained on a current basis.
- c) It shall, from time to time at its discretion, erect, cause to be erected, or assist in erecting appropriate historical signs or markers at such cemetery sites.
- d) It shall establish a procedure for responding to requests for new burials in Historic Cemeteries not associated with congregations in union with the Convention.

Section 4. *Other Historic Properties*. The Historic Properties Commission shall have oversight of all historic properties other than churches and cemeteries owned by the Diocese. In exercise of this oversight, the Commission shall advise the Bishop regarding the status of such properties and make recommendations about actions to be taken with respect to such properties.

Canon D-III.10 Disciplinary Board

[Added by Act 2010-3; Amended by Act 2011-2]

- **Section 1. Disciplinary Board.** The Board shall consist of thirteen persons seven of whom are members of the Clergy and six of whom are Laity. No member of the Standing Committee shall serve as a member of the Board.
- **Section 2.** Clergy Members. The Clergy members of the Board must be canonically and geographically resident in the Diocese.
- **Section 3.** Lay Members. The lay members of the Board shall be enrolled, confirmed adults who are communicants in good standing and geographically resident in the Diocese.
- **Section 4. Election.** (a) The members of the Board shall be elected by the Convention on nomination of the Ecclesiastical Authority. Each member shall be elected for a three-year term; except, if a member is elected by the Convention to fill a vacancy, the term of such member shall be the unexpired term of the member being replaced. The terms of the members shall commence on the first day of the month following election, and shall end on the last day of the month in which the annual Convention is held.
- (b) The terms of office of the Board shall be staggered. [Amended by Act 2011-2.]

Section 5. Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled as follows:

- (a) Upon the determination that a vacancy exists, the President of the Board shall notify the Ecclesiastical Authority of the vacancy and request appointment of a replacement member of the same order as the member to be replaced.
- (b) The Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a replacement Board member with the advice and consent of the Diocesan Council acting as and for the Convention.

- (c) Persons appointed to fill vacancies on the Board shall meet the same eligibility requirements as apply to elected Board members.
- (d) With respect to a vacancy created for any reason other than pursuant to a challenge as provided below, the term of any person selected as a replacement Board member shall be until the next annual Convention. With respect to a vacancy resulting from a challenge, the replacement Board member shall serve only for the proceedings for which the elected Board member is not serving as a result of the challenge.

[Amended by Act 2011-2.]

Canon D-III.11 The Murdoch Memorial Society

- **Section 1.** "The Francis J. Murdoch Memorial Society for the Increase of the Ministry" shall be composed of six persons together with the Bishop, *ex officio*. The Bishop shall annually nominate, and the Convention shall confirm or reject two clergy and one lay person, who is an enrolled confirmed adult communicant in good standing, to serve two-year terms as members of the Society.
- **Section 2.** The Society shall choose from among its members such officers as it shall deem necessary, shall hold meetings at its own discretion, keep a record of all its activities, and report annually to the Convention in such form as in its judgment may seem best.
- **Section 3.** It shall be diligent in aiding fit persons who desire to prepare for the ministry of the Church.
- **Section 4.** Aid from the Society shall, under all ordinary circumstances, be in the form of a loan, adequately protected by good and legal security, and with or without interest, as the Society may decide. Such a loan may, at the discretion of the Society, be canceled upon the ordination of the beneficiary, and shall be canceled in the event of death before ordination. Otherwise it shall be in full legal force and effect until paid.
- **Section 5.** Necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duty by members of the Society may be paid from the funds at the disposal of the Society.

Canon D-III.12 Trustees of the University of the South

The Annual Convention elects three Trustees of the University of the South for three-year terms. Two are members of the Lay Order and one is a member of the Clergy Order. Terms are staggered so that one Trustee is elected each year. Interim vacancies are filled by appointment of the Ecclesiastical Authority from candidates in the two most recent elections for the position in question, in the order of the number of votes received. If there are no such candidates, the vacancy is filled by election at the next Annual Convention. [Added by Act 2016-4.]

Canon D-III.13 Mission Endowment Board

The Mission Endowment Board shall consist of the Bishop, a member of the Standing Committee designated by the committee, a Trustee of the Diocese designated by the trustees, the chair of the Department of Finance of the Diocesan Council, the chair of the Department of Congregational Development of the Diocesan Council, and three persons nominated by the Bishop and confirmed by the Convention for overlapping three year terms.

Canon D-III.14 Fair Share Appeals Board

The Fair Share Appeals Board shall consist of five lay persons and four members of the clergy elected by the Diocesan Council for overlapping three-year terms on nomination of the Ecclesiastical Authority. The chair shall be designated by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Title D-IV: Finances

Canon D-IV.1 Salaries, Compensations and Expenses

Section 1. The salary of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, or the Suffragan Bishop, shall be such as may from time to time be ordered and provided for by the Convention.

Section 2. The Secretary of the Convention, the Treasurer, and the members of the Standing Committee and of the Diocesan Commission on Ministry, in actual attendance upon the duly called meetings of the bodies to which they severally belong, shall be entitled to have their necessary expenses incurred by such attendance paid out of the funds of the Diocese, and the Treasurer of the Diocese shall pay the same upon the personal application of said parties accompanied by a certificate of the amount actually and necessarily expended in each case.

Canon D-IV.2

Business Methods in Church Affairs

[Renumbered in 1997; Amended in 2000; Amended in 2002]

In this Diocese, and in all its parishes, missions, and institutions, the following standard business methods shall be observed:

(a) Trust and permanent funds, and all securities of whatsoever kind, shall be deposited with a federal or state bank, or savings and loan association, or a Diocesan corporation, or with some other agency approved in writing by the Department of Finance and Administration of the Diocesan Council, under either a deed of trust, or an agency agreement, providing for at least two

signatures on any order of withdrawal of such funds or securities. But this paragraph shall not apply to funds and securities refused by the depositories named as being too small for acceptance. Such small funds and securities, and trust and permanent funds of missions shall be deposited with the Trustees of the Diocese, added to the Common Trust Fund and invested as a part of those funds. Income from such invested funds shall be paid quarterly to the parish, mission or organization entitled thereto.

- **(b)** Records shall be made and kept of all trust and permanent funds showing, in respect to each trust and each fund, at least the following:
 - (1) Source and date.
 - (2) Terms governing the use of principal and income.
 - (3) To whom and how often reports of condition are to be made.
 - (4) How the funds are invested.
- (c) Treasurers and custodians other than banking institutions shall be adequately bonded, except treasurers of funds that do not exceed \$500 at any one time during the fiscal year.
- (d) Books of account shall be so kept as to provide the basis for satisfactory accounting. The Department of Finance and Administration may establish a system of accounts.
 - (e) The fiscal year begins January 1.
- **(f)** All accounts shall be audited annually by a certified or independent public accountant, or by such an accounting agency as shall be permitted by the Department of Finance and Administration.
- (g) The expense, it there be any, of auditing the account of the Treasurer of the Diocese by a certified public accountant shall be paid by the Treasurer out of the Episcopal Maintenance Fund.
 - (h) All buildings and their contents shall be kept adequately insured.
- (i) The Department of Finance and Administration may require copies of any or all accounts described in this section to be filed with it, and shall report annually to the Convention of the Diocese upon its administration of this canon.
- (j) Minutes of all meetings of governing bodies shall be made and kept, showing all resolutions which have been officially enacted.
- (k) No vestry, trustee, or other Diocesan institution shall borrow except as provided in Canons D-III.2, D-V.1, or D-V.5.

Canon D-IV.3 Disposition of Tangible Personal Property

The provisions of Canon D-III.2, Section 2, regarding the necessary consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority acting with the advice of the Standing Committee do not apply to the disposition of certain tangible personal property, as follows:

It shall not be necessary for any officer, employee, or other representative of the Diocese or of any parish, mission, agency, institution or other organization of the Diocese, to obtain the concurrence or written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority or of the Trustees for the sale, exchange, abandonment, surrender, or other disposition of any tangible personal property (for example, typewriters and other office equipment, motor vehicles, general furniture and furnishings, appliances, books, etc.) acquired and used directly in the normal and routine course of the conduct of work and program of the Church in the Diocese; excluding, however, such items of personal property as have been consecrated and all furniture, furnishings, and fixtures that are peculiarly designed for and used within a church.

Canon D-IV.4

The Mission and Ministry of the Diocese

[Revised by Act 2009-3; Amended by Act 2011-5]

Section 1. Each parish and mission shall give in support of the Mission and Ministry Budget of the Diocese an amount equal to a tithe (10%) of its total operating income for the preceding year or such greater percentage, not to exceed fourteen percent (14%), as may have been established by the Convention. On or before June 1 of each year, the Diocesan Council shall give notice to each parish and mission of its required contribution for the upcoming year, using the most recent parochial report data available at that time. The Council may later adjust the required contribution using more recent data if the parish or mission has been prevented, for good cause, from filing a timely parochial report.

Section 2. Parishes and missions that are able to do so are encouraged to contribute more than the amount required and may, if the vestry so desires, specify the uses to which such additional contributions shall be put. Parishes and missions that are unable to give the amount required due to extenuating circumstances may follow the appeal procedures described in Section 3. Not later than July 15, each parish and mission shall acknowledge in writing to the Diocesan Council its commitment to give the amount required, to give more than that, or to state its intent to appeal for a reduction. Failure to respond shall be deemed acceptance of the amount required.

Section 3. (a) The vestry of any parish or mission that believes, for good cause, that it will be unable to give the amount required to the Mission and Ministry Budget of the Diocese may file a written appeal not later than July 15. The appeal shall be addressed to the Fair Share Appeals Board, shall state the reasons for the appeal, and shall be signed by the rector, vicar, or other member of the clergy in charge and the wardens. The Board shall meet with representatives of the parish or mission to hear its request for a reduction and the supporting reasons. The Board shall consider any relevant evidence offered by the vestry or requested by the Board, including, but not limited to, current financial statements, the level of stewardship training and education, the nature of the annual stewardship campaign, and any extraordinary circumstances. On the basis of its review, the Board may either affirm or reduce the amount required for that parish or mission for the upcoming year. The Board's decision, and the reasons therefor, shall be reported promptly in writing to the rector, vestry, and Diocesan Council. If the Board recommends a reduction, it shall refer the parish or mission to appropriate sources of assistance for stewardship and congregational growth and development.

(b) The vestry of any parish or mission that finds that it will be unable to give the required amount to the Mission and Ministry Budget in the upcoming or current year due to financial exigencies arising after July 15 may apply for relief by stating its case in writing to the Fair Share Appeals Board. The Board shall consider the case and report its recommendation promptly in writing to the rector, vestry, and Diocesan Council. The Council may then grant such relief as it deems appropriate under the circumstances.

Section 4. If a parish or mission has failed by the tenth day preceding the Annual Convention to pay the full amount required of it for the preceding twelve calendar months ending at least 30 days before the Convention, the Secretary of the Convention shall strike from the roll of voting delegates

all members of the clergy assigned to and serving that parish or mission and its lay delegates. Such members of the clergy and lay delegates shall retain their seats in the Convention and shall have voice on all matters except those related to revenues and expenditures of the Diocese and establishment of the required percentage of giving for the following year. In addition, the vestry of a parish shall not elect a rector, nor shall the rector call an assistant minister or other member of the clergy, as long as the parish remains in arrears. If a parish fails for two consecutive years to contribute the amount required of it, the Secretary of the Convention shall so certify to the Ecclesiastical Authority, the Standing Committee, and the Trustees of the Diocese and that parish shall be deemed by operation of this canon to be changed in status from parish to mission.

Section 5. On or after September 1 of each year the Council shall prepare and adopt a Mission and Ministry Budget of the Diocese for the ensuing calendar year to be recommended to the Convention. In preparing the budget, the Council shall take into consideration its recommendations to the last preceding Convention concerning proposed new programs for the ensuing calendar year, the action of the Convention with respect to such recommendations, the proposed budgets submitted by each department and agency of the Diocese, and any other information believed pertinent. The contributions required by this Canon shall be set out in a schedule to become a part of the annual budget.

Section 6. The Convention shall have the power to act on the budget recommended by the Council and to make any modification which, in its discretion, it deems wise. The Convention may adjust the amount required of each parish and mission by a uniform percentage of reduction if the budget adopted by the Convention can be funded by less than the contribution percentage set by the previous Convention.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of each parish and mission to remit its contribution to the Treasurer of the Diocese in twelve equal monthly installments on or before the twenty-fifth day of the month for which it is payable. This obligation may be prepaid in whole or in part at any time.

Section 8. The Council shall have power to expend all moneys provided in the budget for the purposes therein specified, to expend any surplus received in any year over and above Diocesan and national obligations, and to amend the budget when in its judgment a change is necessary and prudent.

Canon D-IV.5 Collections and Offerings [Amended in 1999; Amended in 2005]

Section 1. Annually on the Sunday before Thanksgiving [Day] all clergy of the Diocese shall take an offering from the congregations they serve for the Thompson Child & Family Focus.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of each parish and mission to remit promptly each month to the proper officer entitled to receive them all amounts collected as special offerings. Any funds so contributed shall not be used, even temporarily, for any purpose other than that for which they were contributed.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the treasurer of such funds in each parish or mission to remit promptly each month to the proper officer entitled to receive them all amounts collected as herein provided. Any funds contributed for the above purposes shall not be used, even temporarily, for any purpose other than that for which they were contributed.

Canon D-IV.6 Permanent Endowment for Mission [Added by Act 2011-7]

Section 1. There is hereby established a permanent endowment for implementing the missionary strategy of the Diocese. The initial principal of the endowment shall comprise the balance remaining as of December 31, 2011, in the Mission Strategy Fund and the Diocesan Missions Trust (ACTS Campaign). On recommendation of the Diocesan Council, and with the advice and consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee, the Trustees of the Diocese may transfer to the endowment such other trust and custodial funds of the Diocese as may be available and appropriate. The Trustees of the Diocese may also accept donations and bequests designated for the endowment.

Section 2. The Trustees of the Diocese shall provide for the administration of the endowment as provided by Canon D-III.2, Section 5, except that the income shall be disbursed as directed by the Mission Endowment Board. The principal of the endowment is restricted and may not be appropriated except as may be necessary to maintain a prudent spending rate established by the Trustees. In no event shall the principal be reduced below the historic dollar value of the endowment except as may be authorized by act or resolution of the Convention.

Section 3. The Mission Endowment Board shall develop and recommend to the Council plans for developing the long-range mission strategy of the Diocese, and may make funds available to the Diocese Council in furtherance of that strategy. Distributions from the endowment shall not be used to fund the annual operating budget of the Diocese.

Canon D-IV.7 Permanent Episcopal and Missionary Funds

Section 1. There shall be established, to aid in the support of the Episcopate, a fund to be called the Permanent Episcopal Fund, to include all sums hitherto contributed specifically to that object or which may hereafter be contributed, whereof the principal shall remain untouched, and only the interest be applied to the support of the Episcopate.

Section 2. When any funds shall be contributed or collected for a Permanent Missionary Fund, the amount shall be invested and only the interest thereof shall be applied to current missionary expenses.

Canon D-IV.8 The Church Pension Fund [Amended in 1997]

Section 1. In conformity with the legislation adopted by the General Convention of 1913, pursuant to which The Church Pension Fund was duly incorporated, and in conformity with the Canon of the General Convention, "Of The Church Pension Fund," as heretofore amended and as it may hereafter be amended, the Diocese of North Carolina hereby accepts and acknowledges The Church Pension Fund, a corporation created by Chapter 97 of the Laws of 1914 of the State of New York as subsequently amended, as the authorized and approved pension system for the clergy of The Episcopal Church and for their dependents, and declares its intention of supporting said Fund in accordance with its rules.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Diocese to:

- (a) To be informed of, and to inform the clergy and laity of this Diocese of, the pension system created by the General Convention and committed by it to the Trustees of The Church Pension Fund, in order that the ordained clergy of the Church may be assured of pension protection for themselves in the event of old age or total and permanent disability and for their surviving spouses and minor orphan children in the event of death.
- **(b)** To receive reports from The Church Pension Fund, from time to time, on the status of the pension assessments payable to said Fund, under its rules and as required by canon law, by this Diocese and by the parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations within this Diocese.
- (c) To make an annual report to the Convention of this Diocese on such matters relating to The Church Pension Fund as may be of interest to the said Convention. Also make interim reports to the Diocesan Council just prior to its stated meetings.
- (d) To cooperate with The Church Pension Fund in doing all things necessary or advisable in the premises to the end that the clergy of this Diocese may be assured of the fullest pension protection by said Fund under its established rules.
- **Section 3.** It shall be the duty of this Diocese and of the parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations therein, each through its treasurer or other proper official, to inform The Church Pension Fund of salaries and other compensation paid to the clergy by said Diocese, parish, mission, and other ecclesiastical organization for services rendered, currently or in the past, prior to their becoming beneficiaries of said Fund, and changes in salaries and other compensation as they occur; and to pay promptly to The Church Pension Fund the pension assessments required thereon under the canon of the General Convention and in accordance with the rules of said Fund.
- **Section 4.** It shall be the duty of every member of the clergy canonically resident in or serving in this Diocese to inform The Church Pension Fund promptly of such facts as dates of birth, of ordination or reception, of marriage, birth of children, deaths, and changes in cures or salaries, as may be necessary for its proper administration and to cooperate with the Fund in such other ways as may be necessary in order that said Fund may discharge its obligations in accordance with the intention of the General Convention in respect thereto.

Section 5. Any parish or mission failing for two calendar years to pay the pension assessments in full shall be deprived of its rights to the floor of, and to vote in, Convention until all such arrears are paid in full, when its restoration to rights shall be declared.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Diocese, upon notification of arrears of four months or more to the Pension Fund, to deduct from the amount payable to any member of the clergy officiating in, or in charge of, any aided parish; or the missionary in charge of any mission; or a member of the clergy connected with any institution or agency of the Diocese, the unpaid assessments due from such congregation or agency on any stipend payable by such congregation, institution or agency, including any prior year's arrears, and to pay the same to the Church Pension Fund.

Title D-V: Congregations

Canon D-V.1 Missions

[Amended and renumbered in 1997; Amended in 2000; Amended in 2002; Amended by Act 2009-3]

Section 1. *Definition.* A mission is a congregation of adult communicants of The Episcopal Church that has been organized under the Constitution and canons of this Diocese, but which is not recognized as a parish. Missions also include congregations that have been reclassified as missions pursuant to Canon D-IV.4.

Section 2. *Establishment of Missions*. Missions may be established outside the neighborhood of existing parishes by the Ecclesiastical Authority at its discretion. Pending the selection of a vestry under the provisions of Section 3 of this canon, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a vestry. With the approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority a mission so established shall be admitted into union with the Convention upon application of the mission and by vote of the Convention.

A mission in the form of a special ministry may be established by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, acting with the advice of the Standing Committee, for such period of time and in such places as may be designated by that authority.

Missions may also be established within the neighborhood of an already existing parish by the rector of the parish with the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority. Missions so established shall be accounted an integral part of the parish to which they belong until such time as they may be received by the annual Convention as missions in union with the Convention. And every mission so established shall, within five years of its establishment, make application to the Convention of the Diocese to be received as a mission in union with the Convention.

Section 3. *Mission Meetings, Vestry and Officers.* [Amended by Act 2016-5 and Act 2021-6.] (a) Mission Meetings.

(1) Annual Meeting. Upon the first Monday in Advent, unless some other appropriate date has been designated by the vestry, an annual meeting of the members qualified to vote in the mission shall be held.

- (2) Other Mission Meetings. Upon the call of the Vicar or a majority of the vestry, a meeting of the members qualified to vote in the Mission may be held at any time, provided that notice of at least one week has been given.
- (3) Persons Qualified to Vote in Mission Meetings. Members of the mission who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of The Episcopal Church may vote when present at any meeting of that mission, in accordance with the provisions of Article IX, Section 3 of the Constitution of this Diocese.
- (4) *Bylaws*. For the orderly conduct of mission meetings, for the adoption of a rotating vestry system as authorized by subsection (b) of this Section, and for the election of members of the vestry, bylaws not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese may be adopted by any mission meeting. A copy of the bylaws and each amendment thereto adopted by each mission, certified by the secretary, shall be filed within 30 days thereafter with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for approval. The Ecclesiastical Authority may, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, disapprove any bylaw which is inconsistent with the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese or of the General Convention.
- (5) *Voting*. Motions, resolutions, elections and all other matters presented to a mission meeting for vote shall be decided by a majority of the qualified members present and voting; provided however the voting in vestry elections shall include any votes cast pursuant to a mission bylaw adopted pursuant to the following subsection (6).
- (6) Other Voting Methods. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Canon D-V.1, a mission may provide in its bylaws, subject to approval by the Ecclesiastical Authority acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, provisions for conducting vestry elections by paper absentee ballots, electronic survey technology, or other reliable and secure means that allow participation in the election by qualified voters who are not physically present at the annual meeting; provided that proxy voting shall not be permitted. Missions may define circumstances in which absentee ballots are made available.
- (7) *Initial Adoption*. Until the earlier to occur of December 31, 2022 and the elimination of restrictions on the permissible size of any parish meeting, a bylaw provision described in Section 3(a)(6) of this Canon as well as any bylaw to implement the provisions of Canon D-VII.4, Section 1 may, by action of the vestry, be submitted by mail ballot to qualified members of the mission pursuant to guidelines promulgated by the Diocesan Chancellor and adopted by the affirmative vote of a majority of the mail ballots completed by persons qualified to vote and returned to the mission by the deadline stated therein. Any such bylaws approved by the mail ballot shall be submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval as provided in Section 3(a)(4) of this Canon.

(b) Mission Vestries.

- (1) *Size and Composition*. A vestry shall be composed of not fewer than three nor more than 15 members of the mission who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of The Episcopal Church.
- (2) Powers of a Mission Vestry. The vestry of a mission shall be the trustees, shall have charge of all of the secular concerns thereof, and shall be authorized to collect, invest and disburse its funds and enter into contracts on its behalf.
- (3) Borrowings. Before the vestry of any mission shall engage in any borrowings or other similar financing transactions, the aggregate amount of which exceeds 50% of the normal operating income of the mission for the previous calendar year or the repayment of which may

extend beyond a term of 12 months, it shall obtain the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

- (4) Filling Vestry Vacancies.
- (i) In case of a vacancy on a vestry by reason of death, resignation or other cause, the remaining members of the vestry may fill the vacancy from among those eligible to serve under the provisions of this Canon.
- (ii) A person elected to fill a vacancy shall hold office until the expiration of the term of the person whose office is to be filled.
- (5) Rotating System. Upon majority vote at its annual meeting, a congregation may adopt a rotating system for its vestry if the size of the vestry is divisible by three by electing one-third in number to serve one year, one-third in number to serve two years, and one-third in number to serve three years. Thereafter such a congregation shall annually elect from its qualified members who have not served on the vestry during the past year one-third of the members of its vestry whose terms of office shall be for three years.
- (6) Officers. A senior and a junior warden shall be elected annually by the vestry from among its members. The senior warden shall be elected on the Vicar's nomination. If there be no Vicar the election of the senior warden shall proceed as in the case of the other vestry officers. The vestry shall also elect a clerk and a treasurer who need not be members of the vestry and whose terms of office shall be for one year or until their successors are elected.
- (7) Bylaws. For the orderly conduct of its meetings and other business, a vestry may adopt bylaws not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese. A copy of the bylaws and each amendment thereto adopted by each mission, certified by the secretary, shall be filed within 30 days thereafter with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for approval. The Ecclesiastical Authority may, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, disapprove any bylaw which is inconsistent with the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese or of the General Convention.
- (8) Report to the Diocesan Council. The names and mailing addresses of the foregoing officers of the Mission vestry shall be reported promptly to the Diocesan Council. If a Mission fails to elect a vestry and officers, the Bishop may appoint such vestry members and officers.
- (9) *Vestry Meetings*. All the provisions of Canon D-V.4, Section 5, relating to vestry meetings of parishes shall apply equally to vestry meetings of missions.
 - (10) Removal of Vestry Persons for Cause.
- (i) A person may be removed as a member of the vestry for cause by the vestry only in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph (10).
- (ii) A person may be removed as a member of the vestry by the vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the vestry then in office if the person has missed three or more meetings of the vestry in a twelve month period without excuse, if before any meeting of the vestry at which a vote on the removal of such person will be made, such person is given notice of the date and time of the meeting and the cause for removal and such person is given an opportunity to be heard at the meeting.
- (iii) A person may be removed as a member of the vestry by the vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the vestry then in office for cause other than the failure to attend vestry meetings as described in subparagraph (10)(ii), above, if before any meeting of the vestry at which a vote on the removal of such person will be made, such person is given notice of the date and time of the meeting and the cause for removal and such person is given an opportunity to be heard at the meeting.

Section 4. *Admission to Union with Convention.* In order to be admitted into union with the Convention, a mission congregation comprising 20 or more adult communicants shall:

First. Obtain the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee.

Second. If within the neighborhood of any already existing parishes or missions in union with the Convention, obtain and present to the Convention written statements from the rectors of such parishes or vicars of such missions that they have been consulted with regard to the wisdom of the establishment of the new congregation.

Third. Assume a name with the consent of the Bishop and elect a vestry.

Fourth. Subscribe and present to the Secretary of Convention, at least 30 days before the meeting of the Convention, a certificate in the following words, *viz*:

"We, the undersigned, being adult communicants, desirous to form ourselves into a mission of The Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, do certify that:

- (a) We consent to be governed by the Constitution and Canons of the Church, as set forth in the General Convention, and in the Constitution and Canons of the Church in this Diocese;
 - (b) We have assumed the name of _____; and ____; and ____; where the state of the Vestry: ____.
- (d) We have the ability and it is our purpose to provide a suitable place of worship and to bear our share of the Budget for the Mission and Ministry of the Diocese according to the canons; and
- (e) With the advice and consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, it is our purpose to provide and, if within the financial ability of our congregation, pay for regular priestly ministrations.

 In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names; this ______day of______, in the year of our Lord ."

For the purpose of recording said subscriptions, as also for the purpose of receiving the subscriptions of subsequent voters, provided for by Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution, a book shall be kept by the vestry of each mission, and shall be available at elections for vestry members.

- **Section 5.** Report of Mission Officers. (a) Upon the establishment of a mission, the Bishop shall promptly file with the Secretary of the Convention a copy in writing of the appointment of the member of the clergy designated as the vicar, as well as the officers appointed for the mission, together with their respective post office addresses.
- (b) The ministers and officers of all missions and of all parishes supported wholly or in part by appropriations of missionary funds, whether Diocesan or general, shall make reports to the Diocesan Council as to their work.

Section 6. *Maintaining Status.* In order to maintain its status as a mission in union with the Convention, a congregation

(a) must at all times meet the minimum of standard business methods prescribed by Canon D-IV.2, and submit to the Department of Finance and Administration of the Diocesan Council, on or before September 1 each year, a certified copy of its annual audit for the preceding fiscal year as prescribed by Canon D-IV.2(f);

- **(b)** must not fail in any single year to file with the Bishop or with the Secretary of the Convention, if the Secretary has been designated as the Bishop's agent for that purpose, a complete and correct parochial report as prescribed in Canon D-V.8; and
 - (c) must not fail for two consecutive years to be represented at the Diocesan Convention;
- (d) must, beginning three years following the adoption of this canon, be able to demonstrate that it has maintained an average of at least 20 adult communicant members during the preceding three years, or during the term of its union with the Convention if less than three years; provided that the provisions of this (d) shall not apply to missions in union with the Convention prior to February 1, 1987;
- (e) must be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention and of the Diocese of North Carolina:
- (f) must, within its financial ability, pay for regular priestly ministrations, including at least two celebrations of the Holy Eucharist each calendar month;
- **(g)** must, under the provisions of Canon D-IV.4 accept and pay its share of the Budget for the Mission and Ministry of the Diocese according to the canons.
 - (h) must maintain a suitable place of worship.

Canon D-V.2 Organization of Parishes

[Amended in 1997; Amended in 2000; Amended by Act 2009-3]

Section 1. In order to organize a new parish in the Diocese of North Carolina, the proposed congregation, comprising 100 or more enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing at the time of its application for admission into union with the Convention shall:

First. Obtain the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Second. If within the neighborhood of any existing parishes or missions, obtain written statements from the rectors or vicars thereof that they have been consulted as to the wisdom of the establishment of the new congregation.

Third. Assume a name and elect a vestry.

Fourth. Subscribe and present to the Secretary of Convention, at least 30 days before the meeting of the Convention, a certificate in the following words, *viz:*

"We, the undersigned, enrolled	d confirmed adult commun	nicants in good standing, de	sirous to	
form ourselves into a parish of The Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, do certify				
that we consent to be governed by the Constitution and Canons of the Church, as set forth in the

as a vestry:	_; that we have the ability	y and that it is our purpose	either to	
employ and support a full-time priest at a salary in an amount not less than that adopted for mission

to the office of rector as may be prescribed by the minimum salary schedule, or, with the				
permission of the Bishop, to employ a resident priest on a part-time basis. It is also our purpose to				
provide and maintain a suitable place of worship and to pay our share of the Budget for the Mission

For the purpose of recording said subscriptions, as also for the purpose of receiving the subscriptions of subsequent voters, provided for by Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution, a book shall be kept by the vestry of each parish, and shall be available at elections for members of the vestry. For the purposes of this canon the expression "full-time" shall mean being on call at all times at least five days (including Sunday) a week.

Section 2. A Multi-Congregation Parish. Whenever more than one and not more than three contiguous congregations shall organize themselves into a parish and shall have been admitted to union with the Convention, it shall have only one vestry, elected according to bylaws assuring proper representation for its component congregations; a single parish budget which shall include at least the minimum compensation of its rector; and a single set of lay representatives in Diocesan Convention. Under its bylaws the parish is authorized to establish whatever local advisory bodies it considers desirable.

Section 3. Organization of a Mission. Any parish which may wish to locate or establish a mission in the neighborhood of another parish or mission, or any parish or mission which shall deem its rights encroached upon, or its prosperity or usefulness endangered by the proposed location in its neighborhood of a parish or mission by whatever authority, may ask for a determination of the matter under the good offices of the Bishop. In such case the Bishop shall call for, and appoint the time and place of, a conference of the rectors, vicars, and vestries of the parishes and missions in interest. But if such conference with the advice of the Bishop shall not result in an amicable adjustment of the differences between the parties thereto, the Bishop or either of the parties in interest may lay the matter at issue before the Standing Committee of the Diocese. After careful investigation and consideration, the Standing Committee shall render its decision, which shall be final.

Section 4. To maintain its status as a parish, the parish must meet the following standards:

- (a) It must have an average of at least 100 enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing for the three years preceding the date of ascertaining whether this standard has been met, or the term of its existence if less than three years.
 - **(b)** It must maintain and control a suitable place of worship.
- (c) It must employ and support as rector a full-time resident priest, or, with the permission of the Bishop, a resident priest on a part-time basis. The full-time rector and any full-time assistants shall be paid a salary for each in an amount not less than the minimum salary adopted for mission clergy by the Diocesan Council from time to time, together with such other emoluments pertaining to the office of rector or assistant to the rector as may be prescribed under said minimum salary schedule; provided that in the case of a vacancy in a parish the Bishop may deem it expedient and proper to maintain divine services in the parish under the provisions of Canon D-V.7, Section 1, and may procure the part-time services of a minister for the parish until a rector can be obtained. The parish shall pay to the part-time minister such compensation for the temporary services as may be approved by the Bishop.
- (d) It must not fail for two consecutive years to be represented at the annual Convention of the Diocese.
- (e) It must be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention and of the Diocese of North Carolina.

- (f) It must not fail in any single year to file with the Bishop or with the Secretary of the Convention, if the Secretary be designated as the Bishop's agent for such purpose, a complete and correct parochial report as prescribed and required by the provisions of Canon D-V.8.
- (g) It must at all times meet the minimum standard of business methods prescribed by Canon D-IV.2, and submit to the Department of Finance and Administration of the Diocesan Council, on or before September 1, each year, a certified copy of its annual audit for the preceding fiscal year prepared as prescribed by Canon D-IV.2(f).
- **(h)** It must, under the provisions of Canon D-IV.4 accept and pay its share of the Budget for the Mission and Ministry of the Diocese.
 - (i) It must comply with any decision of the Bishop rendered under Canon D-V.12.

Canon D-V.3 Clusters [Adopted in 2005]

[Adopted in 2005]

Section 1. Definition. A cluster consists of three or more parishes, missions, or special ministries organized under the Constitution and canons of this Diocese, hereinafter referred to as participating congregations, which have entered into a covenant to work together in a regional ministry for a period of at least three years. Each participating congregation retains its own identity, vestry or other governing body, budget, property, and representation in the Convention of the Diocese.

Section 2. Formation of a Cluster. A cluster may be formed, with the consent of the Bishop, upon an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the vestry or other governing body of each participating congregation. Thereafter, a congregation may join the cluster, with the consent of the Bishop, upon an affirmative vote of three-fourths of its vestry or other governing body and an affirmative vote of a majority of the cluster council.

Section 3. Cluster Governance and Leadership.

- (a) Cluster Council. There shall be a cluster council, which shall consist of not less than two enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing from each participating congregation. The clergy serving participating congregations shall be members of the cluster council with seat and voice but no vote.
- **(b)** Cluster Bylaws. The cluster council may adopt bylaws which include provision for the election of a president, a secretary, and a treasurer from among those lay persons eligible to serve on the cluster council and the establishment of an annual cluster budget. A copy of the bylaws and each amendment thereto adopted by the cluster council, certified by the secretary, shall be filed within 30 days thereafter with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for approval.
- (c) Cluster Ministry Team. There shall be a cluster ministry team, which shall include the clergy serving participating congregations and lay missioners designated by the cluster council.
- (d) Cluster Missioner. The Bishop shall appoint a cluster missioner, who shall coordinate the cluster ministry team.

Section 4. Withdrawal from a Cluster. A participating congregation may withdraw from a cluster at the end of a calendar year, with the consent of the Bishop, upon six months' notice, an

affirmative vote of three-fourths of its vestry or other governing body, and an affirmative vote of a majority of the cluster council.

Canon D-V.4

Meetings, Vestries and Wardens of Parishes

[Amended in 1991; Amended by Act 2009-3; Amended by Act 2014-2; Amended by Act 2021-7]

Section 1. Parish Meetings.

- (a) *Annual Meeting*. An annual meeting of the members qualified to vote in a parish shall be held on the first Monday in Advent unless the vestry of the parish designates some other date for the required annual meeting.
- **(b)** Other Parish Meetings. Upon the call of the vestry, a meeting of the members qualified to vote in a parish may be held at any time, provided that notice of at least one week has been given.
- (c) *Persons Qualified to Vote in Parish Meetings*. An enrolled confirmed adult communicant in good standing in this Church may vote when present at any meeting of that parish, in accordance with the provisions of Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution of this Diocese.
- (d) *Bylaws*. For the orderly conduct of parish meetings, for the adoption of a rotating vestry system as authorized by Section 2 of this canon, and for the election of members of the vestry, bylaws not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese may be adopted by any parish meeting. A copy of the bylaws and each amendment thereto adopted by each parish, certified by the secretary, shall be filed within 30 days thereafter with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for approval. The Ecclesiastical Authority may, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, disapprove any bylaw which is inconsistent with the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese or of the General Convention. [Amended by Act 2007-9.]
- (e) *Voting*. Motions, resolutions, elections, and all other matters presented to a parish meeting for vote shall be decided by a majority of the qualified members present and voting; provided however the voting in vestry elections shall include any votes cast pursuant to a parish bylaw adopted pursuant to Canon D-V.4, Section 2(g)(4).
- (f) *Initial Adoption*. Until the earlier to occur of December 31, 2022 and the elimination of restrictions on the permissible size of any parish meeting, a bylaw provision described in Section 2(g)(4) of this Canon as well as a bylaw to implement the provisions of Canon D-VII.4, Section 1 may, by action of the vestry be submitted by mail ballot to qualified members of the parish pursuant to guidelines promulgated by the Diocesan Chancellor and adopted by the affirmative vote of a majority of the mail ballots completed by persons qualified to vote and returned to the parish by the deadline stated therein. Any such bylaws approved by the mail ballot shall be submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval as provided in Section 1(d) of this Canon.

Section 2. Vestries.

- (a) *Size and Composition.* A vestry shall be composed of not fewer than three nor more than 15 members of the parish who are enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing of The Episcopal Church.
- **(b)** *Vestry Plan One.* At each annual parish meeting a vestry shall be elected who shall hold office until the next annual parish meeting or until their successors are duly elected.
- (c) Vestry Plan Two. As an alternative to Vestry Plan One, a parish may adopt a rotating vestry system. At the first election following the adoption of a rotating system, which shall be held at the annual parish meeting, one-third of the members of the vestry are elected to serve for one year, one-third for two years, and one-third for three years. Thereafter, at the annual parish meeting,

one-third of the vestry shall be elected from among those who have not served on the vestry during the past year, except that those appointed during the past year to fill unexpired terms of one year or less may, under provisions of parish bylaws, be made eligible for election to a full term, and the terms of those so elected shall be for three years. A parish may include in its rotating system a provision that no retiring member of the vestry shall be eligible for re-election until a specified period of time, not to exceed five years, has elapsed following the expiration of that person's term on the vestry.

(d) Vestry Plan Three. As an alternate to Vestry Plans One and Two, a parish may adopt a two-year rotating system, as follows: At the first election after such a system is adopted, one-half of the members of the vestry shall be elected for one year and one-half for two years. Thereafter, at the annual meeting, one-half of the vestry shall be elected from among those who have not served on the vestry during the past year, and the terms of those so elected shall be for two years. Persons appointed during the past year to fill unexpired terms of one year or less under provisions of parish bylaws, may be made eligible for election for a full term, and the terms of those so elected shall be for two years. Should a parish vote to change the Vestry Plan Two to Vestry Plan Three, the change shall be effected by electing for two-year terms those who are to take the place of persons whose terms of office had been three years. A parish may include in its rotating vestry system a provision that no retiring member of the vestry shall be eligible for re-election until a specified period of time, not to exceed five years, has elapsed following the expiration of that person's term on the vestry.

(e) Filling Vestry Vacancies.

- (1) In case of a vacancy on a vestry by reason of death, resignation, or other cause, the remaining members of the vestry may fill the vacancy from among those eligible to serve under the provisions of this canon.
- (2) A person elected to fill a vacancy on a vestry shall hold office until the expiration of the term of the person whose office is to be filled.
- **(f)** *Bylaws*. For the orderly conduct of its meetings and other business, a vestry may adopt bylaws not inconsistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese. A copy of the bylaws and each amendment thereto adopted by each parish, certified by the secretary, shall be filed within 30 days thereafter with the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for approval. The Ecclesiastical Authority may, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, disapprove any bylaw which is inconsistent with the Constitution or Canons of the Diocese or of the General Convention.

(g) Nomination and Election Procedures.

- (1) Nominations of persons to be elected to a vestry may be received at an annual parish meeting in accordance with bylaws adopted by the parish. Bylaws governing the nomination of persons for election to the vestry may provide for taking preferential ballots prior to the time of the annual parish meeting, but if this is done, the bylaws shall provide that the number of nominees presented for election at the annual parish meeting shall be at least twice the number of positions to be filled on the vestry at that meeting.
- (2) A majority of those present and voting in an annual parish meeting shall be necessary to elect a member of the vestry. Nominees receiving a majority shall be declared elected. If additional ballots are required, the nominees to be voted on shall be limited to twice the number of positions remaining to be filled and, within that number, shall be those not elected on the previous ballot who received the highest number of votes. However, should there be a tie vote for the last position on any subsequent ballot, the number of nominees to be placed on that ballot shall be increased to include the two or more nominees whose votes were tied.

- (3) Nominations and elections for members of the vestry may be by paper ballot or by voice vote in accordance with the bylaws adopted by a parish meeting as provided in Section 1 of this canon.
- (4) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Canon D-V.4, a parish may provide in its bylaws, subject to approval by the Ecclesiastical Authority acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, provisions for conducting vestry elections by paper absentee ballots, electronic survey technology, or other reliable and secure means that allow participation in the election by qualified voters who are not physically present at the annual meeting; provided that proxy voting shall not be permitted. Parishes may define circumstances in which absentee ballots are made available.

(h) Removal of Vestry Persons for Cause.

- (1) A person may be removed as a member of the vestry for cause by vestry only in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph (h).
- (2) A person may be removed as a member of the vestry by the vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the vestry then in office if the person has missed three or more meetings of the vestry in a twelve month period without excuse, if before any meeting of the vestry at which a vote on the removal of such person will be made, such person is given notice of the date and time of the meeting and the cause for removal and such person is given an opportunity to be heard at the meeting.
- (3) A person may be removed as a member of the vestry by the vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the vestry then in office for cause other than the failure to attend vestry meetings as described in subparagraph (h)(2), above, if before any meeting of the vestry at which a vote on the removal of such person will be made, such person is given notice of the date and time of the meeting and the cause for removal and such person is given an opportunity to be heard at the meeting. [Added by Act 2016-5.]

Section 3. Wardens.

- (a) *Election*. Each vestry shall annually elect from among its own number a Senior and a Junior Warden. The vestry shall elect the Senior Warden upon nomination by the rector unless there is no rector, in which case the election shall proceed without the rector's nomination. If a vacancy occurs in the office of Senior Warden or Junior Warden, a successor shall be nominated and elected in the same manner.
- **(b)** *Duties.* In the absence of the rector, the wardens shall preside in all meetings of the vestry or congregation, in order of their official seniority. As representatives of the vestry, they shall (subject to the vestry's directions and consistent with the rights of the rector) have charge of the church building and they shall see that it is kept from all uses inconsistent with the doctrine or discipline of The Episcopal Church and, so far as possible, in good repair, as becomes the house of God. The wardens shall see that the church is prepared for public worship and that order is preserved during that worship; that suitable books are provided for the services, vestments for the clergy, and, when necessary, the elements for the Holy Communion.
- **Section 4.** *Treasurer*. In the absence of any other appointment, the Junior Warden shall act as treasurer of the parish.

Section 5. Vestry Meetings in Certain Cases.

- (a) Should the rector refuse to call a meeting of the vestry and, in the opinion of the wardens or a majority of the vestry, such a meeting would be of importance, the wardens or any three members of the vestry may call a vestry meeting. In such a case, however, the rector shall be notified of the time and place of the called meeting of the Vestry.
- **(b)** Except by unanimous consent, all vestry members shall receive at least three days advance notice of the time and place of each vestry meeting other than regular meetings that have been scheduled by the vestry at the beginning of each year.
- **(c)** At each vestry meeting, the presence of a majority of the membership shall be necessary to constitute a quorum. Motions, resolutions, elections, and all other matters presented to the vestry for vote shall be decided by a majority of the members present at a meeting at which a quorum is present.
- (d) Accurate minutes of each vestry meeting shall be kept, signed by the secretary or clerk, presented at the next meeting for approval, revised if necessary, thereafter approved, and preserved with the records of the parish.

Section 6. This Canon D-V.4 shall continue to govern the structure and organization of the vestry of a former parish whose status has been changed to that of a mission pursuant to Canon D-IV.4.

Canon D-V.5 Legal Powers of a Parish Vestry

[Amended in 1997; Amended in 2000; Amended 2002]

- **Section 1.** The vestry of a parish shall be the trustees, shall have charge of all the secular concerns thereof, shall hold the property belonging thereto, and shall be authorized to collect, invest, and disburse its funds and enter into contracts on its behalf.
- Section 2. Before the vestry of any parish shall be authorized to sell, mortgage, or otherwise convey or encumber any real property held by it or by a corporation or other entity formed or controlled by or affiliated with such parish, including encumbrances arising from purchase money obligations or engage in any borrowings or other similar financing transactions, the aggregate amount of which exceeds 50% of the normal operating income of the parish for the previous calendar year or the repayment of which may extend beyond a term of 12 months, it shall obtain the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. Upon obtaining this consent, the vestry may, by appropriate resolution, authorize the wardens of the parish to execute such instruments as may be necessary or convenient for the purpose, and instruments so executed shall have the same force and effect as if executed individually by the members of the vestry. In such instruments, a recital by the wardens of their authority to act on behalf of the vestry, and of the fact that the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, has been obtained, shall be *prima facie* true, and in the absence of notice or knowledge to the contrary, may be relied upon by the grantee or grantees in such instruments.
- **Section 3.** Notwithstanding any other provision of this canon, no consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Standing Committee shall be required for any of the following transactions

involving real property that is not consecrated for the use as a church or chapel: (1) leases that can be canceled without penalty upon notice of 30 days or less to the lessee, (2) temporary easements of less than 12 months duration, and (3) cemetery lots or other interment rights.

Canon D-V.6 Junior or Associate Vestry

Section 1. The Congregation of each parish and mission in the Diocese shall have the authority at any regular annual meeting, notice of which shall include a copy of such proposed action, to create and elect a junior or associate vestry, composed of no more than six enrolled confirmed adult communicants in good standing, and prescribing the number, term of office, and defining the scope of authority delegated to such junior or associate vestry. If a junior or associate vestry is established, all matters which have been or may be placed specifically within the power and authority of the regular vestry of parishes and missions by the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention or by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina, shall remain in the sole and exclusive jurisdiction of the vestry.

Section 2. Any regular vestry of a parish or mission may, in its discretion, invite the junior or associate vestry to meet jointly with it, participate in discussion of all matters and vote on all matters coming before the vestry, except matters of contract, real property, trusts committed to the vestry, or other matters concerning which minors are not authorized to act under the laws of North Carolina.

Section 3. The congregation at any annual meeting shall have the authority to change, modify, amend or rescind any action theretofore authorized under the provisions of this canon.

Canon D-V.7 Filling Vacant Cures and odd in 2002: Amandod by Act 2009

[Amended in 2002; Amended by Act 2009-3]

- **Section 1.** When a parish or congregation becomes vacant, the wardens or other proper officers shall inform the Bishop. If the authorities of the parish shall for 30 days have failed to make provision for services, the Bishop shall take such measures as may be deemed expedient for the temporary maintenance of divine services therein.
- **Section 2.** No rector, interim rector or other clergy shall be elected by any vestry during such time as the parish is not in compliance with Canon D-IV.4, nor until the member of the clergy who is proposed by the vestry shall have been approved in writing by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.
- **Section 3.** Written notice of the election signed by the wardens shall be sent to the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. If the Ecclesiastical Authority be satisfied that the parish is in compliance with Canon D-IV.4, and the person so chosen is a duly qualified minister and has accepted the

office, it shall send notice thereof to the Secretary of the Convention, who shall so record it. Such record shall be sufficient evidence of the relation between the minister and the parish.

Section 4. No assistant minister or other clergy shall be called by the rector of a parish during such time as the parish is not in compliance with Canon D-IV.4, nor without the consent of the vestry, nor until the proposed assistant or other clergy shall have been approved in writing by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese.

Section 5. In case of a vacancy in a mission, the Bishop shall appoint a vicar for a term of not more than four years; at the end of such term the vicar may be re-appointed.

Canon D-V.8 Definitions, Registers, and Reports [Amended in 1996]

Section 1. *Registers.* Each congregation of this Diocese shall, by and under the supervision of its rector or vicar and vestry, keep and maintain in a permanent book known as its Parish or Mission Register, an up-to-date record of all baptisms, confirmations, marriages, and burials solemnized within that congregation. This record shall specify the names of the persons in each instance; the parentage and date of birth of those baptized, with the names of their sponsors or witnesses; the date when each rite was performed; and the name or names of the officiating minister or ministers. In the case of each individual baptism, the officiating minister shall sign the Register. This Register signed by the minister, or by the Senior Warden if there is no minister, shall be presented to the Bishop for inspection at every annual visitation.

Section 2. Other Required Reports. Every minister canonically resident in this Diocese shall keep a record of all baptisms, marriages, and burials solemnized by him or her that are not otherwise reported in the Register of a congregation of this Diocese as required by Section 1, as well as any other otherwise unreported official acts done or performed or services held by him or her during the preceding calendar year, and shall annually before February 1 report them to the Ecclesiastical Authority. If he or she has not performed any such official acts or held any such services in that period, he or she shall report that fact and the causes or reasons which have prevented him or her from performing them.

The provisions of this Section 2 shall apply equally to otherwise unreported rites solemnized or services held in this Diocese by clergy who are not canonically resident in but are licensed to serve in this Diocese.

Section 3.

(a) *Definitions*. A *member* of this Church is a person who has been baptized with water in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and whose baptism has been duly recorded in this Church.

An *adult member* is a member who is 16 years of age, or older.

A confirmed member is:

(1) one who has been baptized in this church as an adult and has received the laying on of hands by the Bishop at Baptism, or

- (2) one who has been baptized in this church as an adult and at some time after the Baptism has received the laying on of hands by the Bishop in Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows, or
- (3) any baptized person who received the laying on of hands at Confirmation by any bishop in apostolic succession and has been received into The Episcopal Church by a Bishop of this Church, or
- (4) any baptized person who has received the laying on of hands by a Bishop of this Church at Confirmation or Reception.

A *communicant* is a member who has received the Holy Communion in this Church at least three times during the preceding year.

A communicant in good standing is a communicant who, for the preceding year, has been faithful in corporate worship (unless for good cause prevented) and has been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God.

An *enrolled member of a congregation* is a member whose baptism has been recorded in that congregation, or who has been duly transferred to that congregation.

- **(b)** For statistical purposes the minister in charge of a parish or mission shall annually report the number of baptisms, confirmations, marriages and burials. The minister shall also report the total number of baptized members, distinguishing those 16 and over from those under 16 years of age; the total number of confirmed communicants in good standing, distinguishing those 16 and over from those under 16 years of age; as well as other items required by the Parochial Report form approved by the Executive Council of The Episcopal Church.
- (c) The minister in charge of a parish or mission shall also maintain for current and future use lists of families and individuals within that cure, and for purposes of the enrollment or removal of each member maintain an indication of the member's status as baptized, under 16 or adult, whether or not a communicant, and if so whether in good standing, and whether considered confirmed or not.
- **Section 4.** *Letters of Transfer.* At least once a year rectors and vicars shall instruct the people of their cures in regard to the law of this church concerning letters of transfer. When members move their residence, the rector or vicar of their former congregation shall promptly inform the rector or vicar of a congregation in the area to which they have moved, and that member of the clergy shall use all diligence to see that these persons may become affiliated with an appropriate parish or mission without delay.

Section 5. *Parochial Reports*. A report of every parish or mission in this Diocese shall be prepared annually for the year ending on December 31 preceding, upon the blank form prepared by the Executive Council of this Church and approved by the General Convention Committee on the State of the Church. It shall be sent in duplicate not later than March 1 to the Bishop, or, if there is no Bishop, to the Secretary of the Convention. The Bishop may require that this report be mailed directly to the Secretary, who shall report to the Bishop any parish or mission whose report has not been received by March 1. The report shall include all information necessary to complete the prescribed form in accordance with the provisions of Title I, Canon 6, Section 1, of the Canons of the General Convention. In every parish and mission the preparation and delivery of this report shall be the joint duty of the rector or vicar and vestry unless there is no rector or vicar, in which case it shall be the duty of the vestry to prepare and deliver the report.

In administering the provisions of Canon D-IV.4 with respect to establishing each parish's and mission's share of the Diocesan budget, the Diocesan Council may estimate the income and

expenses of any parish or mission that has failed to submit its parochial report by February 1. [Amended by Act 2006-7.]

Section 6. *Printing Reports.* The parochial reports required by Section 5 of this canon, or such parts of them as the Bishop may deem fit, shall be printed in the *Journal of the Convention*.

Canon D-V.9 Consecration of Churches, Chapels or Other Buildings

Section 1. In this Diocese, no church, chapel or other building, or part of a building used in whole or in part for church purposes shall be dedicated or consecrated except according to the rubrics pertaining thereto as set forth in the Book of Common Prayer, and in accordance with the Canons of the General Convention not inconsistent with those rubrics.

Section 2. No previously consecrated church, chapel, building, or part of a building that is owned or controlled by this Diocese or by any congregation or institution of this Diocese shall be removed, taken down, or otherwise disposed of for any worldly or common use, without the previous written consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee of the Diocese, nor until the Sentence of Consecration previously placed thereupon has been properly removed there from.

Canon D-V.10 *Memorials*

No memorial shall hereafter be placed in any church without the consent both of the rector or vicar and of the vestry. No memorial heretofore placed in any church, and none hereafter placed in accordance with this canon, shall be altered or removed without the consent both of the rector or vicar, and of the vestry. When there is no rector or vicar, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, with that of the vestry, shall suffice, and if there be no vestry, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, with that of the vicar, must be obtained.

Canon D-V.11 Pastoral Mediation

Section 1. Except as provided in the Canons of the General Convention, a rector may not resign a parish without the consent of the vestry thereof, nor may a rector canonically chosen and in charge of a parish be removed there from by its vestry against the rector's will, except as provided by canon. [Amended by Act 2007-10.]

Section 2. If a rector and the vestry of the parish served are unable to agree in a matter or matters that might lead to a request by either party for dissolution of the pastoral relation, either or both parties shall promptly deliver to the Ecclesiastical Authority a written notice describing their differences and requesting mediation thereof by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Upon receiving such a request, the Bishop shall mediate the disagreement and seek a solution. As part of the mediation process, the Bishop may appoint a committee composed of one presbyter and one lay person, neither of whom is affiliated with the parish in which the disagreement exists, to investigate and make a written report thereof, stating the nature of the dispute and the position of each party. This report shall be delivered to the Bishop, the rector, and the vestry within 21 days after the committee's appointment.

In the absence of the Bishop, the Standing Committee shall exercise the role assigned the Bishop in this canon.

Canon D-V.12 Dissolution of the Pastoral Relation

- **Section 1.** If the pastoral mediation called for by Canon D-V.11 has been exhausted without success and a rector or the vestry of the parish served wishes to have the pastoral relation dissolved, each party, within 60 days of the conclusion of the pastoral mediation process, may request final disposition of the dispute by giving notice thereof to the Ecclesiastical Authority and to the other party concerned.
- **Section 2.** Within 30 days after receiving the written notice provided for in Section 1, the Bishop shall conduct a hearing on the issue. The Bishop shall fix the date, time, and place for the hearing, notify the parties affected, and conduct the hearing as ultimate arbiter and judge. In all cases, the Bishop shall consult and seek the advice of the Standing Committee before reaching a decision.
- **Section 3.** At the Bishop's request, the Standing Committee shall be present at the hearing provided for in Section 2 and shall be permitted to question persons present for the hearing. The Chancellor shall be available to the Bishop for consultation at the hearing.
- **Section 4.** Each party, his, her, or their representative may present a statement of position and the reasons supporting it. No testimony or other evidence shall be presented at the hearing unless, exercising discretion, the Bishop shall allow it for compelling reasons in the interests of justice. Oral statements and testimony shall be subject to cross-examination.
- **Section 5.** The Bishop shall render a decision not later than 15 days following the close of the hearing and that decision shall be final and binding.
- **Section 6.** If the pastoral relation is to be dissolved:
- (a) The Bishop shall set forth in writing the reasons and conditions for the dissolution. A copy shall be provided each of the parties to the matter at issue, and a copy of the decision shall be available for public inspection.
- **(b)** The Bishop shall require just and compassionate compensation or indemnity (if any) and shall undertake to offer such supportive services as may be suitable.
- **Section 7.** In the event of the failure or refusal of either party to comply with the terms of the decision, the Bishop may impose such penalties as may be provided by the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese; and in default of any provisions for such penalties therein, the Bishop may act as follows:

- (a) In the case of a rector, inhibit such rector from officiating in the parish until the decision is complied with.
- **(b)** In the case of a vestry, recommend to the Diocesan Convention that the union of the parish with Convention cease until the parish complies with the decision.

Section 8. Statements made during the course of the proceedings under this Canon are not admissible in any proceeding under Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention or Title D-VI of the Canons of this Diocese. However, this rule does not require the exclusion of evidence in proceedings under the above Canons of the General Convention or of this Diocese, which evidence is otherwise discoverable and admissible.

Canon D-V.13

Status of Parishes and Missions

[Amended in 1997; Amended in 2000; Amended by Act 2009-3]

Section 1.

- (a) By December 15 of each year, the Bishop and Standing Committee shall have made an annual survey of the parishes and missions of the Diocese. If, after any survey, they shall find that a parish does not meet the standards set in Canon D-V.2, Section 4, they shall notify the parish that its status has changed to that of a mission pursuant to Canon D-IV.4 or unless, within one year from said notice, it meets all of the other required standards, the Bishop, with the advice of the Standing Committee, will change its status to that of mission, effective at the end of the following December.
- **(b)** If, after any survey, the Bishop and the Standing Committee shall find that a mission does not meet the standards set in Canons D-IV.2 and D-V.1, they shall notify the mission that unless the mission meets the aforesaid standards within one year from said notice, the Bishop, with the advice of the Standing Committee, will request the Convention next following the end of that year to dissolve the mission's union with the Convention.
- (c) Should any parish fail to meet the numerical membership requirements set forth in Canon D-V.2, Section 4(a), it may yet maintain parish status if it demonstrates to the Bishop and the Standing Committee that
- (1) It has the financial and other resources to meet and is meeting the requirements in Canon D-V.2, Sections 4(b-j);
- (2) It, in fact, accepts and pays its full share of the Budget for the Mission and Ministry of the Diocese according to the canons;
- (3) It maintains the normal church programs, particularly outreach and Christian Education programs, appropriate to the character and needs of its membership.
- (d) Any parish or mission affected by this canon is entitled, upon its request, to a hearing before the Standing Committee within the year's time granted in this canon.
- **Section 2.** If a parish is dissolved or if its status is changed from parish to mission, the property belonging to it shall vest in the Trustees of the Diocese, in trust for the interests of the Church in the late parish. If the change in status occurred pursuant to Canon D-IV.4, the property shall revert to the parish when all arrears have been paid in full and the parish has remained in compliance with Canon D-IV.4 for two successive years. If the change in status occurred for any other reason,

the property shall revert to the parish upon its *bona fide* reorganization and admission into union with the Convention as a parish.

Section 3. Upon the dissolution of a parish or mission, the Trustees of the Diocese, upon failure of the congregation of the parish or mission to reorganize within a reasonable time, and upon the adoption of a resolution by the Trustees that it will be for the best interest of the Church in the Diocese, shall have the power and the authority to sell and convey such property and to execute and deliver a good and sufficient deed upon the payment of such sale price as may be determined or to manage, rent, lease or otherwise dispose of said property by instrument sufficient for that purpose, first having obtained the written consent of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee. The net proceeds and income from such a sale shall then be held by the Trustees of the Diocese to be used for such purposes as the Bishop and Diocesan Council may direct upon recommendation of the Department of Congregational Support and Development.

Title D-VI: Ecclesiastical Discipline

Canon D-VI.1

Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention [Added by Act 2010-3; Amended by Act 2011-2]

Those provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention which are applicable to the Diocese are hereby incorporated as part of this Title. To the extent, if any, that any of the provisions of this Title are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of Title IV, the provisions of Title IV shall govern.

Canon D-VI.2 Disciplinary Board Operations

[Added by Act 2010-3; Amended by Act 2011-2]

- Section 1. Preserving Impartiality. In any proceeding under this Title, if any member of a Conference Panel or Hearing Panel of the Disciplinary Board shall become aware of a personal conflict of interest of undue bias, that member shall immediately notify the President of the Board and request a replacement member of the Panel. Respondent's Counsel and the Church Attorney shall have the right to challenge any member of a Panel for conflict of interest or undue bias by motion to the Panel for disqualification of the challenged member. The members of the Panel not the subjects of the challenge shall promptly consider the motion and determine whether the challenged Panel member shall be disqualified from participating in that proceeding.
- **Section 2. President.** Within 60 days following the annual Convention, the Board shall convene to elect a President to serve for the following year.
- **Section 3. Intake Officer.** The Intake Officer shall be appointed from time to time by the Ecclesiastical Authority after consultation with the Board. The Ecclesiastical Authority may appoint one or more Intake Officers according to the needs of the Diocese. The Ecclesiastical

Authority shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese.

Section 4. Investigator. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint an Investigator in consultation with the President of the Board. The Investigator may but need not be a Member of the Church.

Section 5. Church Attorney. Within 60 days following each annual Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority, in consultation with the Standing Committee, shall appoint an attorney to serve as Church Attorney to serve for the following year. The person so selected must be an enrolled, confirmed adult communicant in good standing and a duly licensed attorney, but need not reside within the Diocese. The Ecclesiastical Authority, in consultation with the Standing Committee, may remove the Church Attorney for cause.

Section 6. Pastoral Response Coordinator. The Ecclesiastical Authority may appoint a Pastoral Response Coordinator, to serve at the will of the Ecclesiastical Authority in coordinating the delivery of appropriate pastoral responses provided for in Title IV.8 of the Canons of the General Convention and this Title. The Pastoral Response Coordinator may be the Intake Officer, but shall not be a person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under this Title.

Section 7. Advisors. In each proceeding under this Title, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant and an Advisor for the Respondent. Persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position provided for under this Title, and shall not include chancellors or vice chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding.

Section 8. Clerk. The Board shall appoint a Board Clerk to assist the Board with records management and administrative support. The Clerk may be a member of the Board.

Canon D-VI.3 Costs and Expenses in Disciplinary Matters [Added by Act 2010 3: Array ded by Act 2011 3:

[Added by Act 2010-3; Amended by Act 2011-2]

Section 1. Costs Incurred by the Church. The reasonable costs and expenses of the Disciplinary Board, the Intake Officer, the Investigator, the Church Attorney, the Board Clerk, and the Pastoral Response Coordinator shall be the obligation of the Diocese, subject to budgetary constraints as may be established by the Diocesan Council.

Section 2. Costs Incurred by the Respondent. In the event of a final Order dismissing the complaint, or by provisions of a Covenant approved by the Ecclesiastical Authority, upon recommendation of the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Disciplinary Board, the reasonable defense fees and costs incurred by the Respondent may be paid or reimbursed by the Diocese, subject to budgetary constraints as may be established by the Diocesan Council.

Canon D-VI.4

Records in Disciplinary Matters

[Added by Act 2010-3; Amended by Act 2011-2]

Section 1. Records of Proceedings. Records of active proceedings before the Disciplinary Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk, if there be one, otherwise by the Diocesan offices.

Section 2. Permanent Records. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall make provision for the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Title at the Diocese and the Archives of The Episcopal Church, as prescribed in Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention.

Title D-VII: Administration

Canon D-VII.1 Suffragan Bishop May Act as Ecclesiastical Authority

In the event of the Bishop's death, disability, or extended absence from the Diocese, and if there be no Bishop Coadjutor, the Suffragan Bishop may be placed in charge of the Diocese by the Standing Committee and become temporarily the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention.

Canon D-VII.2 Chartered Committees

[Adopted in 1997; Amended by Act 2021-11]

- **Section 1.** *Chartered Committees.* A chartered committee is one created by action of the Diocesan Council in response to a resolution of the General Convention, a resolution of the Convention of this Diocese, or a formal request by the Bishop of this Diocese.
- **Section 2.** *Temporary Bodies.* The Bishop, the Convention or the Diocesan Council may establish temporary bodies for specific purposes. Any such temporary body shall be accountable to the body that created it and shall continue in existence for not more than three years.
- **Section 3.** Appointments. The Bishop, in consultation with the Diocesan Council, shall appoint the members of all chartered committees and temporary bodies and shall designate the chair of each.
- Section 4. The Chartering of Committees. Each chartered committee shall have a charter approved by the Diocesan Council. The charter shall specify its charge, the Department of the

Diocesan Council to which it is accountable, the number of its members and their terms of office. In approving the charter, the Diocesan Council shall observe the following guidelines: (1) terms of office shall be no longer than three years; (2) terms of office of members shall be staggered; (3) no member who has served two successive terms shall be eligible for reappointment until one year shall have elapsed following the expiration of the last term; (4) the number of members shall not exceed nine. If the Diocesan Council shall determine that a greater number of members are necessary to carry out the charge, it may authorize such greater number. In making appointments to chartered committees and temporary bodies, the Bishop shall give due consideration to the diversity of the Diocesa. The Diocesan Council shall report all charters to the Convention, and they shall be documented in the Journal.

Section 5. *Vacancies.* When a vacancy in any chartered committee or temporary body occurs for reasons other than expiration of term and there are more than twelve months remaining in the unexpired term, the appointment to fill the vacancy shall be for the remainder of the term. When a vacancy occurs and there are fewer than twelve months remaining in the unexpired term, the appointment shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term and the full succeeding term.

Section 6. *Members to Hold Over*. Members of all chartered committees and temporary bodies shall continue in office until their successors are appointed and have undertaken exercise of their offices.

Section 7. *Accountability*. Each chartered committee shall report at least annually to the Diocesan Council in such format and according to such schedule as the Council may prescribe. Each such body shall also report to each Annual Convention.

Canon D-VII.3 The Definition of Certain Terms [Adopted by Act 2021-12]

Section 1. For purposes of the Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina, and except as expressly provided otherwise therein, all references implying physical documents are deemed to include and authorize the use of electronic technologies.

Section 2. For purposes of the Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina, and except as expressly provided otherwise therein or in the bylaws of a parish or mission, all references to a person's or to persons' physical presence are deemed to include and authorize the use of electronic technologies.

Section 3. Any use of electronic technologies shall be consistent with any applicable canon of The Episcopal Church or the Diocese of North Carolina.

Canon D-VII.4

Conduct of Meetings and Voting by Remote Technology [Added by Act 2013-5, Amended by Act 2021-4]

Section 1. Parishes, missions, and their vestries; Convocations; the Standing Committee; the Diocesan Council on behalf of itself, its Departments, and the Council Committee on the State of the Church; the Trustees of the Diocese; Commissions and Chartered Committees of the Diocese; the Disciplinary Board, the Fair Share Appeals Board, the Mission Endowment Board, and the Murdoch Memorial Society; and all other commissions and committees of the Diocese (collectively, "Diocesan Entities") are authorized to adopt bylaws providing for the conduct of meetings by teleconference, videoconference, or any other technology that allows all persons participating to hear each other at the same time and to participate in discussion. For purposes of determining a quorum, conducting a parliamentary process, and voting, members participating in a meeting by means of remote technology are deemed present in person at the meeting.

Section 2. Diocesan Entities are authorized to adopt bylaws providing that actions required or permitted to be taken by the body may be taken without a meeting if (i) all members of the body consent to the action in writing or by authenticated electronic transmission, and (ii) such written or authenticated electronic transmissions are filed with the minutes of the proceedings.

Section 3. Bylaws adopted pursuant to this Canon must be consistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina and of the General Convention and shall be submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval.

RULES OF ORDER OF THE CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

- **I.** The Order of Business at the Annual Convention or any Special Convention shall be proposed by the Bishop or the presiding officer for adoption by the Convention. Upon adoption, only the Convention may make any change in the Order of Business prescribed under the authority thereof.
- II. Any of the rules of order may be suspended by simple majority vote of the Convention, except those rules which specify a larger majority for a specific action. Any such rule may be suspended upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the delegates present and voting.
- III. (a) The clergy and lay delegates of a parish or mission that fails to comply with Canon 21.4(g) or Canon 20.6(a), as the case may be, concerning the timely filing of an audit or with Canon 30.5 concerning the timely filing of a parochial report shall be deprived of vote at Convention and shall be excluded from the calculation of clergy and lay delegates required to attain a quorum.
- **(b)** No later than 21 days prior to the regularly scheduled meeting of Diocesan Council immediately prior to Convention, the Secretary shall inform every such parish and mission of the process established by Diocesan Council to request a waiver of this Rule.
- (c) Diocesan Council, at its discretion, may grant a waiver of this Rule to a parish or mission upon a showing of good or unavoidable causes. Additionally, no waiver shall be given to the same parish or mission for three consecutive years.
- (d) The report of the Secretary to Convention shall identify parishes and missions whose clergy and lay delegates were deprived of vote under this Rule, requests for waivers, and waivers granted. [Added by Act 2007-12; succeeding Rules renumbered accordingly; Amended by Act 2010-4; Amended by Act 2018-8; Rewritten by Act 2019-6.]
- **IV. (a)** Resolutions for Convention action may be submitted by members and officers of the Convention, canonical commissions, committees and other bodies chartered or recognized by the Ecclesiastical Authority or the Diocesan Council, or Convention committees. The presiding officer of the Convention shall refer to an appropriate Convention Committee for consideration and report all such resolutions except those which accompany the report of the Committee on Dispatch of Business. To assure timely reports, it is appropriate for Convention Committees to meet for consideration of resolutions referred to them at any time after they have been appointed.
- **(b)** While preambles or any recital of reasons, explanatory comments, or argument regarding any resolution may separately accompany its introduction or its report from a Convention Committee, they shall not constitute a part of the resolution for purposes of legislative action. Only the text of the adopted resolution shall be printed in the Journal of the Convention.
- (c) Reports from institutions (and portions of such reports) which propose no resolutions shall be deemed filed and received by title and need not be referred to committee. [Amended by Act 2006-9; Amended by Act 2011-1.]

- **V.** After the President has taken the chair no member shall continue standing except to address the Chair.
- VI. No member shall address the Convention or make any motion except from the microphones provided for that purpose and after recognition by the Presiding Officer.
- VII. Speakers shall address the Presiding Officer and shall confine themselves to the point in debate.
- VIII. No motion shall be considered unless seconded and, if required by the Presiding Officer, reduced to writing.
- **IX.** When the Presiding Officer is putting any question, the members shall continue in their seats and shall not hold any private discourse.
- **X.** Except by leave of the Convention, no member shall speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than two minutes at one time. The total time of debate on any question or resolution shall be a maximum of twenty minutes.
- **XI.** No applause shall be permitted during any debate or voting of the Convention or of the Committee of the Whole.
- XII. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be received except to lay upon the table, to call for the previous question, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone indefinitely, to commit, to amend, or to divide; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. The motions to lay on the table, to call for the previous question, and to adjourn shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate; and of these the motion to adjourn shall take precedence.
- **XIII.** If the question under debate contains several distinct propositions, the same shall be divided at the request of any member, and a vote taken separately, except that a motion to strike out and insert shall be indivisible.
- XIV. All amendments shall be considered in the order in which they are moved. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. No amendment to a second amendment shall be in order. But when an amendment to an amendment is under consideration, a substitute for the whole matter may be received. No proposition on a subject different from the one under consideration shall be received under color of a substitute.
- **XV.** In a vote by orders the individual votes of the clergy and laity shall be taken separately. A majority of affirmative votes in both orders shall be necessary to any decision on any vote by orders.

In any vote by orders, upon the request of any two members of the clergy who do not serve the same congregation (parish or mission), or any two lay delegates representing different congregations, the vote shall be by roll call of the clergy and lay delegates. The votes of the lay delegates shall be announced by a member designated by the delegation

when the name of that church is called. The delegation shall be polled upon request of any member thereof.

- **XVI.** A question once decided shall stand as the action of the Convention and shall not be drawn again into debate. A member of the Convention who voted on the prevailing side may move to reconsider any vote so long as the motion is made on the same or succeeding day to that on which the vote was taken, except that such a motion may be voted on at any time with the consent of two-thirds of the Convention.
- **XVII.** (a) Reports to the Convention from all commissions, committees, temporary bodies, and institutions of the Diocese shall be in writing. All reports recommending or requiring any action or expression of opinion by the Convention shall be accompanied by corresponding resolutions to be introduced in accordance with Rule of Order IV(a).
- **(b)** Reports to the Convention by commissions, committees, or temporary bodies that require no action or expression of opinion by that body and which have been distributed in advance shall be received as presented.
- (c) A Convention Committee report on resolutions referred to it may include statements of reasons for the committee's recommendations, may be accompanied by a minority report (if signed by one-fourth of the committee's membership), and, with respect to each resolution or group of related resolutions requiring separate action, shall take one of the following forms:
 - 1. Recommend adoption.
 - 2. Recommend adoption of a substitute resolution.
- 3. Recommend rejection. In this event the resolution shall lie upon the table unless (a) a majority of the delegates present and voting call for placing the resolution on the agenda for immediate consideration, or (b) the report is accompanied by a minority report recommending adoption, in which case the question shall be consideration of the minority report.
- 4. Report without recommendation. In this case the presiding officer shall put the original resolution, stating that the committee makes no recommendation.
- **XVIII.** All questions of order shall be decided by the presiding officer without debate. Any member may appeal from such decision, when, on motion by the member, duly seconded, the question shall be decided by majority vote of the Convention. On such an appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave.
- **XIX.** No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Convention without leave or unless unable to attend.
- **XX.** When the Convention is about to rise, every member shall remain seated until the President leaves the chair.
- **XXI.** On motion duly put and carried, the Convention may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole, with or without closed doors, for the purpose of discussing such subjects as may be approved by the Convention.

The Bishop may select and announce subjects for discussion: Provided, that if the motion to go into a Committee of the Whole has specified the subject to be discussed, that subject shall first be disposed of.

- **XXII.** (a) No nomination shall be received unless the person to be nominated has indicated assent thereto. Nominations for election by the annual Convention may be submitted electronically or in writing to the Secretary of the Convention at least 40 days before the opening session thereof. Any nomination received by the Secretary after the specified date shall be returned to the nominator and may be submitted from the floor of the Convention in accordance with the provisions of this rule of order. All nominators and nominees must be communicants in good standing in this Diocese. At the first business session of the Convention the presiding officer shall call for nominations from the floor, at which time the Secretary shall read the names of all persons whose nominations have been received at least 40 days before the opening of the Convention, after which additional nominations may be received from the floor, provided that any such nomination is submitted jointly by three voting members of the Convention, each being from a different parish or mission. Each nomination shall be accompanied by a brief biography of the nominee on a form prepared by the Secretary of the Convention. The information to be included on the biographical form (to be signed by the nominator) shall include at least the following: nominee's name, address and home congregation, and prior as well as present parochial and Diocesan offices. [Amended by Act 2007-11; Amended by Act 2016-2.]
- (b) The names and biographies of all persons nominated in writing to the Secretary at least 40 days before the opening session of the Convention shall be given to the deans of the convocations and shall be included in the advance materials distributed by the Secretary to members of the Convention prior to the meetings of each convocation which are to be held not later than 10 days prior to the Convention. The Secretary shall also post the biographical forms in a conspicuous place in or adjacent to the room in which the Convention meets so that they may be seen throughout the Convention session by all delegates.
- (c) All nominations shall be reported to the Convention by the Secretary together with appropriate instructions as to how to cast a valid ballot. Delegates may vote for fewer candidates than the number of positions to be filled, but ballots containing votes for more than the number of positions to be filled shall be rejected.
- (d) All elections shall be conducted by secret ballot. The results shall be determined by a majority of votes cast on the ballot or by such larger majority as may be required by the Constitution or by canon. If candidates are to be chosen for different terms to the same office, the Secretary shall assign terms to those elected in the order of the number of votes received.
- (e) Nominees receiving a majority vote (as herein defined) on any ballot shall be declared elected. If subsequent ballots be required, the nominees to be voted on shall be limited to the number remaining which is equal to twice the number of offices to be filled and who received on the preceding ballot the highest number of votes exclusive of those declared elected.
- (f) After the election of Deputies to the General Convention, alternates for these deputies are designated from the remaining candidates in the order of the number of votes received on the preceding ballot. [Amended by Act 2016-3 and Act 2018-6.]
- **XXIII.** (a) Resolutions to be acted on at the annual Convention shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Convention on or before the 40th day preceding the opening date of the Convention. Upon submission, resolutions shall be referred to the appropriate Convention

Committee as prescribed by Rule of Order IV(a), and the texts thereof shall be included in the advance materials distributed by the Secretary of the Convention to the members of the Convention prior to the Convention. Resolutions submitted to the Secretary later than specified shall be returned to the introducer without action.

Resolutions not proposing or requiring amendment of the Constitution or Canons may be introduced during the Convention but may be acted upon only as follows: If introduced in the first business session of the Convention, the question before the Convention shall be whether the resolution shall be considered. Upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the delegates, the resolution shall be referred to an appropriate Convention Committee for study and report to that Convention. Such resolutions that fail to receive the required vote, as well as resolutions introduced after the close of the first business session of the Convention, shall not be considered.

This rule shall not apply to resolutions of courtesy.

- **(b)** Any portions of the Bishop's address meriting the Convention's response shall be referred by the Diocesan Bishop to an appropriate Convention Committee.
- (c) The Secretary of the Convention, with the assistance of the Chancellor of the Diocese, shall review each resolution submitted within the time prescribed in section (a), above, to determine whether favorable action on the resolution would require adoption or amendment of a constitutional provision, canon, or rule of order. All such resolutions shall be simultaneously reported to the Commission on Constitution and Canons and referred to the appropriate Convention Committee. The Commission shall report its recommendations with respect to such measures to the Convention at the first business session either as part of its annual report or separately, as may be most convenient. No resolution amending the Constitution or Canons shall be considered on the day on which proposed, except by a two-thirds vote of those entitled to vote. *Amended by Act 2006-9.*]
- **XXIV.** If a resolution submitted for Convention action would substantially affect Diocesan finances, the presiding officer of the Convention shall, at the time the resolution is referred to an appropriate Convention Committee under Rule of Order IV(a), also request the Convention Committee on Administration of the Diocese to consider the measure. The Convention shall not take up the resolution until its Committee on the Administration of the Diocese has, without recommendation, furnished the Convention with an analysis of the effect adoption of the resolution would have on the fiscal affairs of the Diocese.
- **XXV.** Subject to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention of The Episcopal Church, the Constitution, Canons, and Rules of Order of the Diocese of North Carolina, and any Special Rule proposed by the Committee on Dispatch of Business for the election of a bishop or the consideration of any other specific items of business, the Parliamentary Authority governing the transaction of business by the Annual Convention or any Special Convention shall be the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised. [Added by Act 2008-6]
- **XXVI**. Any clergy or lay person not otherwise entitled to seat and voice at Convention who is employed for full time ministry to a campus worshipping community admitted into union with Convention pursuant to Canon 1.4 shall be granted seat and voice at Convention upon application to the Secretary no less than sixty (60) days prior to the Convention. [Added by Act 2012-13]

Supplemental Rules of Order for Use of Teleconferencing at a Convention [Added by Act 2021-8]

- **T1.** <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of these Supplemental Rules of Order for Use of Teleconferencing at a Convention ("T-Rules") is to facilitate calling and conducting a Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina when the Ecclesiastical Authority determines that it is impractical or impossible to hold an in-person meeting of the Convention because of governmental constraints or other compelling reasons.
- **T2.** <u>How Called.</u> 120 days prior to an Annual Convention or at the time when a Special Convention is called, the Ecclesiastical Authority may, at its discretion, determine that the Convention will take place entirely by teleconference (a "Teleconferenced Convention") or will have some members present in person and other members participating by teleconference (a "Hybrid Convention"). The Secretary shall inform members accordingly.
- **T3.** Scope. These T-Rules apply to both Teleconferenced and Hybrid Conventions, except as identified herein. However, nothing in these T-Rules applies to an episcopal election, which the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese reserve for a Convention at which members are present in person.
- **T4.** <u>Selection of Services</u>. The Secretary of the Convention shall engage one or more companies to provide two-way video and audio connectivity and online systems that support parliamentary procedure, voting, and casting of ballots at a Teleconferenced or Hybrid Convention (collectively, the "Services"). To the extent practicable, the Secretary shall employ Services whose user interfaces are available in both English and Spanish.
- **T5.** Members to Furnish Email Addresses. No less than 60 days before a Teleconferenced or Hybrid Convention, every member of the clergy order shall notify the Ecclesiastical Authority of his or her email address. No later than such date, every church and campus worshipping community shall have submitted its Certificate of Election, updated as necessary by Certificates of Change in Lay Delegation, to the Secretary. Such certificate shall specify the email address of every lay delegate.
- **T6.** Choice of Attendance. In the case of a Hybrid Convention, a member shall specify whether he or she intends to attend in person or by teleconference when registering for the Convention, but no less than 30 days before the Convention. Any member failing to provide timely notice of attendance by teleconference shall be deemed to intend to attend in person. A member may subsequently change his or her participation from by teleconference to in-person by notifying the Secretary but not from in-person to by teleconference.
- **T7.** <u>Issuance of Access Instructions</u>. No less than 14 days before a Teleconferenced or Hybrid Convention, the Secretary shall provide individualized access instructions for the Services by email to each member (in the case of a Hybrid Convention, to members that will attend by teleconference). The access instructions shall include URLs, user-ids, and passwords as needed to authenticate the member for participation in the Convention and, if the member has right to vote, to vote and to cast ballots.

- **T8.** <u>Security.</u> A member shall not publicize or divulge to any person his or her individualized access instructions. A member shall use only the individualized access instructions provided him or her.
- **T9.** <u>Availability</u>. The Secretary shall make Services available for members to sign in no less than 30 minutes before the start of each session of Convention. At the discretion of the Secretary, the Services may be left active during recesses or may be taken down, to be restarted at a time to be announced by the Secretary.
- T10. Signing in and out. Members shall identify themselves by signing into the Services using their respective individualized access instructions. During a session of Convention, a member shall remain connected to the Services unless he or she must absent himself or herself from participation, in which case the member shall sign out while absent and sign in upon return. A member shall sign into the Services from only one access device (computer, tablet, smartphone, etc.) at any given time, but a member may change his or her access device by signing out and then signing in from another access device.
- **T11.** <u>Presence.</u> Members who connected to the teleconferencing services at least once during a Convention are deemed to be present with respect to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese and shall be marked as present in the Journal.
- **T12. Quorum.** When determining and reporting the presence of a quorum to the President, the Committee on Credentials shall include members who have signed into the Services.
- **T13.** Parliamentary Processes, Voting, and Casting of Ballots. No less than 7 days prior to Convention, the Secretary shall inform members (in the case of a Hybrid Convention, members participating by teleconference) by email of the procedures for use of the Services in parliamentary processes, voting, and casting of ballots. The President may rule out of order the actions of a member that do not comply with the procedures.
- **T14.** <u>Video.</u> When actively engaging in parliamentary process, a member shall enable his or her video uplink. At other times, the member may, at his or her discretion, disable the video uplink.
- **T15.** <u>Technical Requirements and Malfunctions.</u> Each member is solely responsible for his or her access device (computer, tablet, smartphone, etc.) and Internet connectivity. No action of Convention shall be delayed, objected to, or invalidated on grounds that the loss or poor quality of a member's individual Internet connection or the failure of his or her access device prevented participation in the Convention.
- **T16.** <u>Muting.</u> Each member shall keep the microphone of his or her access device muted unless recognized by the President to speak.
- **T17.** <u>Forced Disconnections</u>. The Secretary may cause the muting or disconnection of a member's connection to the Services if undue interference with the Convention is attributable to such member. The Secretary's decision to do so, which is subject to an undebatable appeal that can be made by any member, shall be announced to Convention and recorded in the Journal.
- **T18.** <u>Hybrid Conventions.</u> So far as is practicable in a Hybrid Convention: (a) the President shall give equitable attention to members attending in-person and members attending by teleconference; (b) members actively engaging in parliamentary process by

teleconference shall be seen and heard in the Convention meeting hall; and (c) non-parliamentary proceedings of the Convention will be made available to members participating by teleconference.

- **T19.** <u>Proceedings in Spanish.</u> The Secretary shall (a) arrange for translation into Spanish of the proceedings of a Teleconferenced Convention and (b) provide the same degree of Spanish translation for members attending a Hybrid Convention by teleconference as is provided members attending in-person.
- **T20.** <u>Moderators.</u> In order to facilitate the conduct of Teleconferenced or Hybrid Convention, the President of the Convention may appoint one or more Moderators to assist the President and the Secretary.
- **T21.** <u>Broadcast.</u> At the discretion of the Ecclesiastical Authority, any Convention may be broadcast in whole or in part by one-way audio and/or video to the public at large. Mere broadcasting of a Convention does not constitute a Teleconferenced or Hybrid Convention. Nothing in these T-Rules shall apply to manner in which a Convention is broadcast.
- **T22.** <u>Precedence.</u> In case of conflict between the Rules of Convention and these T-Rules at a Teleconferenced or Hybrid Convention, these T-Rules shall prevail.

GUIDELINES FOR THE FAIR SHARE APPEALS BOARD

We, the clergy and people of the Diocese of North Carolina, confess our need to give of our time, talent, and treasure to carry out the work Christ has given us to do through his Church. We embrace our heritage of supporting one another and joining together to accomplish that work. We acknowledge our responsibility to support the episcopacy and to provide for the mission and ministry of the diocese. We recognize the tithe as the minimum standard of giving enjoined by Holy Scripture, and we acknowledge the importance of practicing the tithe in word and deed, both as individuals and as Christians joined together in faith communities, the Diocese of North Carolina, and The Episcopal Church. Finally, we feel strongly the bonds that draw us together as members of the Body of Christ. We therefore desire that funding of the mission and ministry of the Diocese be accomplished fairly and equitably through means that promote both compassion and accountability. We affirm that no local faith community will be required to contribute more than its fair share, and that none will be allowed to contribute less than its fair share. To accomplish these ends we have enacted as follows: [Preamble to Act 2009-3 of the 193rd Annual Convention, On Amending the Constitution and Canons to Assure Funding of the Mission and Ministry Budget of the Diocese.]

- 1. The deadline for filing *complete* appeals will be August 15 of the preceding year for which the appeal is sought. No appeal will be considered after that date except for unforeseen circumstances that might arise after the deadline.
- 2. All appeals must include the following as attachments:
 - a. A dated cover letter signed by the rector (vicar) and senior warden.
 - b. The reason(s) for and amount of the reduction that is sought.
 - c. Year-to-date financial statement.
 - d. Copies of the completed parochial report and the completed audit report required to have been filed for the previous year by Canon 30, Section 5 (Parochial Reports),
 Canon 20, Section 6(a) Missions or Canon 21, Section 4(h) Parishes, of the Canons of the Diocese of North Carolina.
 - e. The congregation's projected budget for the year in which the appeal is filed.
 - f. A description of the level of stewardship training and education in the congregation.

- g. The nature of the annual stewardship campaign in the congregation.
- h. Any extraordinary circumstances faced by the congregation.
- i. A detailed plan, including timeline, outlining how to bring the congregation into full compliance with the Diocesan Fair Share Plan.
- j. Other data as considered relevant by the congregation.
- k. Other information as required by the Fair Share Appeals Board
- 3. The Fair Share Appeals Board will consider all appeals on a case by case basis subject to the following guidelines and those contained in Canon 18:
 - a. A call for the highest level of pastoral sensitivity with respect to such appeals will be taken, considering both the circumstances of the congregation and the needs of all the other parishes and missions that make up the Diocese. We know that paper cannot tell your story completely. Our desire is to come to know you and your church better and to see how we, the Diocesan Council and the other 128 congregations of the Diocese of North Carolina, may best be of help. Therefore, it may be appropriate for the Fair Share Appeals Board to meet with you personally.
 - b. The principle governing all appeals is that any reduction in fair share giving is in effect a subsidy of the congregation by the other parishes and missions that make up the Diocese. Program and staff expenses will be carefully scrutinized using this principle. Budgets that contain discretionary spending will be carefully scrutinized. Pastoral concerns may also be addressed including the congregation's stewardship program and process of Christian formation.
 - c. The Fair Share Appeals Board will notify all parties, stipulated in Canon 18, Section 3, of its decision on whether or not an appeal is granted by October 15th of the year in which the appeal is filed.
 - d. If the Board recommends a reduction, it shall refer the parish or mission to appropriate sources of assistance for stewardship and congregational growth and development.

BYLAWS OF DIOCESAN COUNCIL

(Revised August 25, 2005; Amended May 27, 2010; Amended April 28, 2011; Amended August 22, 2019; Amended June 18, 2020)

- I. The presiding officer of the Council is the Ecclesiastical Authority. The secretary of the Council is the secretary of the convention. Voting privileges are held by elected members of the Council. The presiding officer shall vote only in the case of a tie. All bishops in active service to the Diocese as coadjutor, suffragan, assistant, or assisting, the treasurer, the canon for congregational mission, the director of finance and administration, and the secretary of the convention shall each have seat and voice.
- II. Members of the Council shall attend each annual and special Convention of the Church in this Diocese. The secretary of convention and the Committee on the Dispatch of Business are requested to take appropriate steps to facilitate such attendance by lay members of the Council who are not otherwise members of the Convention.
- III. Unless otherwise directed, the secretary of the Council shall be the person designated to communicate actions of the Council to affected persons or entities. Exceptions to this policy must have prior approval of Council.
- IV. A summary of the proceedings of each Council meeting shall be posted on the diocesan website.
- V. The canon for congregational mission and the director of finance and administration shall be officers of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina subject to the general supervision of the Ecclesiastical Authority and, with respect to finances, the treasurer of the Diocese. Subject to such supervision, the canon for congregational mission and the director of finance and administration shall be authorized to execute and deliver on behalf of the Diocese all contracts, agreements, leases, and other documents as shall be necessary to preserve and insure all diocesan properties, to invest, reinvest, and disburse all diocesan funds and investments and to put into effect the expenditures and programs authorized in the annual budget or otherwise authorized by Diocesan Council or by the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina.
- VI. Diocesan Council shall have regular meetings at such dates, times and places as it shall establish by the action of Diocesan Council. Special meetings of Diocesan Council may be called by or at the request of the Ecclesiastical Authority or any member of Diocesan Council.
- VII. The secretary of Diocesan Council shall give notice of the date, time and place of each special, non-regular meeting of Diocesan Council (i) by mail at least five days before such meeting, or (ii) by public announcement or authenticated electronic transmission at least twenty-four hours before such meeting. Notice of such meeting may be waived in writing before or after such meeting, and the effect of such waiver shall be equivalent to the giving of timely notice. As used in these By-Laws, "authenticated electronic transmission" means any form of communication that does not involve the

physical transmission of paper but which creates a record that may be retained, retrieved, and reviewed by the recipient of the transmission.

VIII. The secretary of Diocesan Council shall give notice of each postponed or cancelled meeting of Diocesan Council (i) by mail at least five days before such meeting, or (ii) by public announcement or authenticated electronic transmission at least twenty-four hours before such meeting, or (iii) by person-to-person communications at least four hours before such meeting. Notice of such postponed or cancelled meeting may be waived in writing, and the effect of such waiver shall be equivalent to the giving of timely notice. As used in these By-Laws, "person-to-person communication" means authenticated electronic transmissions or face-to-face or telephone exchanges, in which information is delivered by one party and receipt of such information is acknowledged by the other party.

IX. The presiding officer of Diocesan Council, or the chair of a Department or Committee of Diocesan Council, may conduct a meeting of Diocesan Council or of such Department or Committee, as the case may be, by means of remote communication provided all members physically present at the meeting and all members remotely participating in the meeting can initiate and receive communications with each other on a substantially simultaneous basis. For the purposes of determining a quorum and for voting, members participating in a meeting by means of remote communication shall be deemed to be present in person at such meeting. As used in these By-Laws "remote communication" means communication via telephone conference, video conference, the Internet, or such other means approved by Diocesan Council that satisfies the requirements of this paragraph.

X. Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of Diocesan Council, or of any Department or Committee of Diocesan Council, may be taken without a meeting if (i) all members of Diocesan Council, such Department or such Committee, as the case may be, consent to such action in writing or by authenticated electronic transmission, and (ii) such writings or authenticated electronic transmissions are filed with the minutes of the proceedings of Diocesan Council, the Department or the Committee, as the case may be.

XI. The quorum for a meeting of Diocesan Council shall be a majority of its elected members excluding positions that are vacant for any reason including but not limited to expiry of term.

CHARTERED COMMITTEES OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Revised April 21, 2022

Chartered Committee on Campus and Young Adult Ministry

a/k/a Chartered Committee for Young Adult Missioners f/k/a Chartered Committee on Ministry in Higher Education

The Committee on Campus and Young Adult Ministry (CCYAM) will assist the Bishop Suffragan in oversight and is the primary advocate for the developing and strengthening of campus and young adult

ministries in the Diocese of North Carolina as it works to bring young adults to follow in the way of Jesus

Christ. This Committee is accountable to the Department of Youth and Young Adults and through the Department to the Diocesan Council.

In accordance with Canon 16, the Bishop shall appoint members to the Committee and shall annually designate the chair of the Committee. The Committee's membership shall consist of one (non-staff) member per campus/young adult ministry program. Campus Ministers and Young Adult Missioners are encouraged to attend meetings of the Committee and shall be *ex officio* members.

Terms of office for members of this Committee shall be three years, and their terms shall be staggered. No member shall be eligible to serve more than two successive three-year terms until one year has elapsed following expiration of the last term.

Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry

The teaching of the Church calls for Christians to live in harmony with God's Creation (BCP 845). The Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry provides leadership in the Diocese to follow this call. The focus of this ministry is to (I) educate and motivate and model environmental advocacy and action for congregations and individuals; (2) offer liturgical resources for celebrating the glories of God's creation; and (3) raise up ethical aspects of environmental issues.

Membership: The Committee requests approval of up to twelve members who will serve threeyear staggered terms. Members may serve two consecutive terms. Three unexcused absences in one year will be considered a resignation from the Committee.

Meetings: The Chartered Committee on Environmental Ministry will meet at least six times a year.

Relationship to Diocesan Council: The Committee is accountable to the Diocesan Council's Department of Outreach.

Structure: Sub-committees may include communications/networking, education/resources, and activism/action/justice. Ad hoc committees may be appointed to address specific concerns. Members of these may include non-committee members.

(Adopted by Diocesan Council March 18, 1998)

Chartered Committee on Global Mission

- I. This committee provides oversight and coordination of all mission work outside the United States, including activities done by local congregations and in the Companion Diocese when such a relationship exists.
- II. This committee is accountable to the Department of Outreach.
- III. This committee has a minimum of nine members and a maximum of twelve members with three-year staggered terms. The members are appointed by the Bishop, and generally no member shall serve more than two successive terms. This committee may appoint ad hoc committees as needed. The chairpersons of any companion diocese link committees shall automatically serve on the committee. The Bishop shall designate the chair for the committee.

(Adopted by Diocesan Council March 18, 1998; amended October 21, 2021)

Chartered Committee on Grants

Section 1. It is the duty of the Committee on Grants to solicit, receive, and evaluate applications from individuals and congregations for grants from the Diocese pursuant to the following trusts and programs:

- Continuing education grants to members of the clergy and lay persons funded from moneys made available by the Bishop and Trustees.
- Grants under the Parish Grant Program funded from the income of the Parish Grant Trust and the annual diocesan budget.
- Grants from the Diocesan Disaster Relief Trust, the World Disaster Relief Trust, the Diocesan New Programs Trust, and the Emergencies Trust, all of which were established by gifts to the ACTS campaign.
- Such other diocesan grant programs as may be established from time to time, unless the Bishop or Diocesan Council shall make other provision.

Section 2. The Committee on Grants has nine members: one person appointed by the Bishop, the Lay Warden of each of the seven convocations, and one member of the Diocesan Council designated by the Bishop for a one-year term. Except as otherwise provided herein, members shall be appointed for three-year terms. The Bishop shall annually designate one of the members as chair for a one-year term. No person shall be eligible to serve on the Committee for more than six years in any period of seven years.

Section 3. The Committee on Grants shall recommend for adoption by the Diocesan Council written statements of eligibility for all grant programs administered by the Committee. The Committee may on its own authority establish appropriate application procedures.

Section 4. This charter is effective January 1, 1998.

Chartered Committee on Hispanic Ministry

- 1. This committee serves to foster and develop Hispanic Ministry throughout the Diocese; serves as a resource and support network for all involved in ministry with people whose primary language is Spanish; and provides coordination and oversight for evangelism, sacramental ministry, education, advocacy, and financial and strategic development in conjunction and with the support of the Diocese.
- 2. The committee is accountable to the Department of Congregational Support and Development.
- 3. The committee seeks to represent various geographic areas in the Diocese and varies of Hispanic Ministries in a membership of no fewer than five nor more than fifteen persons appointed by the Bishop for staggered three-year terms. No member is eligible to serve more than two successive three-year terms until one year has elapsed following the expiration of the last term.
- 4. The committee meets at least four times annually.

(Adopted by Diocesan Council December 14, 2006)

Chartered Committee on History and Archives

- I. This committee provides ongoing direction and support for fulfilling the mandate given the Historiographer of the Diocese in Canon 8.
- II. Tasks of the committee include:
 - a. Acting as a council of advice to the Historiographer of the Diocese;
 - b. Monitoring the ongoing need to provide adequate storage, management, processing, and access for diocesan records;
 - c. Arranging for workshops, conferences, publications, exhibits, and celebrations related to the history of the diocese; and
 - d. Aiding and encouraging congregations to maintain archives and produce their own historical accounts.
- III. This committee shall meet at least two times annually and is accountable to the Department of Finance and Administration.
- IV. This committee shall consist of the following members:

- a. Ex officio: the Historiographer (who shall also serve as committee chair); the Archivist, the Canon to the Ordinary for Administration, the Chancellor of the Diocese, and the Secretary of the Convention.
- b. Nine members appointed to the committee by the Bishop to serve three-year staggered terms. No members of the committee so appointed shall be eligible to serve more than two successive terms.

Chartered Committee on Remuneration and Insurance

- I. The committee shall study the remuneration of clergy and make an annual recommendation to Diocesan Council for minimum clergy salaries and other remuneration in the Diocese.
- II. The committee shall make an annual recommendation to Diocesan Council for healthcare and other benefits to be provided to qualifying clergy and lay employees in the Diocese.
- III. The committee shall have oversight of all other Diocesan insurance and shall review such policies annually.
- IV. The committee is responsible to the Department of Finance and Administration of the Diocesan Council.
- V. The committee shall consist of the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese and at least three members appointed by the Bishop. The Bishop shall appoint the chair.
- VI. The appointed members of the committee shall serve no more than two successive three-year terms unless specifically granted exemption by the Bishop.

Chartered Committee on Lifelong Learning

a/k/a Chartered Committee on Lifelong Christian Formation

- I. The mission of this Committee is
 - A. To know God and to make God known.
 - B. To serve and strengthen the ministry of Christian Formation in our Diocese.
 - C. To support our congregations in the lifelong process of nurturing, forming, and equipping all members to carry out the ministry to which they are called through baptism.
- II. This Committee shall be accountable to the Department for Christian Formation.

(Amended by Diocesan Council, April 22, 2010)

Chartered Committee on Youth

- I. The purpose of the Chartered Committee on Youth is to maintain the quality of the youth programs in this diocese and to advocate for and initiate new and innovative programs for young people in the Diocese of North Carolina and throughout The Episcopal Church.
- II. This committee shall be accountable to the Department of Youth and Young Adults, and shall encompass the entities formerly known as the DYC and the Happening Board. The separate entities shall cease to operate independently as of June, 2009, and the Diocesan Youth Missioner will be charged with

incorporating members of both into the CCY for program years 2009-10 and 2010-11.

- III. The number of members of this committee shall be determined as follows:
 - The Youth Missioner will accept applications each spring for the upcoming program year, defined as June-May.
 - Members will be chosen from the applicants, to include, as nearly as possible, five youth and one adult from each convocation of the diocese.
 - Any convocation which does not fill its youth or adult positions will release those positions to the Youth Missioner to fill with applicants from other convocations.
 - Other members of the Chartered Committee on Youth (CCY) will include the Diocesan Youth Missioner, the Assistant to the Diocesan Youth Minister, the Regional Youth Missioners, and the Happening Coordinator. Staff liaison will be the Canon to the Ordinary for Program and Pastoral

Ministry. The whole body of the CCY will be responsible for planning and implementing programs for the youth of the Diocese of North Carolina, including but not limited to youth conferences, Happening, outreach opportunities, and mission trips.

- From the body of the CCY, a group of no more than 15 individuals (at least nine of whom will be youth) will be designated by the Diocesan Youth Missioner as the Covenant Committee of the CCY. This committee will function as a governing board, and hold the responsibility for the administration of the CCY, including matters of budget, rules, conduct, procedures, etc. The Covenant Committee will be expected to attend the Annual Convention.
- CCY members will be expected to reapply each spring.
- IV. The Bishop shall annually designate the chair of the committee and appoint members to the committee as vacancies occur.

Missionary Resource Support Team: A Chartered Committee

The Missionary Resource Support Team (MRST), a chartered committee of the Diocese of North Carolina, provides financial support to mission congregations, small parishes and newly established worshipping communities in the Diocese who are intentionally carrying out the mission of the Church, and that of the Diocese of North Carolina, in their unique ministry context.

MRST offers two grants to congregations in the Diocese of North Carolina. Our primary resource is the Salary Support Grant. Though typically offered for clergy salaries, this grant can also be used for lay salaries as well. This typically applies to small churches and mission congregations but also includes new ministry initiatives created in collaboration with existing congregations. MRST also offers one-time Seed Grants of up to \$7500 that can be allocated during the current calendar year for new ministries getting off the ground.

The Team is accountable to the Department of Congregational Support and Development.

The Team should number approximately twelve lay and clergy, appointed by the Bishop on recommendation from the Chair. The Chair is elected within the Team. Terms are three years with a maximum of two consecutive.

Appendix A

Diocesan Canon 15, Section 7

<u>Structure and Organization of the Diocese</u>. The Council Committee on the State of the Church shall keep the structure and organization of the Diocese under continuing study, shall review all chartered committees at least every five years to determine if they are viable, and shall, from time to time, make such recommendations to the Convention as it may find appropriate to enable the Diocese to fulfill its ministry.
